

## Catholic high school admissions process at a glance

#### High school application process for parents and guardians of 7th graders (2020-2021)

- 1. On Wednesday, Dec. 9, the Admissions Application will be posted online (https://nolacatholicschools.org/secondaryadmissions). Only one application is permitted per student.
- 2. On the last line of this application form, identify the Selected High School your child hopes to attend for the 2021-22 school year. Student may select only ONE high school.
- 3. Parental/Guardian

4. Return completed form to Catholic elementary school principal by Friday, Dec. 11. The Catholic elementary schools will send the application forms and the student records to the Selected High School by Tuesday, Dec. 15.

5. Students in non-Catholic elementary schools are required to send forms and student records by Tuesday, Dec.

6. Students are required to attend Testing Day at the Selected High School on Saturday, Jan. 9, 2021. A \$30 one-time, non-refundable, non-transferable application fee will be collected from each student upon arrival at the high school. sideration, results of testing administered on this day may be used not only to determine high school placement, but also to determine admission.

7. In the event that a student is not going to be accepted, the parent/guardian of the student will be notified by the high school as soon as the determination is made. At that point, the parent/guardian may pick up the original application from the school and bring it to another school to apply there. If the folder is not picked up, it will be turned in to the Department of Catholic Education and

accepted students will be forwarded by the high schools to the Department of Catholic Education and Faith Formation. Unless otherwise indicated, all high schools will have the opportunity to review the folders at OCS.

9. Non-accepted students may receive invitations to apply from schools that have reviewed those folders. It is not a guarantee of acceptance. It just notes that the student may be a good fit at that school.

10. Acceptance notifications will take place on Feb. 26, 2021.



ing, must never stop; the mind must keep flexible in order to lose nothing..."

Guided by this insight, the Academy of the Sacred Heart prepares young women as persons of deep faith and transformational leaders. Remote learning was stressful; still, we knew that, as always, the administration and teachers were there to support us. This global pandemic that sent us away from the school we love was a reminder, not only of

what Mount Carmel Academy (MCA) is capable of accomplishing in times of difficulty but also that the character of the school always has been one that fights for its students and has their best interests in mind.

The empathy and preparedness we experienced during remote learning was nothing new to us: Mount Carmel is far beyond prepared not only in caring for its staff and students but also in its academics and spirituality. MCA has always prioritized the needs of its students and offers the resources of a small school, despite its large student population. With an average class size of nine, we have the ability to get the help needed in order to thrive.

MCA also provides superior technology to all faculty and students and teaches us how to use it; MacBooks and technology training are a priority. Our curriculum has been transformed by the faculty's knowledge of technology and the incorporation of cuttingedge tools like zSpace, which utilizes virtual and augmented reality for STEM classes. Our Design Cycle Experiences, or DCEs, challenge us to creatively solve large- and small-scale

problems by working through a design process. Through the students' abilities to creatively and meaningfully use all of the technological resources that MCA offers, we are able to more efficiently learn our curriculum, both through in-person classes and during remote learning.

Just as we are prepared to encounter unique challenges academically, we are prepared spiritually through learning the importance of daily prayer, with intentions spanning the personal needs of the Carmel community and those of the world. Students understand the value of spiritual J.O.Y. – finding it as the Carmelites did in the little ways but also in serving "Jesus, Others and Yourself."

Mass is celebrated monthly schoolwide and weekly for anyone who would like to attend. Another opportunity to normalize talking about our faith, the stresses of high school and how we can better relate to those around us is the "Come, Lord Jesus" prayer group for spiritual reflection. MCA teaches us that God is the one constant in our lives and that he will take care of us.

That same message of God's love and protection, which radi-


ates throughout MCA, is needed most during this time of crisis; we students recognized God's love when, after 160 days apart, our entire school community was able to gather on campus again this August. As a senior, I have seen the administration's compassion as it seeks diligently to give us the experiences that we have looked forward to. The administration proves, time and again, that it will provide everything it can – spiritually, academically and even remotely.

As I think about what "last" experiences we will be able to have, I remind myself that every person at MCA cares immensely for us and has always given us everything we have dreamed of and more.

Robert McKee once said, "True character is revealed in the choices a human being makes under pressure." Throughout this time of immense pressure, Mount Carmel's true character – a character of perseverance, selflessness and faith in God – is one that I have seen, known and loved since the first day I arrived on campus.

