WEEKLY REFLECTION
Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

The night before they escaped from slavery in Egypt, the Hebrew people, in obedience to God's command given through Moses, ate a special meal which has come to be known as the Passover. God directed them to eat the meal "with your loins girt, sandals on your feet and your staff in hand, you will eat it in a hurry. It is the Lord's Passover.... But for you the blood will mark the houses where you are. Seeing the blood, I will pass over you; thereby, when I strike the land of Egypt, no destructive blow will come upon you." (Exodus 12:11, 13) They ate unleavened bread because they were told to leave in haste. There was no time to wait for the yeast to work.

For thousands of years, God's chosen people have celebrated their liberation by eating a meal similar to the one their ancestors ate prior to their escape from Pharaoh. The unleavened bread, the lamb, and the bitter herbs remind the Jewish people of God's miraculous intervention on their behalf, liberating them and forming them into His special nation. The Jews celebrate by eating what their ancestors ate. They celebrate the great past event which has an important effect in the present and gives hope for the future.

When Jesus celebrated the Passover with his disciples on the night before he died, he recalled the great act by which God liberated his people. When he blessed the bread and the cup of wine, he gave new meaning to the ritual which his disciples would celebrate in his memory. Like the Hebrews centuries before, Jesus shared a meal in preparation for God's decisive act of redemption. Jesus' death liberated mankind from the slavery to sin and death and so gave us hope for life eternal with him.

When we celebrate the Eucharist, we recall God's grace which saves us through the death of Jesus. We remind ourselves of the effects of this great event, and we look forward in hope to the day when eternal life will dawn for us.

The first Passover united the Hebrews in common sacrificial meal. Subsequent celebrations of the Passover united the Jewish people as they thanked God for his great gifts. In our celebration of the sacrifice of the Mass, we join with Christian believers throughout the world in celebrating the presence of Jesus among us and thanking the Father for our redemption. Let us give thanks to God for the great gift of the presence of Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

THE YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST THE CREED

Each Sunday at Mass and on certain holy days, we retell and enter into this story of God's love for us when we say the Creed (or Profession of Faith), because in it we express the central truths of our faith. Our Creed briefly summarizes the entire story of salvation, declaring our belief in God and how He has revealed Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit through creation, through the prophets, through Christ's incarnation, death, resurrection, and ascension, through the sending of the Holy Spirit, in the life of the Church, and in the promised Second Coming.

The term creed, comes from the Latin *credo*, meaning "I believe." The first creed we profess is at baptism, through which we enter into Christ and into the family of God. In the baptism of children, after this profession (creed), the minister states: "This is our faith. This is the faith of the Church. We are proud to profess it in Christ Jesus our Lord." Our Mass creeds find their origin in baptismal professions of faith. The Apostles' Creed is a baptismal creed that can be said at Mass, but most commonly on Sundays we pray the Nicene Creed, written mainly in the 4th century to clarify and articulate our beliefs.

At Mass, we stand and profess the Creed after the Readings and Homily. This placement is important. The Creed is our response in faith to God who has just spoken to us in the readings. It is our joyful "yes" to God's Word and our acceptance of his invitation to life with Him.

In the Creed, we each recommit ourselves to God, to our beliefs, and to a life of discipleship. Notice how the Creed flows. We state our belief in God 1) the Father, 2) the Son, and 3) the Holy Spirit, and then we profess faith in 4) the Church. Our story is centered upon God, but certainly not just on past events, for we emphasize God's saving presence among us now in Jesus through the Church by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Due to the relativistic culture which permeates much of our society, some find it difficult to state what they really and truly believe about God. But for us, this is our faith. Each Sunday we stand to profess boldly and with great confidence what we believe. At Mass, what we profess is what we celebrate. I believe in one God. By God's very definition, God is complete and perfect. God is not lacking in any way. Our God is a God of goodness and perfection. God, the Father almighty – who created everything visible and invisible: the angels, all the stars and galaxies, the earth and its living creation, woman and man. He is Our Father – yours and mine.

This is the origin of our story. This is the beginning of how our world began; we have a loving God who created the world for you and me to live in and be in relationship with Him.

Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God...consubstantial with the Father (Christocentric Creed). The image of the invisible God (Col. 1:15). He "came down from heaven" for our salvation. We profess the mystery of Jesus' incarnation, death, resurrection, ascension, and second coming.

Holy Spirit is the Lord the giver of life. Through Baptism the Holy Spirit has instilled the Divine Life in each of us, making us daughters and sons of our Heavenly Father. In Confirmation, the fullness of the Spirit is received. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the Church continues the mission of Christ.

I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church: "one because God is one; holy because it is filled by the Holy Spirit; catholic because it stands open to all people; and apostolic because it rests on the foundation of the Apostles." Our profession of faith in the Trinity is what leads us to profession of faith in the Church, where the Divine Life of God is made available for the forgiveness of sins, resurrection, and eternal life.

The Creed is our family story, so let it be personal. It is the faith of the Apostles, of the martyrs, of the Church. It is our response in faith to God who has revealed His saving love to us in Christ and never ceases to draw near to us. The Creed is our identity as disciples of Jesus – it is our "Yes" to God.

PARKING at 220 O'Keefe

For registered Immaculate Conception parishioners, parking at a reduced fee of \$2.00 for a 3-hour period is available in the **SP PLUS PARKING GARAGE** at 220 O'Keefe, next to the Quality Inn, near the corner of O'Keefe and Common. The garage is open to parishioners for regularly-scheduled parish Masses on the weekend.

To get the reduced rate, for each visit you must use a magnetic voucher card available for purchase in the parish office, or you may order vouchers by completing the form available on the back counter of the church.

To take advantage of the reduced rate, enter the garage from O'Keefe, and take a ticket from the auto attendant. **KEEP YOUR TICKET.** When you exit the garage, you will need to insert both that ticket and the voucher.
