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A Word from Father Chris

Back to Basics: Encountering Christ Through Sacred Scripture in Lent 2021

After such a year as we have had in 2020, our focus points are naturally going to be all over the place: finding new employment, finding better employment, recovering our economy, deciding when to try and venture out at a normal rate, trying to find all of the health rules for each new thing we want to do, learning a new style of leadership from a different president, who is safe, who is not, and even something so simple as which core values we live by and what to do about them in a way that respects those values, our own selves, and the dignity of people around us. Many have said that the different choices being made regarding these and other factors are splitting families apart and the result of all of this together, basically, is chaos. What do we do when we are confronted with chaos? What do we do when our focus points are so numerous and scattered? We pray and we return back to the basics.




The Catechism of the Catholic Church 112 states that, “Scripture is a unity by reason of the unity of God’s plan, of which Christ Jesus is the center and heart, open since His Passover. The phrase ‘heart of Christ’ can refer to Sacred Scripture which makes known His heart.” We want to know what God wants. We want to know how all of these various factors might come together into one plan and vision from God the Father. We want to encounter the Living Jesus, who has a great reputation for healing us and making things right. We will do well, then, to make efforts to encounter God this year more than ever by reading and reflecting on Sacred Scripture and seeking to encounter Jesus there.

Enclosed in this newsletter is our plan for the Lenten activities of our parishes this year. Please note the change in times for the Stations of the Cross, and that there will be several opportunities for retreats. Also, there will be a series of prayer and reflection evenings led by Deacon Ray DiMascio and our Deaconate Intern, Mike Constantini. Be aware that all these opportunities are going to be “in person”, and many of them are also going to be available by Zoom and by telephone. In each of the things we do together, I hope we can highlight aspects of Sacred Scripture that draw our uncommon focus points into the unity of the heart of Christ. We are, after all, His Body.

As the Catechism paragraph reminded us, Jesus’ own heart was not made known and clear without His own Passion. May we live passionately with faith through our challenges this Lent and find them unified by the enlivening foundation of Sacred Scripture, so that together with our fasting and our generosity, our common destiny and fulfillment in Christ will be made clear. Ash Wednesday – February 17

Because of the current COVID restrictions, and following CDC and Diocesan guidelines, ashes for Ash Wednesday will be distributed by sprinkling on the head, for sanitation and health reasons. Lives Well-Lived – Deacon Fred and Joyce Brown – by Susan Kramer, TOF

Deacon Dr. Fred Brown, aged 91, who faithfully served at St. Mary until the merger with St. Bernard in 2010, as well as Our Lady of the Cedars Maronite parish in Montrose, died on the Feast of the Epiphany, January 3, 2021. Deacon Fred had been living with his son, Fr. Stephan Brown, SVD at St. Joseph Parish in St. Petersburg, Florida, where Fr. Brown is pastor.



Deacon Fred was a doctor, and a veteran of the Korean War, serving the US Army as a Lieutenant. He worked at the Cleveland Clinic, developing artificial organs and studying the damage done to blood vessels by this. He taught nursing students at St. John College. He was appointed president of the Cleveland Catholic School Board in 1972. Fred also served as Civil Service Commissioner for the City of Warrensville Hts., and later as a City Councilman. Fred was active in the Holy Name Society, the Knights of

Columbus, and was a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity (*which, in Akron, focuses on providing quality housing for the underprivileged, including Channelwood near St. Mary.*) He served as rector to 10 teams of the Greater Cleveland Cursillo movement. He was also the first African-American deacon ordained in the Diocese of Cleveland. In addition to serving St. Mary as deacon, Fred and Joyce team-taught Religion at St. Mary School to the children. He and Joyce were associated with the Bread of Life Community here in Akron. In everything they did, they worked to further the mission of the Church.



Deacon Fred brought Jesus to his patients, his students, his parishioners, his family, and strangers. He walked every step of the way with his beloved wife of 64 years, Joyce (*who died in 2020*). They raised 6 children (Frederick – deceased, Dr. Sharon, Deacon Michael, Regina, Dr. Monica, and Fr. Stephan), who all grew to serve God as well.

Both Joyce and Deacon Fred were lay Franciscans for 17 years, and unselfishly assisted in teaching Formation classes to those discerning entering the Order. Deacon Fred also served as interim Spiritual Director at one point when there were no friars available.

Deacon Fred not only preached the Gospel – he and Joyce **lived** it. He was an exemplary Catholic, deacon, Franciscan, family man and servant to his community and parishes, inspiring others to follow his worthy example. We were blessed to be touched by his ministry, and by his dear Joyce, who actively assisted and strengthened Fred, and worked for the Kingdom of God every day of her life.

***May the angels lead Fred and Joyce on their journey to Heaven,
and may they see the loving face of Jesus!***

Pope Francis has proclaimed the Year of St. Joseph, from December 8, 2020 through December 8, 2021



From the Vatican News website, “Pope Francis describes St. Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father, a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.”

Further, “The Holy Father wrote *Patris Corde (With a Father’s Heart)* against the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, which, he says has helped us see more clearly the importance of ‘ordinary’ people who, though far from the limelight, exercise patience and offer hope every day. In this, they resemble St. Joseph, ‘the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence,’ who nonetheless played ‘an incomparable role in the history of salvation.’”

There is a plenary indulgence which will be granted during the Year of St. Joseph, under the following guidelines (per [Vatican News](#)): The plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful under the usual conditions (Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the Pope’s intentions) to Christians who, with a spirit detached from any sin, participate in the Year of St. Joseph on these occasions and manners indicated by the Apostolic Penitentiary:

- The plenary indulgence is granted to those who will meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord’s Prayer, or take part in a Spiritual Retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph. “St. Joseph, an authentic man of faith, invites us”, the decree reads, “to rediscover our filial relationship with the Father, to renew fidelity to prayer, to listen and correspond with profound discernment to God’s will.”
- The indulgence can also be obtained by those who, following St. Joseph’s example, will perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy. St. Joseph “encourages us to rediscover the value of silence, prudence and loyalty in carrying out our duties,” the decree notes.
- The recitation of the Holy Rosary in families and among engaged couples is another way of obtaining indulgences, in order that “all Christian families may be stimulated to recreate the same atmosphere of intimate communion, love and prayer that was in the Holy Family.”
- Everyone who entrusts their daily activity to the protection of St. Joseph, and every faithful who invokes the intercession of St. Joseph so that those seeking work can find dignifying work can also obtain the plenary indulgence. On 1 May 1955, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of St. Joseph “with the intent that the dignity of work be recognized by all, and that it inspires social life and laws, based on the fair distribution of rights and duties.”
- The plenary indulgence is also granted to the faithful who will recite the Litany to St. Joseph (for the Latin tradition), or the *Akathistos* to St. Joseph (for the Byzantine tradition), or any other prayer to St. Joseph proper to the other liturgical traditions, for the persecuted Church *ad intra* and *ad extra*, and for the relief of all Christians suffering all forms of persecution. Because, the decree notes, “the flight of the Holy Family to Egypt shows us that God is there where man is in danger, where man suffers, where he runs away, where he experiences rejection and abandonment.”

Prayer to St. Joseph

To you, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our tribulation, and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God, and through the paternal love with which you embraced the Child Jesus, we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance with which Jesus Christ has purchased by His Blood, and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ;

O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence;

O our most mighty protector, be kind to us, and from heaven assist us in our struggle with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril, so now protect God’s Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection, so that, supported by your example and your aid, we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness, and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.
