

Planting Seeds of God's Kingdom

The First Reading speaks about God who rewards us for the good deeds we do for others in His name. Sometimes that reward comes now in this life; other times we are rewarded in the afterlife. Ultimately, the greatest reward is the chance to express our love and generosity. In this reading, a woman is very gracious to a man she recognized as a man of God. She never asked any favor of God or this prophet of His. In her offering of simple hospitality, she served the Lord. When the prophet inquired about her needs and discovered she had no children, he interceded for her on that unspoken need. Her faith and decency were rewarded. ● The Responsorial psalm is an act of trust in God's providence. It is a recognition that in Him alone we find our fulfillment, and apart from Him, we will never find peace. In totally trusting God, we become dedicated to serving Him and neighbor. We find our meaning for existence in this commitment. ● In the Second Reading we see two sides of choosing Jesus. The "positive" is placing our hope and trust in God; the "negative" is ending our trust in worldly things. We are to die to the world that cannot bring us the peace and joy we seek. In dying to our slavery to passion and sin, we say no to the things that keep us from what is truly important. We do this at Baptism and daily in all our decisions. This gives us the freedom to choose God and to totally place our hearts in Him. ● Today's Gospel combines the two themes in today's readings. In the First Reading we see that there is a price to pay in following Jesus, from sacrificing our comforts to sacrificing our view of reality. The second theme is God's reward for those who faithfully, lovingly serve Him. We will not all be missionaries, heroes or martyrs, but we can all be supportive of those in active ministry. We must never undervalue the importance of the small things done with great faith and love. They may not appear to be earthshaking, but we are quietly planting the seeds of God's kingdom.

Prayer of the Week

Let us pray. ● Father in heaven, the light of Jesus has scattered the darkness of hatred and sin. Called to that light we ask for your guidance. Form our lives in your truth, our

hearts in your love. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Church and the Kingdom of God

God's kingdom or reign, God's saving activity in human history which draws all people to the Triune God, is different from the Church. The Church includes only baptized members. Thus, the Kingdom of God is broader than the Church. The Kingdom of God extends to all people who are saved, from the time of Adam to the end of the world. But there is an intimate connection between the Church and the Kingdom of God. That connection is, simply, that the Church is Christ's reign already present in mystery (Vatican II, *Dogmatic Constitution on the Church*, 3). It is the seed and initial budding forth of the Kingdom of God here on earth..

Volunteers Needed

To protect parishioners from the coronavirus, the parish has adopted a number of safety measures. Many of those measures use volunteers. We have a need for ushers, greeters, sanitizer aides, and pew cleaners. None of these tasks require a special trip to church or a chunk of your time (For example, wiping down the pews after Mass takes approximately 15 minutes, depending upon how many pews were occupied. Every occupied pew, even if only one person sits in it, must be cleaned.). Change in Weekday Mass Schedule

After three weeks, it is apparent that the noon Mass on Monday through Friday does not have enough attendance to justify the volunteer efforts needed for every Mass. Therefore, the noon Mass Monday - Friday will be discontinued with the sole exception of the noon Mass on the First Friday of every month. That means no noon Mass this coming week on Monday - Thursday, but there will be a noon Mass of First Friday, July 3.

Sign up for Coming to Mass

Bishop Soto has asked each Parish to put in place a mechanism for contacting people who may have been exposed to Covid-19. In the unfortunate event that a parishioner comes down with the coronavirus there needs to be a way to 'contact trace' others who may have been exposed. For this reason and because seating restriction limit us to 90 persons per Mass, we are all asked, if possible, to sign up online each for weekday and weekend Masses via the Parish Website. On the Parish Home Page, just below "Resuming Public Mass," you will see Signup Sheets click here. (There are 70 slots for each Mass. At each Mass there will be 20 slots available for parishioners to just "walk up" to Mass.) Remember, **only 90 people per Mass!**

Staying Home During the Pandemic

Bishop Soto's Dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass, issued March 17, is still in full effect. That means that, even though Masses have now resumed in parishes, you are NOT required to attend, regardless of your age or health. Those who are sick, or are vulnerable due to age or infirmity, should definitely stay home, rather than risk their health by attending Mass in person. If anyone is healthy but simply uncomfortable around crowds, just stay home. ● Check the Parish website for the parish bulletin or call the Parish Office and we will happy to mail it to you.

Safety/Security Projects

Before the suspension of the public celebration of Mass due to the Covid-19 outbreak, the Parish Safety Committee studied the recommendations of the parish vulnerability assessment report conducted last year by the Central California Intelligence Center Critical Infrastructure Protection Unit. Our Safety Committee recommended that the Parish undertake three safety projects: (1) re-open the exterior church doors in the Pieta Chapel as an emergency exit only. The project requires a complete reconfiguration of the chapel interior and exterior improvements. (2) Install new iron fencing/gates between the church/parish hall and the medical building next door; replace parish hall exterior doors; pour a new concrete walkway for ADA access; and extend the fencing and gate to close off the main hall entrance. (3) Install new exterior church/rectory lighting along 39th Street. The Parish Pastoral Council and Parish Finance Council are in agreement that we should proceed with the projects. ● Funding will come from the Parish Building Fund at a total cost of approximately \$365,000. Jackson Construction has been hired to provide project supervision.

Parish Building Fund

The improvement projects are funded by the Parish Building Fund. That fund was established initially by a bequest from a very generous parishioner left the Parish a duplex with the understanding that it would be sold with sale proceeds going to establish the parish building fund. Subsequently, another parishioner, who asked to remain anonymous, has contributed very generously to the Fund. We are extremely grateful to these individuals, as well to all other donors to the Fund. Donations are donor-restricted and can only be used for church/parish hall/rectory projects. Please consider making a donation to the Building Fund. Our goal is to begin rebuilding the Fund.
