

**Justice Based on Mercy**

This Sunday's readings challenge us to adopt a radically different sense of justice, one based on mercy. • The First Reading recounts an episode from the life of David. David, chosen by God to succeed Saul, was anointed by Samuel as the next king. (Saul had sinned against the Lord, so the Lord rejected him.) This made Saul very jealous of David, to the point of often trying to kill him. To spare his own life, David fled. Then one night the tables were turned, and David came upon Saul and his men while they were sleeping. David could have easily killed Saul and ended it all, but he would not kill the Lord's anointed. He refused to do the evil that Saul wished to do to him. This shows us how we can respond to those who do us evil. We can *respond with love and forgiveness*, taking the wind out of the sails of their wrath. • The Responsorial reminds us that we have learned what mercy is from the way the Lord treats us. He is slow to anger and always forgiving. • The Alleluia Verse echoes the call to a new standard of conduct, based on love for our brothers and sisters. • Today's Gospel is known as the Gospel of mercy. In it Jesus calls us to base our actions on the call to mercy and true Christian love, not a soft and cuddly love but on a choice to serve others, including those who may hate or hurt us. It is not motivated by the return of love, but by the other person's need. We do not base our love and forgiveness on deserving, no more than God does with us. His mercy to us, we share with others. We try to be as generous as we can, and God supplies what we cannot give. This is His challenge to us, the life-long goal for which we aim.

**Living the Christian Life**

Our key Catholic beliefs center on faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. But Christianity is more than a set of beliefs; it is a way of living. Christian faith must result in a life of loving service, or it is an empty faith. Christian morality helps us discover how we should live as a result of our faith in God's Word, which has been revealed to us in Christ and in his Church. • Christian morality can be summed up in the word *responsibility*. There are two components to this term: *response* and *ability*. To what do we respond? Christian life is a response to God's freely given love and his gift of salvation offered to us through Christ. Christian morality comes to the forefront when people say yes to God, when they freely respond to his love. The essence of Christian morality is, simply, love. "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-39). • The second aspect of Christian morality is the ability to respond to God--the ability to love and say yes to God. This is also a gift, freely bestowed on us. It is part of what it means to be a human being. Human persons have basic dignity, which flows from their being created in God's image (with a soul). This implies that we can think and love and are in relationship to others in community. Our conscience aids us in a life directed toward God and other people. • Pope Saint John Paul II in his encyclical *The Splendor of Truth* wrote, "Christian morality consists in following Jesus Christ, in abandoning oneself to him, in letting oneself be transformed by his grace and renewed by his mercy, gifts which come to us in the living communion of his Church....The one who loves Christ keeps his commandments" (cf. John 14:15).

**Time to Return Your Palms**

Many of us keep the palms we received on Palm Sunday and display them behind a hanging crucifix. Now is the time to return the old, dried palms to the basket in the vestibule. The old palms will be burned and the ashes used on Ash Wednesday this year. The palms, which symbolized joy on Palm Sunday, now become symbols of the fact we are sorry for our sins. This reflects the joy of the people when Jesus first rode into Jerusalem, which turned to sorrow when he died on the Cross to save them from their sins.

**St. Vincent de Paul 2018 Year End Report**
