

DECISIONS

There is an axiom that states, "Not to decide is to decide." This saying was popular in the turbulent times of the Vietnam War. It urged us not to allow others to answer the moral questions raised by our nation's involvement in that terrible conflict, but to decide for ourselves. Making such choices is never easy. Avoiding them is common. Jesus, for his part, was not only a gallant risk-taker, but a clear decision -maker. As he pursued the mission to which the Father called him, he continually decided for us and for the Father. He worked hard to lay out a scenario that would enable others to make similar choices. Never did he make decisions for others or force others into decisions, even decisions that had eternal ramifications. Jesus is inviting us to make such decisions today. We won't be absolutely sure. What is sure, however, is the command that issues from God's word: Take the risk. Decide!

FEAST OF FAITH Come, Spirit!

The presider at the Eucharist can choose from among a number of different Eucharistic Prayers, all of which follow a similar pattern. Almost always, they begin with an epiclesis, a Greek word that means "invocation upon" or "calling over here." At this moment in the prayer, the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts of bread and wine that we have brought to the altar: "Father, we bring you these gifts. We ask you to make them holy by the power of your Spirit, that they may become the body and blood of your Son" (Eucharistic Prayer III). The words of the prayer are accompanied by the ritual gesture of the laying on of hands, the ancient sign of the gift of the Spirit, which is also used in most sacramental celebrations, from the rite of confirmation to the ordination of deacons, priests, and bishops. Liturgists sometimes call this first epiclesis the epiclesis of consecration. Later in the Eucharistic Prayer, there will be another epiclesis, the epiclesis of communion, as the priest asks that the Holy Spirit be sent upon us to transform us. "Grant that we, who are nourished by his body and blood, may be filled with his Holy Spirit, and become one body, one spirit in Christ" (Eucharistic Prayer III).

Saints of the Week & Feast Days

Monday

Saint Rose of Lima, Virgin; Isabel de Oliva, died 1617 at age thirtyone; Peruvian mystic; nicknamed "Rosa" because of her beauty; O.P. tertiary who lived a life of penance and solitude, caring for the homeless, elderly, and sick; first declared saint of the New World (1672); patroness of the Philippines and of South America, especially Peru; also of florists and gardens.

Tuesday

SAINT BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE; died 1st century; probably a surname in the synoptic gospels meaning "the son of Tolmai"; known as Nathaniel in John's gospel; said to have preached the gospel in India and in Armenia where, according to tradition, he was flayed live.

Saints of the Week & Feast Days

(Continued)

Wednesday

Saint Louis; Louis IX of France, died 1270; model ruler and father of eleven children; Franciscan tertiary who cared especially for lepers; built Sainte Chapelle in Paris as a reliquary for the crown of thorns; while on his second crusade, died of the plague near Tunis; patron of masons and sculptors.

Saint Joseph Calasanz; died 1648; from Aragon; founded (1617) Clerics Regular of Religious Schools (Piarists [S.P. or Sch. P]), today numbering some 1,345 religious; dedicated to helping poor children; faced many trials and calumnies for his work, including the temporary suppression of his Institute; patron of all Christian schools dedicated to assisting the poor.

Friday

Saint Monica; died 387 at Ostia; born in Tagaste in Roman Africa (now Souk Ahras, Algeria); after thirty years of prayer, she obtained the conversion of her dissolute pagan husband,; under the guidance of St. Ambrose (7 Dec.) she won the conversion of her eldest son, St Augustine; patroness of mothers.

Saturday

Saint Augustine, Bishop, Doctor of the Church; died 430 in Hippo Regius (now modern Annaba, Algeria(; born in Tagaste, north Africa (now Souk Ahras, Algeria); after a dissolute life, he received baptism at age thirty three from St. Ambrose (7 Dec.); elected bishop of Hippo Regius; combated Manchees, the Donatists, and Pelagius; most noted for his Confession and City of God; over 500 homilies are extant; considered a founder of monastic life in the West, his Rule (whose mantra for community is anima una et cor unum and deum) is observed by some 100 religious communities today; one of the four great doctors of the Latin Church; called the "Doctor of Grace."

Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

AS FOR ME AND MY HOUSEHOLD . . .

Today's Gospel picks up the thread of the "Bread of Life" discourses in the Gospel of John. Jesus, after performing the miracle of the multiplication of loaves and crossing back over the lake to Capernaum (by walking on the water!), is teaching the people in the synagogue there. Using the example of the manna in the desert, he opens for them the mystery of the gift of his body and blood. Startled, as one can imagine, by the starkness of this teaching, many, even among his disciples, begin to drift away, finding the teaching "hard." It is a moment of decision for everyone.


Like Joshua in the desert of Sinai, Jesus asks his people to choose whom they will serve, the One God or something else. Like Joshua, Peter speaks on behalf of his "household" and sides with the Lord. Peter's declaration of faith, "you are the Holy One of God," is preceded by a simple rhetorical question: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68, 69).

... WE WILL SERVE THE LORD

To make the choice of whom to serve, whom to believe in and trust, it is necessary sometimes to come to a moment of crisis. The concept of the Eucharist was so difficult that many who followed Jesus could not accept it. But those who had an intimate relationship with Jesus, not one based on signs and miracles but based on love, knew that their lives had been forever changed. There was no going back; there were no other "gods" to serve. There was the One, and everything depended on that fact. It is love that makes the choices clearer.

We don't completely understand this mystery, or many mysteries of life. But in the intimate relationship of faith, we believe and trust in the One who is faithful. We have been given a great gift, and we cannot possibly understand it fully. But we know we have been loved, that we love in return, and "we have come to believe." It makes all the difference.

Y YO Y LOS MÍOS ...

Los discursos del "Pan de Vida" continúan hoy en el Evangelio de Juan. Jesús, después de hacer el milagro de la multiplicación de los panes y cruzar de regreso al lago de Cafarnaún (¡caminando sobre el agua!), enseña a la gente en la sinagoga. Al usar el ejemplo del maná en el desierto, le abre el misterio del regalo de su cuerpo y su sangre. Asustados por la transparencia de su enseñanza, como uno puede imaginarse, muchos aun entre sus discípulos empezaron a alejarse porque encontraban muy "dura" su enseñanza. Era un momento de decisión para todos.

Como Josué en el desierto del Sinaí, Jesús pide a su pueblo que escoja a quién servirán, al único Dios o a alguien más. Como Josué, Pedro habla en nombre de los "suyos" y se pone de lado del Señor. La declaración de fe de Pedro, "tú eres el Santo de Dios", es precedido por la simple pregunta retórica: "Señor, ¿a quién iríamos? Tú tienes las palabras de la vida eterna".

... SERVIREMOS AL SEÑOR

Para tomar la decisión respecto a quién serviremos, en quién creeremos y confiaremos, es necesario algunas veces afrontar un momento de crisis. El concepto de la Eucaristía era tan difícil que muchos seguidores de Jesús no pudieron aceptarlo. Pero los que tenían una relación íntima con Jesús, no una basada en señales y milagros, sino en el amor, sabían que sus vidas habían cambiado para siempre. No había retorno; no había otros "dioses" que servir. Estaba el Único, y todo dependía de ese hecho. Es el amor el que hace más claras las opciones.

No entendemos completamente este misterio, ni muchos misterios de la vida. Pero en la relación de fe creemos y confiamos en el que es fiel. Se nos ha dado un gran regalo y no lo entendemos en su totalidad. Pero sabemos que se nos ha amado, que hemos amado en respuesta, y "nosotros creemos". Esto hace toda la diferencia.
