

# From Fr. Cook

**Masks:** You might notice something different about Fr. Boyd and me of late. No, we're not boycotting "No Shave November." Nearby Methodist Hospital calls on us Christ the King priests almost daily to visit with Catholic patients who live outside of the metro area, have no affiliation with a parish in town, or are in a state of emergency. For some time Fr. Boyd and I have been briefly administering sacraments to the patients, including those with Covid. We've used the gowns, gloves, face shields, masks, etc., and even shower upon returning home.

Because of the rising cases of Covid infections and in anticipation of the corresponding increase in our priestly visits to the hospital, the Methodist administration recently implemented new measures to better safeguard us priests and, by extension, our congregations, with whom we interact. Fr. Boyd and I were fitted for n95 masks this past Wednesday and we have to be cleanly shaven to don them properly.

I share all of this with you not only as a peek into our priestly life but also to remind everyone of the current city ordinance to wear masks indoors at public functions. While one does not have to wear the mask if he or she can, at all times, keep full social distance from others, e.g., sitting in the pew, I want to encourage everyone who comes to Mass to wear masks throughout the service. I say this on behalf of those who are vulnerable and who are gradually coming back to Mass.

Even if you are 6 feet away from someone, the other person in the nearby pew may be very nervous about attending the liturgy in public. For their sake, to encourage more people to come back to Mass and to feel safe when doing so, to keep our school community healthy and our school open, and to help stop the spread of this new illness, I encourage everyone to

wear masks during Mass.

I am not imposing anything more than what the current civic law asks of us. I know that some have reasons why they cannot wear masks and others may choose not to wear masks where the letter of the law and the situation allows. I get it. I only broach this so that all of us might think of others and their perspective, which may be different than our own. The culture has fostered so much fear around this illness and we want people back in church. Can we make a sacrifice, even of legitimate things, to help ease the transition for others as they move from anxiety to trust? Just something to think about.

## Looking Ahead—Christmas Masses:

Speaking of Covid's affect on our experience of Mass, we are already looking ahead to Christmas scenarios. I figure if Walmart can already be playing Christmas songs—I heard *Let it Snow* playing there earlier this week—then it isn't too soon to be contemplating crowds and Masses for Christmas in a Covid world.

Every Christmas we offer 5 Masses at Christ the King: One on Christmas Eve and four on Christmas day. With the size of our church and the varying size of crowds, these Masses have always covered our needs in normal years. Even the Mass with our greatest attendance, the 5 p.m. Mass on Christmas Eve, comfortably holds the thousand people that attend it. With coronavirus concerns, however, we cannot accommodate such an enormous crowd and preserve social distancing.

# From Fr. Cook

I have heard of other churches planning to have sign-up lists for Christmas Mass, giving away tickets for specific services, or assigning people to different liturgies by last name. I do not believe any of these will work satisfactorily here. I appreciate such ideas but I don't want anyone who comes to our Mass to be turned away just because they failed to get the message or an advance ticket. Denying a family admission because we're at capacity reminds me too closely of Joseph and Mary and the closed inns they encountered. Let's be honest, many people who come to Christmas Masses may not read the bulletin or visit the website or come to Mass regularly. Even families who are informed about parish news may not be able to plan well ahead of time: How many of their college kids or their relatives will be able to come home and what will be the statistics of spread and any government restrictions of movement. There are just so many variables.

I think the only way to attend to this unprecedented state of affairs is with a three-pronged approach. Firstly, please consider coming to Mass for Christmas. Though there is a current dispensation from Mass that will probably last at least until the end of this year, I invite all non-vulnerable people to make the effort. Christ is worth it and you're worth it! I know Christ will uplift you and give you hope and joy and a taste of normality. For those who are vulnerable and need to stay home, we will film and broadcast our Christmas Mass. We'll also provide a helpful handout for all families that will offer prayers, Scripture, and easy, creative, interactive ways to celebrate Christmas in the home.

Secondly, with permission of the Archbishop, we are adding a one-time, additional Christmas Eve Mass at 3 p.m. Hopefully this new Mass and unique time will attract many from the usual 5 p.m. Christmas Eve

crowd and split the numbers between these two vigil Masses.

The third element is an invitation for those who normally participate in the 5 p.m. Christmas Eve Mass to consider attending, just this year, a Mass on Dec. 25th itself. There is always room for more at any of these other Masses, especially at the 12 midnight and 12 noon Masses on Christmas Day. There is also the additional 3 p.m. Vigil Mass on Dec. 24 this year.

We hope you will come and consider an alternate Mass time. It will work out for everyone and we can celebrate the Light of the World in a time of winter darkness.



# 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Readings



## **FIRST READING (PRV 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31)**

When one finds a worthy wife, her value is far beyond pearls. Her husband, entrusting his heart to her, has an unfailing prize. She brings him good, and not evil, all the days of her life. She obtains wool and flax and works with loving hands.

She puts her hands to the distaff, and her fingers ply the spindle. She reaches out her hands to the poor, and extends her arms to the needy. Charm is deceptive and beauty fleeting; the woman who fears the LORD is to be praised. Give her a reward for her labors, and let her works praise her at the city gates.

## **RESPONSORIAL PSALM (128:1-2, 3, 4-5)**

**R. (cf. 1a) Blessed are those who fear the Lord.**

## **GOSPEL (MT 25:14-30)**

And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."



This hour includes the recitation of the Rosary and availability of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.




## Youth Group
