Baptisms

Baptisms are usually held on Saturday mornings any time throughout the year (**with the exception of the Lenten Season**). Parents must be registered parishioners and complete a Baptismal Preparation class. It is required that godparents are no less than 16 years of age and have completed the three Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Holy Communion and Confirmation. If the godparents are a married couple, they need to have been married by the Catholic Church. Please contact the Parish Office to arrange for the class and the date of Baptism.

Sponsor Certificates

Sponsors (Godparents) for Baptism and Confirmation are required to verify their eligibility. They must be fully initiated Catholic who actively practice their faith and are in good standing with the Church. For more information please contact the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults

If you are considering becoming Catholic, or desire to complete your sacraments, please contact the Parish Office for more information about RCIA.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

Please call the rectory and let us know when a member of your family is in the hospital so a priest can arrange to visit them. Make sure you contact the Pastoral Care Office in the hospital so the Chaplain can bring you communion daily. **In the event of an emergency please call 908 392-7962 anytime of the day or night.**

Marriages

Please call the office to meet with the Pastor as soon as you become engaged and before any preparations are made. Arrangements should be made one year in advance. Couples preparing for marriage must attend required Pre-Cana sessions within the Diocese along with F.O.C.C.U.S. and sessions with your Parish Priest or Deacon.

SUNDAY MASS READING 3/9

**"One does not live on bread alone,
 but on every word that comes forth from the mouth of God."
 Mt 4:4b**

First Reading: Deuteronomy 26:4-10

Moses discusses the power God has displayed in freeing his people from oppression and leading them to a rich land. He tells the people that they should make offerings to God to show their gratitude, then celebrate over the great things he has given them.

Second Reading: Romans 10:8-13

Paul tells us that if we proclaim, "Jesus is Lord" and truly believe that God raised him from the dead, we will be saved. For God shows his mercy toward everyone who calls upon his name.

Gospel: Luke 4:1-13

MARCH IS DEDICATED TO THE SAINT JOSEPH

Your Lenten toolkit – and its indulgences

(Excerpts)

...we should consider a specific Lenten sacrifice to advance the well-being of the Holy Souls dearest to us, according to the prompting of the Holy Spirit in our hearts.

Four concessions

After all, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, the three traditional tools for Lent, are also indulgenced by our Church in something called “the four general concessions” (Manual of Indulgences, pp. 21-36). That is:

1. **A partial indulgence is granted to the Christian faithful who, while carrying out their duties and enduring the hardships of life, raise their minds in humble trust to God and make, at least mentally, some pious invocation...**
2. **A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who, led by the spirit of faith, give compassionately of themselves or of their goods to serve their brothers in need...**
3. **A partial indulgence is granted to the Christian faithful who, in a spirit of penance, voluntarily abstain from something that is licit for and pleasing to them...**
4. **A partial indulgence is granted to the Christian faithful who, in the particular circumstances of daily life, voluntarily give explicit witness to their faith before others.**

Save souls on earth and help speed souls through Purgatory at the same time!

Our Lenten practices can obtain partial indulgences. Even if they weren't indulgenced, they would be means of grace in the world, and be suitable to offer to God on behalf of the Holy Souls in Purgatory. Let's talk about some ways of using the three tools this Lent.

Prayer

Outside the Sacraments and reading the Scriptures, what's the best way to welcome God's grace into your life?

That's right: prayer. But prayer isn't just for us to have a one-on-one relationship with God (though that's indispensably important). Prayer is also meant as a means for us to work on our relationships with everyone and everything else.

After all, God doesn't ask us to give up everything forever and focus on Him alone. We are called to place Him first in our lives so that we receive everything and everyone else from Him, in light of Him. That way, we won't mistake others for Him. We won't fall into idolatry if we have a good, right relationship with God. That way, we'll know how to love others. We'll treat creatures as creatures, not make idols out of them.

And we'll come to the aid of our neighbors. We'll intercede for those in need, and thank God for the gift of those who help us. We'll open the floodgates of Heaven to the graces of God, allowing God a freer hand to work in the world by our consent to His will, as Our Lady did. We will do works of mercy every day, throughout the day, even as we work.

This past autumn, I mentioned to Susan Tassone, a knowledgeable friend (the “Purgatory Lady”), that I was thinking of making a novena for a special favor. She immediately reminded me that Bl. Solanus Casey, OFM, often recommended praying to the Holy Souls for their intercession. Check out Susan's *The St. Faustina Prayer Book For The Holy Souls In Purgatory* for great prayers and devotions.

Fasting

Remember that your fasting and abstinence are meant to be penance for you, not for those around you! If you can't keep your temper without your morning coffee, please don't give it up. Conversely, it's worth experimenting with giving up your favorite treats, just for a chunk of time, especially if you've been ignoring or not following your doctor's advice for some time. You can also be creative with your fasts. Give up ice cream, for instance, during the week, and allow yourself to indulge on Sunday, or give up ice cream for the first week of Lent, chocolate for the second, cake for the third, and so on.

The point is to train yourself for bigger sacrifices, larger surrenders to the will of God. Better a small fast you will keep than a huge, impossible fast you'll break and feel miserable about. Be intentional. Train your will to place God before your appetite. Do what will best aid your salvation and sanctification.

Almsgiving

We live in a world with an almost infinite chasm of need before us all day, every day. The West is losing or has lost the faith; the poor of the world are in need each and every day...

