

If I only knew then what I know now, how different life would be. This sentiment, expressed in myriad ways, is found on every human being's lips at one point or another. Life may have brought us to a vulnerable place where we see some of the poor

choices we made and the effects they are having. Perhaps we fell into some destructive and dysfunctional relationships or behaviors and are finding how they held us captive. Our zeal and passion for life may have drifted away and we are waking up to the reasons apathy has taken hold. Life can be hard. In fact, some would describe their lives as a drudgery. They walk through each day with an anxious unsettledness, wondering when their restlessness will cease. There is a temptation to believe that what I see is all I will get. Mortality and hopelessness await the dawn. If I could only have known what would come in the future, I could have made better choices and avoided all of this misery!

Really? While we can certainly give into weakness, sin, impulsiveness, and idiosyncrasies that cause us to stumble over ourselves, life is really a journey. If we don't make the mistake of wallowing in the mire of self-pity and realize the new life God is calling us to, then there are thrills, adventures, surprises, and soul-searching graces we can surely miss. We are not tethered to our past nor are we bound to the ills life can bring upon us. We are never hopeless or helpless. The problem is that our myopic vision only allows us to see the misery and misfortune that is before us, not the potential that can come from choosing healthier and more life-giving options. Jesus came that we might have fullness of life. We need to learn how to reach for Jesus' hand and let him help us to our feet.

We need to allow God into our pain and heal our past. We have to wrestle with our histories, agonize and search and cry out for the Divine healing we need to restore our faith, hope, and love. Job could not see how his story would end or trust the guidance of the God who called him. We live in that same blindness and suffer from the same lack of confidence. Once we allow ourselves to be touched by God's healing power, we begin to see that all of the pieces of our lives are necessary parts of a greater whole. Along the way of our lives, God uses our omissions and failures to create new things and possibilities. When doors close, others open and we can be amazed by the joyful and unexpected surprises we receive. Once we know the power of God's creative, healing, life-giving, forgiving, and dynamic presence, it is no wonder we want to put ourselves at the service of others and show them what life can be.



In extending an invitation to participate in classroom study we caution all to refrain from participating if they have a fever or any flulike symptoms, and, very importantly, we will observe all proper CDC protocols requiring masks, proper distancing and the use of hand sanitizer on entering and leaving the classroom.

The book of Hebrews is like a little *Catechism*. It is steeped in rich truths that are foundational to our Catholic Faith, but its highly refined theological concepts can be difficult for even the most seasoned Bible scholars to unpack. Presented by Andrew Swafford and Jeff Cavins, Hebrews: The New and Eternal Covenant draws out the riches of this book in a way that makes them easier to understand. It draws connections between the Old and New Testaments, the Liturgy, the Eucharist, the priesthood, and so much more. Most importantly, Hebrews will help Catholics appreciate the astounding generosity of God as they see the wonders he has given us in the Church.

As always, we should recognize that everyone's circumstances are unique and ask that you pray and consult the Holy Spirit before making your decision to join in classroom participation for your good as well as the good of the entire group. God bless.

Guidelines for 2021: Distribution of Ashes in Time of Pandemic

The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

The Priest (or Deacon) then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

FOR THE **AWARENESS OF** HE FAITHFUL

Please be aware that there are churches that call themselves "Catholic" but are not in full communion with the Holy Father Pope Francis nor do they recognize his authority. This is provided for your awareness as your parish is near the Society of St. Pius X (SSPX) church or chapel. The bishop's guidelines regarding Catholic Churches of the diocese are not embraced by the Society of St. Pius X (SSPX) chapel as they operate here in the Diocese of St. Augustine without the permission of the Ordinary and they are not fully in communion with Rome. Although Pope Francis continues initiatives in order to bring the Society of St. Pius X (SSPX) into full communion, we are not there yet.

This means that the Masses offered by the priests of the Society of St. Pius X (SSPX) are valid, but illicit. While it is true that participation in the Mass at chapels of the Society of St. Pius X does not of itself constitute 'formal adherence to the schism' (cf. Ecclesia Dei 5, c), such adherence can come about over a period of time as one slowly imbibes a schismatic mentality which separates itself from the teaching of the Supreme Pontiff and the entire Catholic Church.

We hope that parishioners understand the relationship of the Church and the Society of St. Pius X (SSPX) regarding their attendance, Mass, and the sacraments. If it is the extraordinary form of the Mass you seek, parishioners will do well to attend Masses offered by parishes of the diocese and celebrated by a priest who is in good standing with the Roman Catholic Church. Even if some further resolution to the status of the SSPX community is achieved, Catholics in the Diocese of St. Augustine are strongly encouraged to attend their local parish to fulfill their Sunday obligation.

RCIA: WELCOME HOME, WELCOME BACK

Have you been away for a bit? Have you ever felt—for whatever reason—sorry you're not welcome here? Do you know someone that falls into that category? There's a breath of fresh air that is blowing through the Catholic Church. The Church of Jesus Christ is all about *mercy*. Come and find out what you have been missing. Explore our faith more deeply through RCIA, the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. You will find an open door and a friend inside. The words over the front door of the church say..." All Are Welcome." We mean it.

RCIA is the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. It is a rite which welcomes people seeking a Catholic Church family and a Parish family. Through this Sacrament we are freed from the power of darkness and joined to Christ's death, burial and resurrection. *Baptism* incorporates us into Christ and forms us into God's people signing us with the gift of the Spirit.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADUITS

Confirmation makes us more completely the image of the Lord and fills us with the Holy Spirit. Receiving the **Eucharist** allows us to share eternal life and show forth the unity of God's people. The three sacraments of Christian initiation combine to bring us, the faithful of Christ, to his full stature and to enable us to carry out the mission of the people of God in the Church and in the world.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION

The Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) includes Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist and the Rites of the Catechumenate, the Rite of Acceptance, Rite of Election followed by the Sacraments of Christian Initiation.

The rite of initiation is the beginning of a lifetime journey in faith. The steps are as follows:

- Pre-catechumenate, initial conversion and the wish to become Catholic, a period of inquiry ending with the Rite of Acceptance.
- Catechumenate and deeper preparation, ending with the Rite of Election.
- Sacraments of Initiation. Usually ends with Easter celebrations.

We have a trained team of parish members who will lead you and accompany you on your journey in faith. Classes are held weekly, but they can be flexible to accommodate your daily schedules. We expect that you will have questions for us. We hope that we will see you at the Sunday Mass and become involved with your new parish family. We hope your journey in faith will be happy, educational and spiritually uplifting.


