# The Challenge of Christianity

The First Reading is again from the Prophet Amos where he attacks the decadence of the rich. They only look out for

themselves, while failing to protect the defenseless ones. He assures them that their desire to be first will indeed be granted, they shall be the first to be exiled when Israel's punishment comes. • The Responsorial is a psalm of praise and thanksgiving to God, who is good, loving and generous, for He is the Refuge of those in need, the Justice for the defenseless. It is also a reminder to us that if we are faithful followers we will reach out to those in need. The measure of any society is how well it treats its most powerless. The measure of our Christianity is how much we act like Christ. • In the Second Reading, St. Paul again reminds us of the need to be consistent in our lives, in our commitment to the Lord through our Baptism and our participation in the Sacraments. The challenge is to live what we say we are. (Pope Saint John XXIII was once asked why there are so many atheists in the world, to which he replied that it was our fault because we often fail to be what we say we are. Likewise, Gandhi was asked what he thought of the teachings of Christ; he said they were wonderful, and that someone should try to live them.) If we live God's love then we shall one day meet Him in glory. • The Gospel presents the challenging story of Lazarus (not Martha & Mary's brother) and the rich man (whose purple garment was indicative of incredible wealth). We note that the rich man did nothing wrong to the poor man, he simply did not do the good he could have done. This lack of good action is called the sin of omission. Both die; Lazarus resides in the bosom of Abraham (a euphemism for heaven) and the rich man is in hell. In this story we see that the omission of charity is a serious offense against the One who is Charity itself. We are reminded that miraculous visions or utterances will not persuade us because Jesus' resurrection should be sufficient. Let us pray that we have the grace to live the challenge of our Christian

## First Friday Adoration: Fri., October 4

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament follows the 8:00 a.m. Mass and concludes with Benediction at 12(noon). Mass is celebrated immediately after Benediction. ● Join us and spend some time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. On First Fridays, parishioners are encouraged to include in their prayers, a prayer for an increase in vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. A special prayer for vocations is available in the church vestibule.

#### **What Does Conversion Involve?**

The words *conversion* and *repentance* are synonymous. In the gospel, when Jesus calls for his followers to convert and to embrace the gospel, he is talking about interior conversion, that is interior repentance. This interior conversion is first a gift from the Holy Spirit who gives us the grace to return to the Lord, to have the courage to begin anew. Interior conversion involves reorienting our lives, returning to God, rooting out sin in our lives, and hating the evil we have committed. It also involves deeply wanting to change our lives, firmly intending to change our lives, firmly intending to sin no more, and trusting fervently in God's infinite mercy and grace. A wonderful help for Christians to help reorient their lives is to look at Christ Jesus suffering on the cross for our sins. • Interior conversion manifests itself in external actions of penance. Scripture and Tradition have always stressed the importance of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving--three acts that express conversion in relation to self, to God, and to others.

#### Farmers Market at Mercy General Hospital

There is a new Farmers Market in the neighborhood. Every Friday, from 9:30 am to 1:00 pm, Mercy General Hospital sponsors a farmers market in the parking lot in front of the J Street entrance. Shoppers can purchase organic fruits and veggies, fresh baked bread, organic cheese, homemade salsa, tamales and more. This is an initiative of Mercy Hospital as a community service to support healthy food production and the farmers who grow it.

### **Rose Window Update**

Two weeks ago, the parish selected ARG -Conservation Services of San Francisco as the preservation/contractor to restore

the stained-glass window over the church's main entrance. The terra cotta frame, dating from the opening of the church in 1931, is especially in need of repair. The church entrance will remain usable during the project. The project is paid for through the Church Building Fund, which has this year alone also paid for the church's new boiler (cost: \$161,000) and the repair of the rectory tile roof (cost: \$73,000). The Church Building Fund was initially funded by the Parish share from the Diocesan ONE campaign, and by the sale of a duplex generously donated by a parishioner. These projects have depleted much of the Fund, and we as a Parish will need to replenish it for future projects. You are encouraged to consider making a special donation to the Fund.

### **Parish Safety Committee**

We have established a Safety Committee to identify security issues in and around the Church, Parish Hall, and Rectory. The committee has two workgroups: Medical Response and Disruptive Person. Over the summer each group has been meeting to identify risks and propose some response strategies. The Parish has undergone a vulnerability assessment of all the buildings, conducted by an independent consultant. We are awaiting the final report. • Watch the bulletin for periodic reports.
