WEEKLY REFLECTION
Ephesians 4:1-6

The Apostle Paul began the letter to the Ephesians with praise and thanksgiving to God for the blessings of creation and the great grace of redemption in Jesus Christ. God's plan unfolded through the centuries as he prepared his chosen people to receive their Messiah who would become the savior of all people. Through his death and resurrection, Christ has torn down the wall dividing Jews and Gentiles, and in him God has created a new people. (Ephesians 2:13-14)

Paul began many of his letters by describing God's work of salvation. God has in Christ reconciled the world to himself. We have become a new creation. In the latter portion of many of his letters, Paul gave encouragement and advice on how to live the reality that God has created in us. In other words, the first part of the Letter to Ephesians gives the indicative (who we are in Christ); the second part gives the imperative (how we ought to behave as God's chosen people).

God has created one new people in Christ which we see manifested in the Church. Paul urged the Ephesians to "live a life worthy of the calling you have received." (Ephesians 4:1) The Spirit urges us to follow Paul's encouragement by living lives of humility, gentleness, and patience which enable us to put up with one another. These qualities promote unity in families, in the Church, and in society. Their opposites, arrogance, irascibility, and intolerance cause division and hostility.

The humble person refuses to put his or her needs ahead of others in the family. We desperately need leaders who put aside their self-serving agendas and thereby promote unity over division. Aristotle described the gentle person as one who lives in the middle ground between excessive anger and total passivity. Families experience so much unnecessary division because someone is unable to control his or her temper. Angry displays are usually counterproductive. The people we look to for guidance should exemplify self-control.

The Holy Spirit moves us to grow in unity, but we can all too easily resist the Spirit. Let us pray that we put aside our self-importance, our resentments, and our narrow mindedness. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit guide us as we work for unity in our families, in our Church, and in society.

EXCERPTS FROM POPE FRANCIS'S LETTER ACCOMPANYING THE MOTU PROPRIO, *TRADITIONES CUSTODES*

Rome, 16 July 2021

Dear Brothers in the Episcopate,

Just as my Predecessor Benedict XVI did with *Summorum Pontificum*, I wish to accompany the *Motu proprio* *Traditionis custodes* with a letter explaining the motives that prompted my decision. I turn to you with trust and *parresia*, in the name of that shared “solicitude for the whole Church, that contributes supremely to the good of the Universal Church” as Vatican Council II reminds us.

Most people understand the motives that prompted St. John Paul II and Benedict XVI to allow the use of the Roman Missal, promulgated by St. Pius V and edited by St. John XXIII in 1962, for the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The faculty — granted by the indult of the Congregation for Divine Worship in 1984 and confirmed by St. John Paul II in the *Motu Proprio Ecclesia Dei* in 1988 — was above all motivated by the desire to foster the healing of the schism with the movement of Mons. Lefebvre. With the ecclesial intention of restoring the unity of the Church, the Bishops were thus asked to accept with generosity the “just aspirations” of the faithful who requested the use of that Missal. Benedict XVI declared “the Missal promulgated by St. Pius V and newly edited by Blessed John XXIII, as a extraordinary expression of the same *lex orandi*,” granting a “more ample possibility for the use of the 1962 Missal.”

In making their decision they were confident that such a provision would not place in doubt one of the key measures of Vatican Council II or minimize in this way its authority: the *Motu proprio* recognized that, in its own right, “the Missal promulgated by Paul VI is the ordinary expression of the *lex orandi* of the Catholic Church of the Latin rite.” It comforted Benedict XVI in his discernment that many desired “to find the form of the sacred Liturgy dear to them,” “clearly accepted the binding character of Vatican Council II and were faithful to the Pope and to the Bishops.” What is more, he declared to be unfounded the fear of division in parish communities, because “the two forms of the use of the Roman Rite would enrich one another.” Thus, he invited the Bishops to set aside their doubts and fears, and to welcome the norms.

With the passage of thirteen years, I instructed the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith to circulate a questionnaire to the Bishops regarding the implementation of the *Motu proprio Summorum Pontificum*. The responses reveal a situation that preoccupies and saddens me, and persuades me of the need to intervene. Regrettably, the pastoral objective of my Predecessors, who had intended “to do everything possible to ensure that all those who truly possessed the desire for unity would find it possible to remain in this unity or to rediscover it anew,” has often been seriously disregarded. **An opportunity offered by St. John Paul II and, with even greater magnanimity, by Benedict XVI, intended to recover the unity of an ecclesial body with diverse liturgical sensibilities, was exploited to widen the gaps, reinforce the divergences, and encourage disagreements that injure the Church, block her path, and expose her to the peril of division.**

A final reason for my decision is this: ever more plain in the **words and attitudes of many is the close connection between the choice of celebrations according to the liturgical books prior to Vatican Council II and the rejection of the Church and her institutions in the name of what is called the “true Church.” One is dealing here with comportment that contradicts communion and nurtures the divisive tendency** — “I belong to Paul; I belong instead to Apollos; I belong to Cephas; I belong to Christ” — against which the Apostle Paul so vigorously reacted. In defense of the unity of the Body of Christ, I am constrained to revoke the faculty granted by my Predecessors. The distorted use that has been made of this faculty is contrary to the intentions that led to granting the freedom to celebrate the Mass with the *Missale Romanum* of 1962. **Because “liturgical celebrations are not private actions, but celebrations of the Church, which is the sacrament of unity,” they must be carried out in communion with the Church.**

The garage is open to parishioners for regularly-scheduled parish Masses on the weekend.

To get the reduced rate, for each visit you must use a magnetic voucher card available for purchase in the parish office, or you may order vouchers by completing the form available on the back counter of the church.

To take advantage of the reduced rate, enter the garage from O'Keefe, and take a ticket from the auto attendant. **KEEP YOUR TICKET**. When you exit the garage, you will need to insert both that ticket and the voucher.