What do your friends and family need? How about your parish, or the local charities that your parish helps? If you can think of the bigger picture, do so: What does your local diocese need? What do bigger Catholic charities need? And of course keep the Marian Fathers in mind!

Your Lent doesn't have to be the hardest ever in order for it to be a good Lent. With prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, do good works for God, for yourself, for the Holy Souls, and for your neighbors.

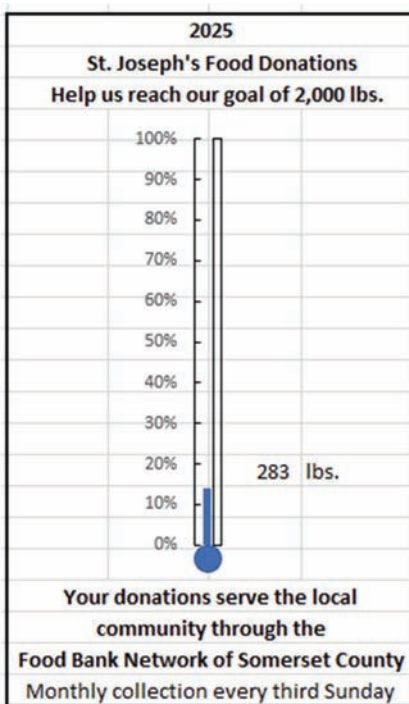

- 1) The days of both fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday (March 5) and Good Friday (April 18).
- 2) The other Fridays of Lent (Mar. 7, 14, 21, 28; April 4, and 11) are days of abstinence.
- 3) Fasting in the Roman Catholic tradition means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal. The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59.
- 4) Abstinence in the Roman Catholic tradition means to abstain from eating meat (beef, chicken, pork, turkey, etc.).

The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

Reflexión salesiana para el Primer domingo de Cuaresma

*Una reflexión salesiana sobre el Evangelio
dominical por un Oblato de San Francisco de Sales*

"Jesús fue llevado por el Espíritu al desierto donde el fue tentado por el diablo."

Perspectiva Salesiana

Mientras que Jesús se preparaba para comenzar su ministerio público – el de proclamar las Buenas Nuevas del Reino de Dios- para ser la clase de Mesías que Su Padre envisioned – para abrir su mente y su corazón al poder y la promesa del Espíritu Santo – él fue tentado.

Fue tentado a convertir la piedra en un pan. Fue tentado con todo el poder y la gloria de los reinos terrenales. Fue tentado a lanzarse desde el templo: presumiblemente, para convencer a las personas de su identidad y su autoridad todo al mismo tiempo.

La tentación fundamental? Jesús fue tentado a convertirse en alguien mas que no fuera quien Dios le había

mandado a ser. Jesús fue tentado a ser una clase diferente de salvador. Jesús fue tentado a creer que había una forma más fácil de redimir, de salvar, de santificar. Jesús fue tentado a creer que había un atajo que se podía tomar en el camino a la salvación.

Nosotros nos podemos identificar con este tipo de tentación. Cuántas veces nos decimos a nosotros mismos que seríamos más felices, más sanos y más santos si fuéramos alguien más? Cuántas veces decimos que debe haber otra forma (una forma más fácil, un atajo) para ser una buena esposa, un buen esposo, un buen hijo o buena hija, un buen hermano o una buena hermana, un buen amigo o un buen vecino? La tragedia es que si pasamos nuestras vidas creyendo que estaríamos mejor si fuéramos alguien más o si estuviéramos en otro lugar, nosotros nunca vivimos la vida – la única vida- que Dios nos da. En el proceso de buscar un atajo dejamos de seguir el camino que Dios quiere que caminemos.

Francisco de Sales escribe: "No siembres tus deseos en el jardín de otra persona; simplemente cultiva tu jardín lo mejor que puedas. No anheles otra persona que no sea quien eres; en vez de eso, debes desear profundamente ser quien eres. Enfoca tus pensamientos en esa realidad y perfecciona quien eres, y carga con las cruces, bien sean grandes o pequeñas, que se te presenten en el camino. Créeme, este es el punto mas importante – y el menos entendido – en la vida espiritual." (*Cartas de Dirección Espiritual*, p. 112)

Jesús fue tentado a ser alguien y algo diferente a lo que el era. Jesús fue tentado a abandonar el camino autentico del amor y a cambiarlo por la promesa vacía y diabólica de un atajo. Jesús fue tentado a tomar el camino (aparentemente) más fácil. Aun así, su creencia en el plan de Dios para él le permitió a Jesús repudiar la promesa vacía de un arreglo a medias hacia el camino que lleva a la felicidad, la salud y la santidad.

Ahora que comenzamos esta temporada de la Cuaresma, pidamos el coraje que necesitamos para reconocer la voz del tentador en nosotros. Pide la claridad para poder ver las formas en las que eres tentado a pasar tu vida deseando ser alguien más. Pide la gracia y la fuerza para seguir el ejemplo de Jesús.

Se quien eres y se eso de la mejor manera.

Guía para la Sagrada Comunión

Para que un católico reciba la comunión, se requiere:

- Estar en estado de gracia; es decir, libre de cualquier pecado mortal no confesado.
- Abstenerse durante al menos una hora antes de la Sagrada Comunión de cualquier alimento o bebida, a excepción de agua y medicinas.
- Saber a Quien se recibe y acercarse al altar con devoción.

"Por la actitud corporal (gestos, vestido) se manifiesta el respeto, la solemnidad, el gozo de ese momento en que Cristo se hace nuestro huésped". (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica 1387)
