PARISH PURCHASE OF ABANDONED ROADS

Saint Anthony Church is proceeding to purchase Pope Street and the abandoned section of Angell Road from Woodward Road to Benjamin Drive. The Town Council formally abandoned them on April 5, 2022. Two appraisals were obtained by the Town of North Providence and Mayor Lombardi has agreed to settle on the lower one for \$102,000. Formal permission was sought from the Diocese of Providence and the land will shortly be purchased from parish funds. Already over \$70,000 has been spent cutting trees on the northern part of the property, clearing land and installing necessary drainage. More will be spent to put a gate on the top of Benjamin Drive and Angell Road and install a binder coat of asphalt for the additional parking area that was opened up. In the spring a capital campaign will be conducted once the cost of repaving the entire parking lot, including the former roads is determined. The cost will include much needed landscaping around the entire church property. The upper part of the church land around the cell tower is designated for a prayer garden that had been announced last year and will be constructed when the parking lot is completed. For all those parishioners who have been generous in donating for memorial bricks and tiles please know that these will be incorporated in the design of the prayer garden where they will be more visible than originally planned. Now that the purchase will soon be completed the Town of North Providence can commence with the process of notification of the road closure according to town ordinances. Thank you for your patience as it has been a long process.

HURRICANE IAN DISASTER RELIEF - SPECIAL SECOND COLLECTION OCTOBER 15TH AND 16TH

Hurricane Ian left a path of destruction in southwest Florida, trapping people in homes, flooding streets and buildings, and knocking out power across the region. The storm is one of the strongest hurricanes to ever hit the United States. As requested by Bishop Thomas J. Tobin, our tri parish community will be taking up a special second collection for Hurricane Ian Disaster Relief on the weekend of October 15th and 16th. Donations may also be dropped off at the parish office, **by October 21st**. Your generosity will directly support the response efforts of Catholic Charities agencies on the ground providing emergency aid including water, food, shelter, medical care and long-term recovery and humanitarian needs.

HOLYLAND 2023 PILGRIMAGE

Plans are set for an upcoming pilgrimage to the Holy Land beginning on March 22, 2023 through March 30, 2023 with Father Ed and Father Stephano accompanying the group. The price is \$3,749 per person (double occupancy). Please note that the weather in Israel is in the 60s at that time of year. The trip will conclude on the Wednesday before Palm Sunday and serve as a spiritual preparation for Holy Week 2023. 

NEW MINISTRY AT SAINT EDWARD CHURCH SATURDAY SOUP KITCHEN FOR THE HUNGRY

We are happy to announce the inauguration of a new ministry at Saint Edward Church beginning next month. Saint Edward Kitchen will serve lunches on the second and fourth Saturdays of the month in the Church basement. It has been newly air-conditioned for the comfort of the clients as well as an alternative location for weekend Masses when the upstairs church is too hot. Donations for this new ministry have been made in memory of the late Gayle Giammarco to whom the church kitchen will be dedicated and who was a driving inspiration to begin this project two years ago. Covid-19 had delayed the opening but the time is ripe now because of the growing number of families served by the Saint Edward Food & Wellness Center. Saturday was the day chosen because there is no school and an ideal day for families to come for a meal and the church is within walking distance to many people who would benefit from a free meal. Lunches will be served from 12 noon to 1PM. More information will follow.

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Want to make a person's spine shiver? Just mention either one of these words: "Covid 19" or "Monkey pox." The actual victims cannot be blamed for being scared. Viruses have compassionate feelings. So we too can be apprehensive about our own good health and the dire consequences of an attack. For instance, the period of forced isolation. The uncertainty of being done with the fight.

The equivalent of our current pandemic in biblical days was leprosy. Today that condition is more softly described as "Hansen's disease", but the affliction is still the same as ever. Modern medicine helps. But even with an array of cosmetics existing, leprosy is a major challenge to hide from the world.

From a spiritual perspective, we know that leprosy in the Bible can also be a stand-in for sin. That's a different virus. Hidden from microscopes but just as destructive to our souls. Sin fights a positive attitude; hates innocence; acts more controlling than a physical addiction.

The Gospel for today paints a picture of God's power and His desire to heal all who ask for it. In the First Reading, a man from the Gentile country of Syria wants to experience both. When he does, he credits Elisha. But Elisha refuses any tangible gift in order to drive home the point that God is the actual healer. So then Naaman asks if he can take some soil from Israel with him, believing for now the ancient conviction that the gods were territorial.

Centuries later, the Nazarene Prophet we know as Jesus heals another Gentile, this time a man from the despised land of Samaria. Leprosy was, then and now, a neutral germ obviously impartial as to who would contract it. All ten people in the story had been afflicted, but the hated Samaritan is the only one who returns to thank Jesus after he went through the prescribed ritual. Jesus wonders about the ten percent yield of gratitude. The lone returner even shouts out his praise of God and then kneels before Jesus. We learn about our obligation to be a grateful people. That's why this story is often read at Mass on our national Thanksgiving Day.

It's a truism that sin is leprosy of the soul. It disfigures us. It outdoes all the "power" of a cosmetic. Of course the outside world takes no notice of our spiritual state. We look the same as ever. But soon enough the symptoms appear. We start to exhibit a sudden cynicism about everything. Our smiles are rare. Our laughter is hollow. And we don't want to pray. It also comes through with our constant hunt for the distraction provided by drugs of all kinds.

No need to think there's no available cure. It's called in technical lingo "The Sacrament of Reconciliation." I can attest to its effectiveness. I experience a combination of relief and gratitude after I make a good confession. I believe that my soul is no longer repulsive to God.

One caution about a good confession: it must be thorough, and not like a certain college freshman's silly mistake. You see, he went to the dorm laundry with his dirty clothes bundled into an old sweatshirt. But he was so embarrassed by how dirty his clothes were that he never opened the bundle. He merely pushed it into a washing machine. When the machine stopped, he just pushed the bundle into a dryer. Finally, he took the still unopened bundle back to his room. He discovered, of course, that the clothes had gotten wet and then dry, but not clean.

Our loving God says, "Don't keep your sins in a safe little bundle when you come to Me. I want to do a thorough cleansing in your life—all the dirty laundry, that is. Only then will you be completely free, especially from fear."

God love you and give you His peace.
