### **NHCA 2<sup>nd</sup> COLLECTION ELIMINATION REMINDER**

This is a reminder that the Parish to Parish Support 2nd collection that normally occurs in July has been discontinued at all parishes. With the implementation of the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal (NHCA), the following second collections are discontinued: 1. Parish to Parish Support, 2. Diocesan Seminarian Fund, 3. NH Missionaries Abroad, 4. Catholic University & USCCB, 5. NH Diocesan Priest Retirement, 6. Catholic Charities of New Hampshire, and the 7th which is no longer required but is still optional at the discretion of parishes is the Catholic Schools Collection. These causes previously supported by individual second collections are now supported by the one, annual New Hampshire Catholic Appeal (NHCA). The NHCA was implemented in 41 of the 89 New Hampshire parishes in May 2022 and all parishes will participate in the NHCA in May 2023. ### **GOSPEL REFLECTION**

We can learn a great deal from Mister Rogers. Remember him? He was the gentle soul who found his way into living rooms worldwide starting as far back as 1968. Mister Rogers' Neighborhood was a beloved program that celebrated and exalted people, especially children. He taught us that we are neighbors, and that everyone has a place. Everyone matters. He had a vision, born of his relationship with God that highlighted every human life's innocence, beauty, and uniqueness. To that end, he called us to be responsible for each other, saying nothing different than what Jesus said. Viewers quickly learned that life is not just about me.

"We live in a world in which we need to share responsibility. It's easy to say, 'It's not my child, not my community, not my world, not my problem.' Then there are those who see the need and respond. I consider those people my heroes (Fred Rogers)." It is so easy to look the other way. After all, I'm not the one who needs to leave home out of fear and try to find somewhere safe. I am not the one who is hungry and without shelter or food. I am not the one who has a child being bullied or ridiculed because of the way they dress or act. I am not the one being threatened with violence or unable to find meaningful work. The distress and agony of our neighbors are our distress and agony. We cannot walk by it with an attitude of indifference, especially if we call ourselves believers. When we no longer care, we have suffocated our souls. This is a great sin.

God's law "is something very near to you, already in your mouths and in our hearts; you have only to carry it out." We all have a need for love and acceptance. That's why Mister Rogers' television show was so popular. It spoke to something deeper, something sacred about humanity. God didn't give us his law in a book. He wrote it on our hearts. We know what we need to do. It's a matter of choice. Love is sacred. When we love another human being, especially without regard for ourselves, it is a holy moment. These moments are often missed due to our self-serving agendas and rules.

## **BIBLE STUDY: GALATIANS**

St. Paul's letter to the Christian communities of Galatia is the first of the "great epistles" of "the apostle to the Gentiles." It has been called the "Magna Carta of Christian liberty" because the focus of St. Paul's message is that Jesus Christ has freed those who believe in Him from bondage to the legalism of the old Law and from slavery to sin, and He has placed all who come in faith to embrace Him as Lord and Savior in a position of true liberty. St. Paul's argument is that the life-transforming Cross of Jesus Christ makes way for the believer's deliverance from the uncompromising weight of the Law, the curse of sin, and the unfulfilling burden of living entirely for self ([agapebiblestudy.com](http://agapebiblestudy.com)). ## **CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING – NEW DATE**

The Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. Modern Catholic social teaching has been articulated through a tradition of [papal, conciliar, and episcopal documents](#). The depth and richness of this tradition can be understood best through a direct reading of these documents ([usscb.org](http://usscb.org)). In this four-week course, we will look at Catholic social teaching on workers' rights vs capital, war and peace, the preferential option for the poor, and the environment. ## **FIRST READING: DEUTERONOMY 30:10-14**

Moses petitions the people to follow the commandments God has set before them. He reminds them that the laws are not in the sky or far away at sea but are accessible to them and meant to be followed if they wish to prosper.

## **SECOND READING: COLOSSIANS 1:15-20**

Paul discusses the divine nature of Jesus and explains that Jesus was created before anything else. Everything else was "created through him, and for him."

## **GOSPEL: LUKE 10:25-37**

While discussing everlasting life, a lawyer mentions loving one's neighbor as oneself. The lawyer then asks Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus tells him about a man beaten by robbers, who was ignored by both a priest and a Levite before a Samaritan stopped and offered him aid. Jesus asks the lawyer who was neighbor to the injured man. The lawyer says, "the one who treated him with compassion." Jesus encourages him to go and do the same.
