Baptisms

Baptisms are usually held on Saturday mornings any time throughout the year (**with the exception of the Lenten Season**). Parents must be registered parishioners and complete a Baptismal Preparation class. It is required that godparents are no less than 16 years of age and have completed the three Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Holy Communion and Confirmation. If the godparents are a married couple, they need to have been married by the Catholic Church. Please contact the Parish Office to arrange for the class and the date of Baptism.

Sponsor Certificates

Sponsors (Godparents) for Baptism and Confirmation are required to verify their eligibility. They must be fully initiated Catholic who actively practice their faith and are in good standing with the Church. For more information please contact the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults

If you are considering becoming Catholic, or desire to complete your sacraments, please contact the Parish Office for more information about RCIA.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

Please call the rectory and let us know when a member of your family is in the hospital so a priest can arrange to visit them. Make sure you contact the Pastoral Care Office in the hospital so the Chaplain can bring you communion daily. **In the event of an emergency please call 908 392-7962 anytime of the day or night.**

Marriages

Please call the office to meet with the Pastor as soon as you become engaged and before any preparations are made. Arrangements should be made one year in advance. Couples preparing for marriage must attend required Pre-Cana sessions within the Diocese along with F.O.C.C.U.S. and sessions with your Parish Priest or Deacon.

SUNDAY MASS READING 3/23

First Reading: Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15

Moses came upon a burning bush, when God called out to him. God told Moses that he had seen the suffering of his people in Egypt, and intended to lead them from their captors to a land of milk and honey. Moses asked what he should say if the Israelites should ask what God wished to be called. God replied, "I am who am."

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Paul describes how the people were led into the desert by Moses, yet many of them were struck down by God. He warns that this should serve as an example not to give in to wicked desires or we may suffer the same downfall.

Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

Jesus says that an individual's misfortune does not mean that their sins were greater than someone else's. He warns that without repenting, all sinners will meet the same end. He tells of a barren fig tree whose owner planned to cut it down. But a servant offered to give it special care for one year, and destroy it should it remain barren. This symbolizes God's patience toward us..

THE CHASTE HEART OF ST. JOSEPH



St. Joseph is known as “the just man” and, as such, was a man of singular virtue. This strength of character, this reign of virtue, extended to all aspects of his life and his person—including his heart. His whole being was oriented to his God. His love was properly ordered, his affections purified. Unlike St. Joseph, we tend to struggle, and oftentimes fail, with matters of the heart. Our culture certainly does not hold the virtue of chastity in high esteem. Therefore, it can seem incredible to us that a man like Joseph was able to rise to the lofty challenge presented to him: to be the “chaste guardian of the Virgin” (and of *all* virgins) and the foster-father of the Son of God. Such a task requires both remarkable human virtue and unexcelled amounts of God’s grace. St. Joseph had both.

The tradition with regard to the age of St. Joseph varies (the Eastern Church holds that he was an old man, while the West concedes that he may have been much younger), but at the heart of the issue is the fact that it was Joseph’s *virtue*—not merely old age, lack of virility, or lethargic passions—that safeguarded the perpetual virginity of the Mother of God, and allowed him to guide and protect Mary and Jesus with such strength of pure love.

This should be a great consolation to us who still wander in this vale of tears, striving for

holiness. St. Joseph was a great man with a “most chaste heart” but whose love was certainly not cold. For this reason, the Diocese of Charlotte’s logo for the Year of St. Joseph depicts his Most Chaste Heart inflamed with love and adorned with the white lily of purity. The heart of St. Joseph should give us great hope that purity of heart lies within our reach, thanks to the grace of God and the intercession of Joseph-most-chaste!

LECTURAS DEL DOMINGO

Primera Lectura: Exodo 3:1-8a, 13-15

Moisés se acercó a una zarza en llamas, y entonces Dios lo llamó. Dios le dijo a Moisés que había visto el sufrimiento de su pueblo en Egipto, y que iba a sacarlos lejos de sus captores para llevarlos a la tierra de leche y miel. Moisés preguntó qué debía decir si los israelitas le preguntaran el nombre de Dios. Dios respondió: "Yo soy el que soy".

