


# LENTEN LITURGY & PRACTICES

Abstaining from Meat & Fasting: Many dieticians and physicians of late are recommending the salutary benefits of periodic fasting. Interestingly, we Catholics have long employed the discipline of fasting, not only for the health of the body but even more for the health of the mind and soul.

Fasting refers to the consumption of only one full meal in a given day; on that same day, one is also allowed to partake in two smaller meals that don't together add up to a full meal. We may fast on any day we choose as a spiritual offering but all Catholics who are 59 years old or younger must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

All Catholics 14 years and older are asked to abstain from meat every Friday of the year. On all Fridays outside of Lent, abstinence from meat may be substituted with a different act of penance or work of charity, e.g., I attend a wedding banquet on a Friday in October and, out of politeness and festivity, I eat the steak on my plate; in exchange, I give up desserts that day or I say an additional rosary for the newly-married couple, etc. However, it is not permitted to commute or exchange the abstention from meat on the Fridays of Lent. On Ash Wednesday and on all of the Fridays of Lent, Catholics who are 14 years and older must abstain from the consumption of meat.

**Less Instruments:** The characteristic austerity and conversion associated with Lent are also reflected in the liturgical changes and directives during these forty days. For example, the Roman Missal reads: "During Lent ... the use of musical instruments is allowed only so as to support the singing. Nevertheless, Laetare Sunday (the Fourth Sunday of Lent), Solemnities (e.g., St. Joseph, Annunciation, etc.), and Feasts are exceptions to this rule" (#4). You will encounter less musical accompaniment during these forty days to emphasize the simplicity of Lent. This doesn't mean we'll do away with music or singing altogether: The liturgy is always meant to be beautiful and inspiring and the human voice, the greatest instrument, will continue to carry us upon soaring melodies. During Lent we limit the use of the organ and other instruments—whenever reasonably possible—in all of our liturgies in the church, including weddings and funerals.



Omitted Words & Songs: With the exception of Solemnities and Feasts, we omit the Gloria hymn—whether chanted or spoken—at Masses during Lent. Because the word "alleluia" is associated with Easter joy, we also refrain from saying "alleluia" at Masses and even in conversation and prayer during these forty days. Both the Gloria and the Alleluia will return in their splendor during the Easter Vigil.

Less Flowers: In relation to floral flourishes, the Roman Missal also reads: "During Lent, it is not permitted to decorate the altar with flowers... Nevertheless, Laetare Sunday (the Fourth Sunday of Lent), Solemnities (e.g., St. Joseph, Annunciation, etc.), and Feasts are exceptions to this rule" (#4). This is why you may have noticed the sudden absence of the flowers next to the tabernacle. The church will be filled with lilies and beautiful flowers come Easter but until then the entire sanctuary is left bare. This also means that, as much as possible, we refrain from having flowers in the sanctuary for weddings and funerals that occur in the church during this season.

# LENTEN LITURGY & PRACTICES

Mystery of Faith: We use a different option for the Mystery of Faith in our Lenten liturgies to highlight the theme of conversion. The Mysterium Fidei, as it is known in Latin, was added to our Mass after the reforms of Vatican II. It is a part of the Mass that is exclusively said or sung by you, the people. Sometimes we priests start this prayer or say it with you to lend support but it is actually one of your special moments in the Mass. It occurs immediately after the consecration of the wine into Christ's Blood. The priest announces, "The mystery of faith," and then you, the laity, respond with a proclamation.

There are three options for the Mystery of Faith. The first form and the one most commonly used reads:

We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

This particular formulation is an example of the Kerygma. Kerygma comes from the Greek and is used in the New Testament to refer to "preaching" (see Luke 4:18-19, Romans 10:14, Matthew 3:1). More specifically, it means "to cry or proclaim as a herald." In this brief sentence, you, the Mystical Body of Christ, declare the essential and most important content of our Faith, namely: Jesus died for us, rose for us, and will come again. These truths are the heart of the Good News and the essence of evangelization.

At all Masses during Lent, however, we will use another option:

Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection, you have set us free.

This version of the Mystery of Faith reflects the qualities of conversion and personal faith so characteristic of Lent. Lent is a time for reprioritizing. It calls us back to our Baptism, and to every episode since our Baptism in which we have given our lives to Jesus and encountered His grace and love. Notice the use of the imperative in this declaration; we are addressing the Lord directly: "Save us, Savior of the world." We are no longer just talking about the Lord but we are talking to the Lord. What a crucial difference in our approach and stance toward God and the Mass! Moreover, this simple statement inspires us to consider salvation and its concurrent freedom. We can ask ourselves: "Just how does Jesus' death and Resurrection free me? Where have I felt freedom in Christ? What does it mean to be saved?"

The various proclamations of the Mystery of Faith are both simple and brief and, as a result, can sometimes be neglected or taken for granted. We invite you to take hold of this special part of the Mass—which is meant to be your own—and to declare or sing these various statements with fervor, faith, and love.

**Greek & Latin:** Lastly, as we do in Advent, we utilize the Greek and Latin versions of the Lord, Have Mercy (Kyrie) and Lamb of God (Agnus Dei) respectively, during all Lenten Masses. To assist you, prayer cards with these words and melodies may be found in the book holders in your pews.

Lord, Who throughout these forty days,
For us did fast and pray,
Teach us with You to mourn our sins,
And close by You to stay.



# Be the Light!-Meet Mrs. Keenan

The classroom symbol sets the tone for First grade students in Mrs. Keenan's classroom. Students equate good behavior with being the light of Jesus in everyday life. As Jesus is the light for them, they strive to be a light for others. Not only do students work to model Jesus every day to build their faith life, they also have an example in Mrs. Keenan. Beyond praying together and sharing intentions, Mrs. Keenan makes her faith life an example by sharing her personal stories and experiences of faith. In doing this she gives witness to her students.

In this first grade room learning is hands on and FUN! Students love literacy stations, using technology, math manipulatives and DEAR time. Drop Everything And Read is a fun way to share a love for reading and community. On Friday the student helper for the week brings a snack to share and DEAR time turns into a 'read and feed!'

Another favorite activity of the week is new this year. Students are participating in scripture based type of prayer called S.O.A.P. Scripture Observation Application Prayer is a younger version of the Lectio Divina used by our staff and 8<sup>th</sup> graders for group prayer. Mrs. Keenan says, "The kids have really enjoyed this and so have I. It has provided great connection for students, their faith, religious education and knowledge of the Bible." Students routinely refer to previous Bible stories they remember and Mrs. Keenan can easily use the process and prayer to reinforce how to 'Be the Light.'

Technology is an ever changing part of education. Mrs. Keenan has really embraced the use of technology for her students and families. Students use iPads in stations for a variety of subjects. There is a school to home connection as well. The application 'SeeSaw' allows Mrs. Keenan to easily upload samples of student work and assessment pieces for parents to view. This allows parents a peek into the school lives of their kids.
