From the Pastor's Desk

I said it once before and I think it is worth repeating at this point. The sale of the raffle tickets for the Grand Prize is directly connected with the success of our festival. This is true for all parish festivals. So, I encourage you to help make our festival successful in this aspect by buying/selling your raffle tickets. Besides... who wouldn't take a chance to win \$5,000.00? Good luck.

The benefits from the festival are a great asset to our parish as well as our school. The funds generated from this event are only one part of the overall benefits. Working together, visiting with family and friends, enjoying a good time all build relationships. People gathering and working together for a good and common cause always builds up community. There is a twofold benefit, the building of relationships of our parish community and the necessary funds for our parish and school. Please plan on attending.

A thought which comes to mind from today's gospel is the idea of the *habit of prayer* found in St. Luke's account of Jesus teaching his disciples how to pray. The Disciples made their request during a relatively calm time. They observed Jesus at prayer and were curious about prayer, most notable his prayer. "Lord, teach us how to pray". Jesus responded with what we rightly call the "Lord's Prayer" or the "Our Father". The prayer is a reflection on his relationship with God, His Father. It is a prayer given to us that challenges and directs our relationship with God.

As mentioned, the request was made during a relatively calm time as opposed to a time of crisis. It is usually during an emergency or a crisis that many find themselves lost in the moment. Many do not even think about prayer apart from a spontaneous "Oh, my God!" Then when pressed further a need to pray arises but they find themselves at a loss about prayer. There is a need to turn to God, but what do I say apart from help me...

This tends to be true unless the individual had developed a relationship with God and a dialogue with God that we call a *habit of prayer*. It is usually during an emergency that we discover whether we have a relationship with God and the good *habit of prayer*. We rarely realize how a good habit of prayer can spontaneously help us in a crisis providing a firm foundation to deal with the situation. For good or for ill, our good habits or sadly our bad habits, surface during difficult times as well as during our unguarded moments.

For good or for ill, our habits say a great deal about ourselves. There are a couple of ways in which habits are developed. Our habits are formed voluntarily or involuntarily. Learning to play the piano is a deliberate choice. Part of that choice is to commit oneself to practice every day. It is in practicing that we create a habit. The individual commits to the study of music in theory and in the mechanics. But all the study and theory do little unless there are hours of actual practice by playing every day. Thus, playing the piano becomes "second nature" to the individual. Once created the individual can play spontaneously and with greater ease. This can give us an insight into our prayer life.

This is done deliberately. However, there are also habits that we acquire involuntarily. These habits tend to take root in our lives because of the environment we live in. Growing up in a

thoughtless and lazy environment has a way of forming thoughtless, lazy attitudes and actions for those living in such an environment. Living in an environment that values hard work and virtuous living instills these values to all in that environment. These habits, by merely being continuously exposed to them have a way of shaping and forming one's life. We can use the word "osmosis".

This is true for the development of both good and bad habits. Involuntarily we can say that some of these habits, both good and bad, are just the outcome of our surroundings. On the other hand, we voluntarily choose the habits we desire to have in our lives because we consider them to be good and helpful. When we consider the good habits, we desire in our lives we also must consider the environment in which we live. Will this environment help or hinder my desire to develop a good habit? Ironically it always seems that the development of a good habit takes serious work since bad habits seem to develop with no effort at all.

Without discussing how our habits manifest themselves in the ordinary moments of our lives let me get to my point. When I mentioned that Jesus taught his disciples how to pray during a relatively calm time, this is the time in which one consciously sets about creating a habit. It is during a relatively calm time that good habits are decided upon and can be developed. A calm period provides the opportunity to have clarity with all things being equal. With a good habit of prayer, we are then able to pray spontaneously. We will know where to turn and how to pray. Many things happen in the fog of an emergency or a crisis. There is no real time to learn to pray or even to understand that it is the right and important.

When Jesus teaches his disciples to pray, he gives them a prayer. During a time of calm the prayer Jesus gives us sounds nice and has some pious devout statements. However, it is only in a time of crisis we begin to discover how important those elements of the "Lord's Prayer" truly are. These elements of the Lord's Prayer remind us of our proper place and relationship with God. The Prayer is necessary for our focus and the faith we need in difficult times. The prayer is taught by Jesus therefore we consider it necessary for our lives.

We know the Lord's Prayer by heart. Hopefully it is "second nature" to us. We have habitually repeated it over and over. It is so automatic that we pray it unconsciously. It would do us well to occasionally give a slow, thoughtful praying of the Lord's Prayer. The continuous praying the "Our Father" consciously or not, has in fact shapes our lives on a deeper level. This is all the grace of God. The "Our Father" provides the context or environment in which our lives are continually being formed. The praying of the "Our Father" is a good habit that will spontaneously surface at a time when we need it most.

In a time when we need it most, the "Our Father" reveals important element that we need as a people of faith. With an extended reflection on all the elements of the prayer we are made aware of who we are and where to turn: we are beloved children of God who turn to "Our Father". We acknowledge and praise God's greatness and gracious fatherly care. We are his beloved children. We know that God in his wisdom knows exactly what we need daily. We reaffirm God mercy and forgiveness. We acknowledge that as his children we need to do the same for others. Lastly, we know that we seek his divine protection from all that will tempt and harm us. In times of crisis or emergency we spontaneously renew our faith in God.

Jesus teaches his followers this prayer. Therefore, it is the most important prayer for us. We pray it often. We are creatures of habit. Let us make this prayer the foundation for our lives as a good *habit of prayer*.

The EdChoice Scholarship application period has been reopened until the end of July and our parish school, Bishop Fenwick K-8, accepts these state scholarships. This is a tuition scholarship of up to \$4650 through 8th grade and \$6000 through 12th. **If your child attended 8th grade at Zanesville Middle School last year, they are eligible to apply for Bishop Rosecrans High School. New families moving into the area whose children would be assigned to the schools listed below, are also eligible to apply.** This is **NOT** a need-based scholarship, so financials are not necessary.