Segunda Lectura: 1 Corintios 10:1-6, 10-12

Pablo describe cómo Moisés guió a la gente por el desierto, a pesar que Dios destruyó a muchos. Pablo advierte que esto debe servir como un ejemplo para no desear lo malo y no sufrir las mismas consecuencias.

Evangelio: San Lucas 13:1-9

Jesús dice que el infortunio de una persona no significa que sus pecados sean mayores que los de otros. Advierte que sin arrepentimiento todos los pecadores sufrirán las mismas consecuencias. Cuenta la historia de una higuera que no daba fruto. Su dueño pensaba cortarla. Pero un sirviente ofreció darle cuidado especial, y destruirla al final de un año si no da fruto. Esto simboliza la paciencia que Dios nos tiene.

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Los Siete Dolores y Siete Gozos de San José

Una práctica que me atrajo temprano en mi creciente devoción a San José fueron las oraciones en honor de sus Siete Dolores y Siete Gozos. Durante este tiempo de Cuaresma, parece apropiado meditar en los dolores y alegrías de San José, y así obtener fuerza interior de este vigilante Guardián de la Sagrada Familia para nuestra propia vida espiritual.

1. Primer Dolor y Primera Alegría: La Duda de San José - el Mensaje del Ángel

En su libro Consagración a San José, el P. Donald Callo-way, MIC, describe los tres posibles motivos de la decisión de José de despedir a María, a los que llama Teoría de la duda, Teoría de la estupefacción y Teoría de la reverencia. No hace falta decir que prefiere la última teoría,

según la cual San José decidió dejar a María por reverencia a su embarazo otorgado por el Espíritu. Aunque era "un hombre justo", se sentía indigno de seguir cerca de este misterio. Dios aprobó esta humildad al enviar a su ángel para ordenarle a José en un sueño que "recibiera a María, tu esposa, en tu casa." José obedeció con alegría.

2. Segundo dolor y segunda alegría: la pobreza del nacimiento de Jesús - el nacimiento del Salvador

San José cuidó de su esposa, pero, cuando llegaron a Belén, no pudo proporcionarle un hogar donde dar a luz. Esto debe haberle preocupado mucho. El censo se produjo de repente, por lo que no había tenido mucho tiempo para planificar. Además, caminar desde Galilea con una esposa embarazada lo colocaría entre los últimos viajeros a Belén. Finalmente, no sabía cuántos descendientes de David descenderían sobre la ciudad de David. Su papel paternal de proteger y mantener a su familia se vio frustrado por estos obstáculos. Sin embargo, ¡qué alegría debió inundar su rostro al ver al niño Salvador dormido sobre el heno!

3. Tercer Dolor y Tercer Gozo: La Circuncisión - el Santo Nombre de Jesús

La Circuncisión de Jesús es el primer derramamiento de Su Preciosa Sangre. Este doloroso momento presagia a José y María la futura Pasión y Muerte de su Hijo. Pero mediante Su sufrimiento Él nos redimiría. En su primer derramamiento de sangre, recibe de José el santo nombre de Jesús, que significa "Dios salva". El ángel le pidió este nombre "porque salvará a su pueblo de sus pecados" (Mt 1,21). Sólo a José, el padre legal de Jesús, le fue dada la tarea de otorgar el Nombre que está sobre todo nombre al Hijo del Dios Vivo (ver Fil 2:9, Mt 16:16).

