

A LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

By now I suppose we should be accustomed to unexpected or unwelcome changes. After all that has been the experience for the past year. Everything that once was is now different. The education environment, the place of work, the interaction with others, the manner in which we worship. And, then, along comes Ash Wednesday, prompting us to ask: Will it be different? Will it be the same? The answer can be rightly spoken as YES and NO!

Yes, it will be the same. Ash Wednesday will mark the beginning of the 40 day journey of Lent, leading us to acts of penance, works of charity, and more time spent in prayer.

Yes, it will be the same. Ash Wednesday will require Catholics to refrain from eating meat on that day as well as all the Fridays of Lent, including Good Friday. It will also mean that Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are to be days of fasting, meaning that only one main meal may be eaten.

Yes, it will be the same. The season of Lent will offer time for reflection on the suffering and death of Christ in the Friday devotion of Stations of the Cross.

Yes, it will be the same. Ash Wednesday and Lent will prompt a response to the words of the Prophet Joel: "Return to me with your whole heart, with fasting, and weeping, and mourning; rend your hearts, not your garments, and return to the Lord your God".

Yes, it will be the same. Palm Sunday and Holy Week will lead us through the Paschal Mystery of Christ in his suffering, death and resurrection.

No, it will not be the same. The distribution of ashes will have a different look and feel. Due to the pandemic, clergy will not mark a cross with ashes on people's foreheads, as is usually done in the United States. Directives from the Holy See, i.e., The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments have been sent to all dioceses outlining procedures that are already followed in many parts of the world. The manner in which ashes are to be distributed is as follows: clergy are to first bless the ashes, sprinkle them with holy water, and address all those present by saying one time, "Repent, and believe in the Gospel," or "Remember that you are dust, and unto dust you shall return." Then, instead of making the sign of the cross with ashes on the forehead of each person, the ashes will be sprinkled on top of their head. This method will help the priest, deacon or minister to avoid having direct contact with a large amount of people.

Whether or not ashes are received does not negate the importance of the season of Lent. It is my hope that everyone will take to heart the challenge and purpose of the 40 days. Self- sacrifice and denial are essential; works of charity cannot be overlooked; and additional time in prayer with the Lord is a critical part of growing in holiness. The expectation is that we say YES to all of it.



A Pastor's Expression of Gratitude

The words of Jesus come easily to mind: "Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them . . . when you give alms, do not blow a trumpet before you . . . do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret" (Matthew 6: 1-4).

I am mindful of this message because of what was done recently for Saint Joseph Church in the purchase of a new crucifix by an anonymous donor. Saint Scholastica Church was also the recipient of a separate anonymous donation that allowed for the painting of the statue of Saint Scholastica located at the entrance to the Vigil Candle room, the refurbishment of two chalices used at the altar during Mass, and the purchase of two candelabra used during the celebration of Benediction, and a lectern at the priest's chair.

In addition it was the generosity of a local contractor who did the work of hanging the new crucifix and taking the one down that hung in the center of Saint Joseph Church. That same contractor did the work and covered the expense of painting the wall around the crucifix in Saint Scholastica Church and the baptismal font area; moved the tabernacle to its new location behind the altar of sacrifice; and built the wall separating the sanctuary from the candle area as well as the platform from which the priest now presides. All done with the expressed desire for anonymity.

I am so grateful to these individuals for giving of their time, talent and treasure. May the Lord bless them for what they have done for two of our churches. In that same Gospel passage from Saint Matthew, Jesus says further: "And your Father who sees in secret will repay you."

Question: Carnivale and Mardi Gras celebrations are linked to Ash Wednesday, Lent, fast and abstinence. Can you tell us more about the connections between these events?

Answer: Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the forty days known as Lent. Every year, Christians highlight this penitential season as a time of self-examination, reformation of one's life, and continued development of a deeper spiritual life. The recommended practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving become the focus of Lenten activity and ritual. Each of these spiritual practices is aimed at personal discipline as well as continued concern for the other, especially the poor or alienated.

Forty days is a symbolic biblical period of time, during which personal transformation occurs and out of which people surface as more spiritual, ready to carry out God's mission. Relying on God's providence and care, no matter how difficult life becomes, is crucial to Lenten spirituality. Fasting was initially stricter, permitting only one simple meal a day without meat, fish, or other delicacies. Such things were not even allowed in the house.

In order to prepare for this in an age of no refrigeration, people gathered to consume whatever was not allowed during Lent. This led to parties or celebrations originally referred to as Carnivale, literally meaning "goodbye to meat," or Mardi Gras, literally meaning "Fat Tuesday." The eating and celebrating ended on the Tuesday just before Ash Wednesday. Today we focus more on moderation in all things, as well as a strong concern the poor.
