Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I am writing to share with you an update on the 2024 Lenten Collection. To date, we have received a total of \$88,176.18 from our parishes to be allocated to agencies serving our vulnerable populations. I want to thank you for your continued generosity. Truly our parishioners embody the righteous of Psalm 112: "They have distributed freely, they have given to the poor; their righteousness endures forever..." (Ps 112: 9). Our finance department has rounded the total to \$88,000 to make distribution easier. The remaining funds and any additional donations will be rolled over to the 2025 collection.

I also want to extend my thanks to the Lenten Committee, comprised of young parishioners from across the Archdiocese. They too have given generously, of their time and talents, in order to assist me with the distribution of the funds. The committee reconvened over the summer months to discuss current issues facing our local communities. Under the patronage of St. Martin de Porres and the promptings of the Holy Spirit, the committee discerned that food insecurity was the largest pressing need in the Archdiocese, as the rising cost of living continues to impact nearly everyone in our province. While fund distribution was heavily weighted towards this concern, pregnant mothers, disadvantaged youth, the unhoused, and victims of violence also weighed heavily on the hearts of the committee members. These additional community issues are represented by the agencies selected as recipients for donations in 2024.

When considering the great need of our communities, I'm reminded of Jesus' words: "for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." (Matt 25: 35-36). I invite all the faithful to view each Lenten Collection as a renewed opportunity to grow in awareness of the needs of our most vulnerable neighbours, to act with compassion towards their plight, and to give generously in order to better support the work of making our communities more welcoming to the oppressed, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow (Ex 22: 21-22, Is 1: 17).
