Fifth Sunday of Lent

Jesus' Death Gives Us Freedom

In the First Reading, the stage is set, God wants to create a new covenant with His people, despite their prior lack of fidelity.

The new covenant is more profound and internal, written on our hearts (not the center of affection, but the source of our intellect, our *minds*). In this way, our knowledge of the Lord's ways would be as natural to us as breathing. • The Responsorial Psalm 51 not only asks for forgiveness, but also asks God to recreate our heart. Sin is spiritual death,

so by sinning we choose death; only the Holy Spirit can give us back our life, His breath. The Holy Spirit imparts the knowledge of the Lord's ways and brings about our deliverance from sin and our conversion to the Lord's path. • In Old Testament Jewish terminology, perfect meant to become a priest. In today's Second Reading, St. Paul presents us with two meanings for perfect: trust and obedience to God and being priest. Jesus was not only our high priest and advocate with God, but also the Victim being offered for our sin. He both offers and is the of-

fering. He is fully perfect. • In today's Gospel the word *glorify* is redefined. It was normally understood to indicate power or magnificence. Here it acquires a new meaning: an outpouring of God's love for us. This outpouring is most manifest by Jesus' death on the cross. The crucifixion is the Sacrament: the visible sign of the invisible reality of His love for us. In this passage, Jesus forecasts His own death. He is about to be lifted up on the cross. This is the moment of judgment; the choice has to be made between life (found in Jesus' death on the cross) and death (Satan's realm in this world).

Through Death to New Life

"Christ himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter

2:24). • The immense suffering of humanity can easily be understood as a sign of God's wrath, as a punishment. And we, looking at the horrors that plague our world, are saying, "How can

there be a loving God when all this is happening?" Jesus, however, took upon himself all this suffering and lifted it up on the cross, not as a curse but as a blessing. Jesus made the cup of God's wrath into a cup of blessings. That's the mystery of the Eucharist. Jesus died for us so that we may

live. He poured out his blood for us so that we may find new life. He gave himself away for us, so that we can live in community. He became for us food and drink so that we can be fed for everlasting life. Our suffering can no longer be a divine punishment. Jesus transformed it as the way to new life. His blood, and ours too, now can become martyr's blood--blood that witnesses to a new covenant, a new communion, a new community. --Henri Nouwen.