That model of character has shaped me into the woman I am today. As we move forward

munity service hours, many in addition to the students' service requirements, highlighting a common interest in serving one's local and global communities.

Dominican's STREAM(tm) initiative, marking its eighth year, continues Dominican's unique role in the formation of students into believing thinkers and thinking believers, exploring the relationship between faith and reason by integrating Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts and Math. Faculty, staff and administration are engaged in exploring and discussing academic disciplines, and how faith informs reason.

The Gayle and Tom Ben-

son Science and Technology Complex features the Erminia Wadsworth|Azby Fund Technology Center, where Microsoft Teams connects faculty and students beyond the classrooms. The Disputatio Room is dedicated for students, faculty, alumnae, visiting educators and professionals across disciplines who come together for in-depth discussions through the light of faith.

As BEST (Bioscience Enrichment for Students and Teachers) Science! participants, students conduct experiments ranging from chromosome analysis to gel electrophoresis. The SynDaver(tm), a sophisticated full-body surgical simulator, brings another learning dimension to human anatomy classes. Dominican was the first high school in the nation to acquire it. Students earn college credits

through dual enrollments in humanities and science. An engineering curriculum offers concepts and equations in several engineering fields. This fall, Dominican became the first Catholic high school in the area to have dual enrollment for introduction to engineering with University of New Orleans.

Forty-plus student organizations give students several ways to expand their experience beyond the classroom. The fine arts department showcases student art, and musical production. Students earn regional and national honors in music, dance and cheer. A Louisiana High School Athletic Association (LHSAA) member. Dominican competes in basketball cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. Teams captured All-Academic and All-District honors.

A Dominican graduate is encouraged to be a woman of integrity who seeks "veritas." The Class of 2020 earned 391 scholarships and awards totaling more than \$11.5 million. ST. SCHOLASTICA ACADEMY, 122 S. Massachusetts St., Covington – Founded in 1903, St. Scholastica Academy (SSA) is the only all-girls, college-preparatory Catholic school on the northshore of Lake Pontchartrain for girls in grades 8-12. For more than 115 years, the school has educated young women throughout the area

on a foundation of Benedictine spirituality.

In the late 1960s, SSA became an archdiocesan high school, and the Benedictine charism of balance in prayer, work, study and community continued to thrive, as it does to this day. SSA celebrates 117 years of a tradition where students are proud of the St. Scholastica heritage, which embraces the present and prepares them to take leadership roles in the future.

St. Scholastica Academy is accredited by Cognia (advancEd) and currently serves approximately 500 young women. SSA's 38 innovative and enthusiastic faculty members actively engage students in the learning process.

Now is an exciting time to be a part of St. Scholastica Academy. Angelus Hall, the newest of our campus landmarks, was blessed and dedicated in October 2019. Angelus Hall is home to SSA's theology, science and math departments. It also houses our first TV production studio, where students broadcast weekly news from their own anchor desk. Angelus Hall joins Benedictine Hall in linking all of our theology and STEM disciplines.

The Academy offers integrated science and math programs, real-world learning opportunities. Advanced Placement courses, second-level STEM electives and dual-enrollment classes through LSU, SLU, Louisiana Tech and the University of Texas at Austin. In addition to our STEM classes, the Academy offers a number of electives in the creative arts such as studio art, digital media, ceramics, introduction to film and choir/ glee, as well as electives in law studies and creative writing.

SSA has continually been in

the forefront of technology. Students at the Academy utilize laptops as a tool for their learning process. The Creativity Center for Digital Media has enhanced the curriculum for visual arts, yearbook and film production using industrygrade software.

In addition to a rigorous academic program, SSA students are immersed in their Catholic faith through the study of Catholic beliefs and values. plex houses an all-weather track and softball and soccer fields. Last year, St. Scholastica won its ninth consecutive state title in swimming. The cross country and swim team were district and metro champions, respectively.

POPE JOHN PAUL II HIGH SCHOOL, 1901 Jaguar Drive, Slidell – Pope John Paul II High School (PJP) in eastern St. Tammany Parish is in its 40th anniversary year as a coeducational, college-preparatory school (grades 8-12) that provides a Catholic academic setting for young men and women through a standards-based educational curriculum infused with Catholic identity standards.

As a school dedicated to the pillars of academic excellence,

faith development and leadership, students are challenged to excel while growing in selfconfidence, self-worth and thoughtful inquiry.