4. Cuarto dolor y cuarto gozo: La profecía de Simeón - Los efectos de la redención

La profecía de Simeón a María - que "una espada traspasará [su] alma" (Lucas 2:35a) - es la primera entre los Siete Dolores de María. Sin embargo, José también escuchó estas palabras. Aunque Simeón habla de la Pasión de Jesús, también implica la muerte de José, ya que no pudo defender a María de la espada. En su impotencia, José debió sentirse tranquilizado por las palabras posteriores de Simeón: "para que se manifiesten los pensamientos de muchos corazones" (Lc 2,35b). En efecto, la Pasión de Jesús y la compasión de María han revelado los pensamientos de muchos corazones, tanto a favor como en contra de Su Cruz. Sin embargo, aquellos que abrazan la cruz de Jesús con fe experimentan su salvación.

5. Quinto dolor y quinto gozo: La huida a Egipto - Derrocamiento de los ídolos en Egipto

El viaje a Belén fue agotador; La huida a Egipto fue aterrador. La joven Sagrada Familia tuvo que caminar a través de kilómetros de desierto, desafiando el clima y posiblemente bandidos. Cuando llegaron a Egipto, como registran los místicos, los ídolos cayeron ante el Rey recién nacido. Esto también se puede inferir de Isaías 19:1: "el Señor... viene a Egipto, y los ídolos de Egipto temblarán ante su presencia". Si Dagón cayó ante el Arca de la Alianza (ver 1 Sam 5:3-4), ¿cuántos ídolos egipcios más debieron haber caído ante María, el Arca de la Nueva Alianza, que llevaba a su niño Señor?

6. Sexto dolor y sexta alegría: el regreso de Egipto - La vida con Jesús y María en Nazaret

Aunque la vida en Egipto no pudo haber sido fácil para una familia cuya llegada estuvo asociada con la caída de sus ídolos, el regreso también fue difícil. Una vez más, las dificultades de viajar a pie por la naturaleza eran mucho mayores de lo que la mayoría de la gente en los países desarrollados modernos puede imaginar. Además, José temía regresar a Belén, ya que Arquelao, el hijo de Herodes, gobernaba el territorio. En cambio, José decidió ir al pequeño pueblo de Nazaret en Galilea. La vida en Nazaret debió ser profundamente alegre, ya que la pasó con María, la Inmaculada Concepción, y Jesús, el Rey de Reyes.

7. Séptimo dolor y séptimo gozo: Perder a Jesús en Jerusalén - Encontrarlo en el templo

Esta es la última mención de José durante su vida en la Biblia. La Sagrada Familia viajó ahora a Jerusalén en una caravana, y Jesús, a los 12 años, se movía fácilmente entre familiares y amigos. Cuando no lo encontraron en su viaje de regreso, ¡cuán ansiosos debieron estar sus padres! Cada hora de esa búsqueda de tres días debió parecer una eternidad. Al encontrarlo en el Templo, su ansiedad se transformó en alegría. ¡Estaba a salvo! Estaban perplejos ante sus enseñanzas tan jóvenes, pero podemos imaginar que José estaba orgulloso de él. Además, los ancianos probablemente honraron a José como padre y maestro del Niño.

José es honrado en la Iglesia con protodulia (honor como el primero entre los santos), sólo superado por la hiperdulia (el más alto grado de reverencia) reservada a la Santísima Virgen. La devoción a él se ha extendido por toda la Iglesia de nuestro tiempo, con inconmensurables beneficios para las almas. El gran apóstol de la devoción eucarística, San Pedro Julián Eymard, dijo una vez: "La devoción a San José es una de las gracias más

selectas que Dios puede dar a un alma, porque equivale a revelar todo el tesoro de las gracias de nuestro Señor. Cuando Dios quiere elevar un alma a mayores alturas, la une a San José dándole un fuerte amor por el buen santo."

La devoción a San José que comenzó para mí ese día de octubre me llevó casi de inmediato a descubrir la consagración a María, lo que avivó mi deseo y resolución de ser santo. Eso, a su vez, me llevó a los Padres Marianos de la Inmaculada Concepción, en los que felizmente he estado bajo votos durante casi cinco años. Desde entonces, he conocido a muchas otras personas que de manera similar aprendieron la devoción mariana a través de San José, o la devoción a San José a través de María.
