



Pastors Note ~ Pentecost Sunday



What is the greatest homily I have ever heard? I would like to share it with you. It is a beautiful letter from Emily who is all of 10 years old. I would like to share a truly beautiful letter from Emily, who is all of 10 years old. I could not write such an inspirational letter like this when I was 30 years old. I still can't at age 74!:

"I see the image of God in my sister, Lizzie, because she has Down syndrome. I see God in her because she is so nice and sweet. She will give you anything she has. When I am mean to her she always gets so sad because I get in trouble. When you get hurt she gets sad and cries for you. She brings out the image of God to me so much. I think she is a very, very, very special gift from God. I would be very sad without her because she never hurts you or gets

into a fight with you. My sister, Lizzie, is not selfish and neither is God and that's why she brings out the image of God to me and my family."

Emily captured how Lizzie reflects the image of God when others would only see her limitations. We can certainly look at our parish community with the eyes of Emily, seeing the cherished gifts and not the limitations. Our St Henry Parish is so rich in diversity of personalities, languages and cultures. We are represented and enriched by so many languages and backgrounds: English, Spanish, Vietnamese, Tagalong with many dialects, Swahili, French, German, Czech, "Wahawkan", Nigerian (Yoruba, Ibo, Hausa)... In the midst of diversity the Holy Spirit comes to all of us and we are all made whole in Christ.

On Pentecost Sunday we make our own personal reconfirmation today...so that we can...reflect and care. I do not know anything in which the Church could engage that would be more important than working with individuals who are made in the image and likeness of God. It is an enormous thrill to be able to serve as a vehicle for their being filled with the Holy Spirit, as the Apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit on that first Pentecost Sunday. It is a magnificent experience to be able to give them the Body and Blood of our Lord for the first time. Pray for their families, their teachers and for their caregivers. Thank God for your health and the health of your children. Remember that every single one of us is vulnerable, but we remain human persons

nevertheless, made in the image and likeness of God no matter what we look like, no matter what we sound like, no matter what other people think of us, no matter how difficult we may become to care for. It is a tremendous privilege to be able to give care to any one of God's children no matter how different (from you and I) they are perceived by us to be. God does not see the differences that somehow matter so much to us.

Put simply, to be Catholic is to be diverse! Paul says it, "No one can say Jesus is Lord except by the Holy Spirit." In John, the Risen Christ blows his Spirit over them. With this simple profound gesture, Christ entered their lives once again... Because of that they received the peace that overcame fear and shame. That was all they or we need to become disciples who would spread his forgiveness. The Spirit has come and will come again and again, to those who wait.

Pentecost extends Christmas and Easter into time and space. Yes, today's birth-day of the Church extends the continuing message of Jesus, and this continues to be the staging area. Let us be filled with breath, fire and energy as we take the Spirit into our world as the Body of Christ.





Happening In the Parish

St. Henry Respect Life Committee Presents... Fatal Flaws: Legalizing Assisted Death with Speaker, Dr. William M. Toffler. Oregon has an on-going youth and general suicide crisis on its hands. In February, 2020 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released data showing that suicide was the leading cause of death among Oregon youth ages 10 to 24 in 2018, up from the second leading cause of death in 2017. Oregon is now ranked 11th highest in the nation for youth suicide death rates (up from 17th in 2017). The Oregon Health Authority has conflicting mandates when it comes to suicide: promoting it for the elderly sick while striving to prevent it among the young and others. What a contradiction! This approach is obviously not working, to promote suicide among one group and tell another not to do it. St. Henry Respect Life Committee will be showing the DVD Fatal Flaws: Legalizing Assisted Death on Tuesday, June 8 at 7:00 p.m. Following the showing of the hour-long DVD, Dr. William M. Toffler, national director and one of the cofounders of Physicians for Compassionate Care Education Foundation, will be available for questions and answers.

Did You Know... Catholic Vs. Protestant Bibles

Question: Why are Catholic and Protestant Bibles different?

Answer: Since the earliest days of the Church, Christians used a Greek translation of the Old Testament known as the Septuagint. This collection of the texts of the Hebrew Scriptures included 46 books. At the time of the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s, the Protestant reformers began to create their own translations of the Bible (into local languages) and some began to question why the Jewish Scriptures would have included texts that were written in Greek, because, they assumed, the only valid Jewish Scriptures would have been written in Hebrew. And so, they decided to remove seven books from the Old Testament: Baruch, Sirach, 1 and 2 Maccabees, Tobit, Judith and Wisdom (as well as portions of the

Books of Daniel and Esther). This means that the Protestant Old Testament only includes 39 books, while Catholic Bibles continue to include those original 46 books. Both Catholic and Protestant Bibles include 27 books and letters in the New Testament.

And when the days of Pentecost were drawing to a close, they were all together in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven, as of a violent wind coming, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them parted tongues as of fire, which settled upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in foreign tongues, even as the Holy Spirit prompted them to speak (Acts 2, 1-4).



May 23, 2021 Readings ~ Pentecost

First Reading

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire,

which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem. At this sound, they gathered in a large crowd, but they were confused because each one heard them speaking in his own language. They were astounded, and in amazement they

asked, "Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his native language? We are Parthians, Medes, and Elamites, inhabitants of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia,

Egypt and the districts of Libya near Cyrene, as well as travelers from Rome,

both Jews and converts to Judaism, Cretans and Arabs, yet we hear them speaking in our own tongues of the mighty acts of God."





Pero incluso esa razón por la que no podemos tan grande, gigantesca, que incluso te detiene en seco en tus pisadas, no fue nada, porque Dios tenía un plan. No llamó a un grupo de hombres equipados. Él los llamó y los equipó. ¡Entren las lenguas de fuego!

Dios no nos llama a hacer su voluntad porque tenemos lo que se necesita. Nos llama porque está listo para darnos lo que sea necesario. Ser un buen corresponsable es responder al llamado de Cristo sabiendo que él proveerá.