The administration helps make Pope John Paul II's campus an environment for academic excellence. The school administrators are Douglas Triche, president/principal; Lise Bremond, assistant principal of academics: Kimberlie Kilroy, assistant principal of operations and personnel; and Fran Taylor, dean of students. They are complemented by an administrative team that includes Andrew Cowan, counselor; Calandra Corder, college guidance director; Richard Dieudonne, athletic director; Daniel Lacourrege, campus minister; Father Travis Clark, chaplain; Danny Clavier, development; Robin Mangano, advancement; Pam Lisotta, admissions; and Christian Blocker, technology.

A dedicated faculty and staff, more than half of whom possess master's degrees, foster a quality Catholic education. PJP's enthusiastic and involved Parent/Teacher and Men's clubs contribute to an active campus life that enhances

leadership and provides each student with numerous opportunities to stay active.

This summer the Executive Leadership Team put in place general procedures and guidelines that are followed while school is in session in the traditional school setting. In addition, three different schedules have been developed to adapt to the phased guidelines and requirements that the school must follow per local/state authority guidelines during the pandemic.

"My goal as president/principal is to empower the students, parents, faculty and staff to experience the fullness of life so that we can create our life on earth as it is in heaven," Triche said.

Ninety-eight percent of graduates from the Class of 2020 continued on to schools of higher learning or enlisted in the armed forces. PJP's college-prep curriculum exceeds all requirements for the Louisiana TOPS scholarship program.

A challenging honors curriculum also is available to students who qualify. Additionally, upperclassmen may choose electives from more than 50 virtual

course options. These classes extend dual-enrollment availability and Advanced Placement opportunities.

Faith development is an essential part of the Pope John Paul II school community. Leadership from a strong theology department helps the student body and staff form a Christ-centered community. In addition to a five-year theology curriculum, students live out their faith through a volunteer service program, dedicating 50 percent of their required service hours to their church parishes and the remainder to the local community and school. Students organize and facilitate school Masses and eucharistic prayer services.

A Praise and Worship team ensures students' daily access to the chapel for Mass, adoration and other liturgical worship.

Leadership opportunities are plentiful at Pope John Paul II. The small-school atmosphere allows students to assume leadership roles in a variety of extracurriculars. National Honor Society and National Junior Honor Society students provide tutoring, and the student council coordinates a busy calendar of activities for the entire student body.

A full range of athletics is offered, including a five-time state champion volleyball program, football, baseball, softball, boys and girls basketball, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country, soccer, powerlifting and track teams. Other extracurricular organizations include HOSA, media, math and history clubs.

band and choir, Student Ambassadors, drama, Sanctity of Life, liturgy team and more.

Technology at Pope John Paul II enhances the curriculum and students' educational experience. Every student is equipped with an iPad2 featuring Pages, Keynote and Mac-equivalent software. Students can access Google Classroom and thousands of educational apps and study aids. The campus features wireless network access. Every classroom is equipped with SMART, wide-screen Apple TV and the latest in presentation technology, allowing faculty to better integrate technology into their daily lesson plans.

Expect to see more from Pope John Paul II, based on an ongoing implementation of its strategic visioning process. School leaders have been working with architects on a facilities master plan that has the ability to transform the campus. With the expertise and guidance of Bernard Dumond, president and CEO of the consulting group Development Innovations 360, a steering committee has been formed to conduct a discovery feasibility study. Over the course of the next six months, the school will present its facilities master plan to the community for input and determining the level of support.

ST. CHARLES CATHOLIC. 100 Dominican Drive, LaPlace St. Charles Catholic High School (SCC), is the only Catholic, coeducational, collegepreparatory school in the St. John, St. Charles and St. James civil parishes. It is also the only school in the region to provide students with Apple devices in a 1:1 technology program. Teachers are also provided interactive panels, MacBook Pros and iPads for use in daily instruction. SCC knows consistency and is ready to meet all the needs of | and prayer. the students in any educational circumstances.

As the educational and spiritual leader of the River Parishes, SCC maintains a well-balanced curriculum, developing the total student - spiritually, academically, physically and socially. Maintaining its status as a technology leader in the River Parishes, SCC students utilize the many applications that Apple offers in order to enhance curriculum but also to enhance student access to extracurricular and spiritual formation.

SCC began the 2020-21 school year on a blended model, with half the student body on campus at a time on a rotating schedule. Two other modes of learning are also prepared, including the traditional campus mode and the fully remote mode. Teachers, parents and students have all been informed of the procedures and expectations that each model requires, and the technology given to each teacher and student allows for continuous learning throughout the year regardless of possible transitioning between modes of learning.


