WEEKLY REFLECTION
1 Corinthians 12:3-4

Paul the Apostle faced many challenges as he preached message of salvation in Jesus throughout the eastern Roman Empire. He endured beatings and imprisonment as God’s word met fierce opposition. One the other hand, he made many converts who responded to the call of the Holy Spirit and accepted Paul’s gospel. Most of his converts were pagan Gentiles who were moved by Holy Spirit to turn away from their former lives.

Even though the Spirit was with them at their conversion and in their baptism, some continued to maintain the pagan outlook of the culture around them. Some continued to follow the sexual mores of their culture. Others found it hard to grow in humility in a society that valued honor and prestige. Greco-Roman culture was highly status conscious. Social life involved competition for honors and glory rather than the humility of Christian life which followed the example of Jesus.

The church in Corinth had a diversity and inclusion problem. Christians in the first decades after the Resurrection met in the homes of wealthy believers who had enough space to accommodate 30 congregants. The majority of believers were poor or slaves with little resources. When the church celebrated a fellowship dinner, the higher status believers gathered in the dining room of the home while the lower status were relegated to the atrium. Paul received a report that higher status Christians started to eat the meal before the rest of the congregation arrived leaving very little for the latecomers. “For in eating, each one goes ahead with his own supper, and one goes hungry while another gets drunk.” (1 Corinthians 11:21)

Many of the wealthier Corinthians thought that they were superior because they could speak in tongues. They prided themselves on their wisdom which they thought made them better than the lower-class believers. They justified their contempt for the lower class because they had the gift of the Spirit. Paul vigorously condemned this mindset. “And no one can say, ‘Jesus is Lord,’ except by the Holy Spirit.” There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit.” (1 Corinthians 12:3-4) The spirit gives different gifts for the building up of the body of believers. The one Spirit gives many gifts. No one should consider himself superior; all Christians are given gifts. There are no greater gifts, simply different ways in which one is called to serve.

God gives spiritual gifts for the benefit of the whole community, not to elevate certain individuals. Through the centuries some Christian believers have been tempted to fall into spiritual elitism. The Spirit gives different gifts and so enables a diversity in the community; the Spirit also brings the community together. Unity and diversity both come from the Holy Spirit. The Spirit works to break down barriers and builds up mutual respect among us. The Spirit empowers people with different gifts to work together for the common good.

Let us pray that we may grow in appreciation of the diverse gifts of those with whom we worship. Let us pray for the grace of the Holy Spirit who brings us together in harmony.

PARKING at 208 O'Keefe

The new management of the parking garage at 208 O'Keefe has installed a new system for payment. Instead of using pre-paid cards, you will enter a one-time code on the Premium Parking app. Details are available on the website www.jesuitchurch.net and on the parish Facebook page *Immaculate Conception Jesuit Church*. You may bring to church office the cards you previously purchased, and we will give you a list of the one-time access codes. You may come to the church office Monday to Friday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm.

Upon entering the garage, please enter the six-digit code and your license plate number in the Premium Parking app. You may park for 120 minutes.

The parish will provide special codes for parishioners at the previous rate of \$2.00.