The Comet family represents more than 20 church parishes, and even in these various learning modes, spirituality remains at the forefront of SCC's culture and curriculum. Daily religion classes and prayer in all classes encourage the spiritual development of the students. Masses and liturgical services are held periodically, with schoolwide celebrations occurring once a month, virtually when necessary. St. Charles Catholic begins the school year with both faculty and grade-level retreats, honoring capacity guidelines and offering virtual options through which students can participate in retreat activities

The academic development of the student is accomplished through three programs of study: an honors program (including Advanced Placement courses in English, civics, American History, language and composition); an academic program; and a standard program. Students are assigned to the program that is best for them based on their individual academic abilities and on the results of the standard high school placement test. Various electives are offered to Comets, including digital design, code design, robotics, theater, studio art, medical terminology and

In the last four years, more than 80% of SCC graduates earned college scholarships, with the Class of 2020 earning more than \$12 million in scholarships. SCC's composite ACT score ranks above both the state and national averages, and the dual-enrollment program at SCC offers students an opportunity to earn high school and college credit simultaneously, with many students earning enough credits to equal a traditional full semester. More than 1,500 college credit hours have been earned during the past five years by SCC students through the dual-enrollment partnership with Southeastern Louisiana University.

The physical development of the student is maintained by a required two years of physical education. All students are encouraged to participate in the many interscholastic athletic programs offered at SCC, including baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track, dance team, cheerleading and volleyball. Last year, 93% of

**ST. MICHAEL SPECIAL SCHOOL**, 1522 Chippewa St., New Orleans – St. Michael Special School has an Upper School program that assists students, ages 16 to 21, with the transition to adulthood.

Students continue to progress in academics while further developing independence, life skills and proper work habits. Students attend weekly Mass and daily religion classes. In addition, classes are offered in the areas of reading/writing, mathematics, science, social studies, computer, community-based instruction, life skills, culinary science, visual art, industrial arts, health and physical education.

Class schedules are based

on individual student needs and elective choices. Skills fostered include: improving academic knowledge, using effective decision-making skills, engaging in positive interpersonal relationships, choosing and maintaining employment when applicable, participating in community activities and developing life skills, which foster independence.


Additional courses offered are the PAES (Practical Assessment Exploration System) Lab, a simulated work environment curriculum, and HiSET (High School Equivalency Test) Preparation.

Students taking part in the PAES Lab are trained in basic career, vocational and life skills. Student interest and competitiveness in specific areas are identified. Work assessment entails five areas: consumer/service, processing/production, construction/industrial, business/marketing and computer/technology. Students progress through various skill levels in the five areas of instruction.

The HiSet program (formerly referred to as the General Education Development or GED) is an instructional program designed for students who, while unable to earn a regular high school diploma, demonstrate the ability and motivation to address the skills required for a HiSET diploma. To be successful in the program, a student must have adequate academic abilities and be self-motivated. To be eligible for the HiSet program, a student must be 16 years of age or older and must attain a grade 4 equivalency level on a given achievement test in the five core areas of language arts/ reading, language arts/writing, mathematics, science and social studies.

The Upper School program also provides students the opportunity to participate in several extracurricular activities. Students join one of several clubs, which meet weekly during the school day. Intramural sports tournaments are offered off-campus throughout the year. Students may audition for the performing Bell Choir or Vocal Choir.

A partnership with local high schools offers inclusive extracurricular activities after school in our Buddy Program. Students wishing to participate in cheerleading perform several times a year and participate in minicheer clinics. Students have the opportunity to become Student Council officers. Elections are

ST. THÉRÈSE ACADEMY, 917 N. Atlanta Street in Metairie, is a K-12 school for exceptional learners. St. Thérèse Academy is led by Shannon Bland, head of school, who is a native of the New Orleans area with three decades of education experience. She has a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Loyola University New Orleans, a master's in educational administration from the University of Scranton; and a master's in dyslexia therapy from the University of Southern Mississippi. She also received her bachelor's degree from Loyola and is a graduate of the Academy of the Sacred Heart.

In its second year, St. Thérèse Academy opened with 135 students from kindergarten to 12th grade, adding more than 30 new families from the previous year. St. Thérèse has 20 teachers and a three-person administrative and office team. Class sizes cap at no more than 16 students for high school and 12 in the elementary classes. Each class gets between one

In addition to small class sizes, the school offers a variety of curricula and courses, including music therapy, Advanced Placement courses, online classes and sports such as track, bowling and gaming.

St. Thérèse is also one of the few Catholic schools in the area to offer Jump Start, a career and technical education program that allows students to earn certifications to pursue careers in various fields after they finish their high school classes.

Opened in 1962 by the Brothers of the Christian Schools, Archbishop Rummel High School continues to serve the students of the New Orleans metropolitan area and has an

alumni population of more than 13,000 members. Archbishop Rummel is proud of its association with the Lasallian network around the globe, covering more than 900 schools in over 80 countries.

With a rich history of alumni who are involved in every profession imaginable, the school establishes a standard for its current students to approach their lives following the traditions and morals set forth during their time at the school.

The addition of three preprofessional courses evidences the school's commitment to excellence. Engineering, BioMedical Studies, and Law programs are four-year courses that move the classroom into the realworld environment. Through alumni and numerous community networks, Archbishop Rummel High School students can experience the medical, engineering and law fields in practice.

ARCHBISHOP SHAW HIGH SCHOOL, 1000 Salesian Lane, Marrero – Archbishop Shaw High School is rapidly evolving – academically, spiritually and physically.

Archbishop Shaw has continued to increase its academic offerings in each of the past five years. This year, the Eagles have launched a forensic science class, which has attracted interest from many students as it is part of their evolution to embrace 21st-century learning. The college-style course goes beyond the textbook to require hands-on work in solving fictional crimes by studying and analyzing data.

Classes and labs like this are why Shaw's ACT scores are continuing to soar. The Eagles also have implemented an advanced film class, which helps run commercials, ads, films and promos at Shaw's new stadium. Shaw has been able to provide these

innovative classes by keeping a low student-to-faculty ratio (9:1).

As the Eagles are soaring academically, they also are embracing spiritual development. They are led by the Salesians of Don Bosco. Salesian Father Louis Molinelli is the president of Archbishop Shaw. The school currently has seven Salesians on campus, the most religious of any all-boys' school in the New Orleans area.

The Salesians have laid the foundation at Archbishop Shaw since 1962 with the focus on developing the entire man – spiritually, physically and emotionally. The Salesians follow the teachings of Don Bosco, implementing reason, religion and loving kindness through the Preventive System.

Don Bosco believed it was extremely important to develop the whole person, which is exactly what the Eagles are doing on the West Bank.

Shaw alumni describe their alma mater as the place where a boy is transformed into a man. Archbishop Shaw puts great effort into developing both character and leadership traits that translate to the next state of life.

Character and leadership are developed in multiple ways. Dr. Mark Williams 785, principal, understands the vast importance that co-curricular activities serve in a young man's life. He is constantly explaining to students the importance of getting involved in different activities. Shaw currently offers an array of co-curricular activities. including band, football, baseball, basketball, lacrosse, soccer, wrestling, chess, Culture Club, Dead Theologians Society, peer ministry, student government, bass fishing and many more.

The school has worked with the Eagles Athletics Facilities L3C to construct a 2,500-seat multipurpose facility on Shaw's 72-acre campus. The facility is meant to serve the entire West Bank community. The facility has been a blessing to the school as a state-of-the-art facility used for both academics and athletics

The upgraded facility has portable lights, making it usable for night-time athletic events, with the goal of bringing the community together. Once the \$2.5 million facility is finished, the money raised will go directly back to the school to offset the cost of Catholic education on the West Bank.

Archbishop Shaw has even joined forces with Academy of

Our Lady as the swim team and Theatre Club are coeducational programs. Shaw has vowed to be an anchor to the West Bank community, continuing to offer academic scholarships to the brightest students on the West Bank. Funds from its "Excelsior Scholarship" are designated for students scoring in the 90th percentile who currently attend West Bank parochial schools.

Archbishop Shaw is committed to funding a \$9,000 tuition reduction for first-year students who achieve these scores and demonstrate Excelsior character.

BROTHER MARTIN HIGH SCHOOL, 4401 Elysian Fields Ave., New Orleans – Brother Martin High School, located in the Gentilly/Lakefront area of New Orleans, is a private Catholic school offering a college-preparatory curriculum for young men in grades 8 through 12.

The Brothers of the Sacred Heart, founded in Lyon, France, in 1821, arrived in New Orleans in 1869 and opened St. Aloysius High School. In 1954, the Brothers established Cor Jesu High School, and in 1969, on the 100th anniversary of the brothers' arrival in New Orleans, these schools were consolidated as Brother Martin High School.

The school is named after Brother of the Sacred Heart Brother Martin Hernandez in honor of his service to the youth of New Orleans. In 1869, the Brothers' school attracted young men from New Orleans neighborhoods; currently, Brother Martin continues to expand, attracting a diverse population of students from the entire Greater New Orleans area, including the West Bank, the Northshore, St. Bernard the River Parishes and more.

"At Brother Martin High School, our faculty and students work together as a community united by the power of the Sacred Heart of Jesus," said principal Ryan Gallagher '00. "With an emphasis on religious values, academic excellence, personal attention and friendly discipline, we believe our students will learn to use their gifts, granted by God, to make our school and our community a better place."

The integration of faith and life is nurtured in students through an array of experiences, including retreats and service-learning programs, school-wide liturgies and communal celebrations of the sacrament of reconciliation. More than 100 faculty members, including six

full-time guidance counselors and a formation director, serve with personal attention our ever-growing student body during their eight-period schedules. The AP honors programs and dual-enrollment classes allow students to earn college credits in English, math and social science courses. ACT and PSAT test preparation is held weekly for all students. A variety of state-of-the-art technology allows students to engage in oncampus and remote learning, while using personal electronic devices and taking advantage of the school's advanced wireless network.



# Are you ready for some prep football in New Orleans?

There will be a high school football season, and games can be played in New Orleans stadiums.

The director of the city of New Orleans' Health Department, Dr. Jennifer Avegno, announced at a press conference Sept. 21 that the mayor's office has authorized high school football teams in Orleans Parish to begin preparations for the season. In addition, playgrounds will also be allowed to reopen.

Avegno said Mayor LaToya Cantrell has given approval for contact sports to take place at the city's stadiums and schools' gymnasiums if strict, comprehensive protocols for all students, coaches and staff are practiced to prevent the spread of coronavirus.

Under a Gov. John Bel Edwards decree, high schools in other parts of Louisiana had been permitted by the LHSAA to hold full-contact football practices for the previous two weeks in advance of a shortened, eight-week football season that begins Oct. 1-3.

#### City's case rate has fallen

Cantrell did not apply those protocols to schools within Orleans Parish because the number of COVID-19 cases had not fallen to a level she felt was safe. Thus, the city remained in Phase 2 of the recovery.

That changed on Monday with Avegno's noon an-

"Understanding the social (and) emotional benefits that athletics provide, we really wanted to do our due diligence to make sure we could make this safe for everyone." Avegno said. "We have worked alongside public health experts, with the medical experts at the state and those with the LHSAA, and we created a task force of local high school leaders, coaches and (representatives of) facilities to as-

semble a comprehensive set of protocols to reduce risk."

The LHSAA has released a list of regulations that are statewide, not just applicable to New Orleans. They include student and coach screening protocols and restrictions on play; strict regulations for on-field activities, including masking, distancing, limiting personnel, benches, locker rooms and team transportation; strict sanitizing and hygiene practices; and isolation

and quarantine protocols for athletes and their contacts. Those guidelines mirror those of the federal Centers for Disease Control.

"It's very important to us to keep our athletes and their families safe," Avegno said.

There also is an athlete's code of conduct to help limit high-risk behavior off the field, and there is access to testing.

"It is our hope that these restrictions help prevent the spread of COVID-19 among our student athletes, and most importantly, the people that care for them and the family members they go home to,' she said.

#### LHSAA protocols are strict

In accordance with the LHSAA guidelines for conducting athletic events in a safe environment, spectators will be limited. Stadiums will be restricted to 25% of normal occupancy or 250 individuals, whichever is fewer.

For volleyball matches, indoor gymnasiums will also be limited to 25% of permitted occupancy or 100 individuals, whichever is fewer.

LHSAA executive director Eddie Bonine said working media does not count against the limited number of attendees. Avegno warned that everyone attending a game must wear a mask and socially distance. LHSAA guidelines cover protocols that pertain to the fall sports of football, volleyball, cross country, swimming and cheerleading.

Last week, the Jefferson Parish Public School Board approved requests by some Orleans Parish public and Catholic schools to move their home games to 8,000-seat stadiums at East Jefferson and West Jefferson high schools.

But, with the restrictions lifted in Orleans Parish, games may be played at City Park's Tad Gormley Stadium (24,500 capacity) and Pan American Stadium (4,000).
