

Br. Martin: 2020's reshuffling showcased resiliency

Many people view 2020 as a "lost" year because of COVID.

"I think we learned that through the grace of God, anything is possible," said

Thoughts of postponing

Midkiff said Brother Martin considered postponing camp in 2020 when there were so many uncertainties surrounding the pandemic, but he said administrators decided to move forward.

"We sat down and basi-

focus in mind - what could we do to make camp safe for our campers?" Midkiff said. "So we had masks all the time, hand sanitizing stations, groups and subgroups and even more subgroups so that if we did get a positive case, only six people had to be quarantined, not the entire camp. We used multiple buses when we went on field trips. We reserved the entire facility. We did everything we could for campers to experience a good summer. Our one focus was on the kids."

Midkiff said Camp Crusader ran at about 75% ca-



pacity from previous years, basically because of more stringent limitations on indoor capacity.

"We wanted to make sure we were in compliance with city, state and CDC regulations," he said.

Kids didn't bat an eye

His young campers took everything in stride.

"As we get older, we forget how resilient we were as kids," Midkiff said. "They take better care of things than we do. When you're older, you get stuck in your ways. We definitely learned that things can be done in a different way. You put great minds together, and you can accomplish so much."

In addition to sports, Crusader Camp is adding two new options this year: band and academic games.

"We've offered STEM and art as part of our non-athletic selections, and these new additions will be good for the boy who maybe doesn't want to play basketball or something else," Midkiff said.

Cost of Crusader Camp is \$140 per week and \$740 for all six weeks. There are discounts for multiple campers from the same family, and walkup registration is available. Beforecare, starting at 7:30 a.m., is free; aftercare is available until 5 p.m.; lunch is available for \$25 per week or \$5 a day.

Brother Martin also will offer specialty camps in baseball, basketball, football, lacrosse, soccer, tennis and wrestling (fees, dates and ages vary. See list, page 12). Instruction for all specialty camps will be provided by Brother Martin staff or varsity coaches and players.

Ursuline to offer 'Camp U,' specialty sports camps

At Ursuline Academy's "Camp U," children are immersed in professionally led arts and STEM-based activities while building friendships through a variety of fun, hands-on pursuits.

Camp U rolls out over eight weeks June 7-July 30. The camp day runs from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., with extended care available. Camp will be closed Monday, July 5, in observance of the Independence Day holiday.

The camp is open to girls ages 3 through rising seventh graders; the camp also invites 3-year-old through rising kindergartner boys to enroll in Camp U's Early Childhood division.

"We'll have activities in robotics, coding and Challenge Island, which is a virtual STEM-based program," said Mallory Martin, Camp U's director and Ursuline's aftercare director.

"One thing that will be new this year is that we will be able to have our girls in our new Smart Lab," Martin added. "It has everything the girl needs to be an engineer – so, there's everything from robotics materials to coding to building materials. The point of a STEM lab really is to teach them to be problem solvers and to work collaboratively."

"Last year, we did some really cool galaxy T-shirts with bleach and spray paint," Martin recalled. "We also did commercial making. Each week, the class was given a little challenge, and they would work together to make commercials to share with the rest of the camp."

In-house field trips

Wednesdays are reserved as a midweek "flex day" to accommodate water activities. movies and in-house and virtual field trips. For example, campers will be able to receive a virtual art lesson from the Ogden Museum and follow up with a hands-on component in the classroom. and canvas painting.

Martin is proud of how the camp provided safe, fun and enriching experiences for campers last summer, while adhering to all safety guidelines. It attracted 70 campers by summer's end.

"Last summer, I planned camp as if we were going to be in Phase 1," Martin said, "so, when camp started, and we actually were in Phase 2, it was nice because we had (smaller) group numbers. This year, I am planning for a more restrictive summer, in the hope that we'll be able to be a little more laid back. Last year, the campers had to stay in the classroom and the teachers would come to them; this year, we're hoping they'll be able to travel to each specialist teacher."

The weekly cost of Camp

a non-refundable, weekly registration fee of \$25 registration fee and one camp T-shirt. Additional shirts are available for \$10 each. Two discounts are available for families who enroll their children in four or eight weeks of camp: Those who register for four weeks will receive a \$100 discount, while those who register for the full eight weeks receive a \$200 break.

Campers can bring their own lunch and snacks from home or pre-purchase the camp's dining plan for a weekly cost of \$35. The latter option features soup, salad, choice of entree, vegetable, fruit and dessert provided by SAGE, Ursuline's regular dining service provider, as well as two daily snacks.

Beforecare (7:30 to 8:30 a.m.) is available for \$35 per week: aftercare (3:30-5:30 p.m.) is provided for an additional weekly cost of \$70.

the Academy of the Sacred Heart to create a camp schedule on the fly, and participation was limited to current students, with each division hosting age-appropriate activities.

The good news is that administrators knew as early as January 2021 that they would once again be hosting a fullfledged camp program.

"We had been in school since August (2020) and followed all the COVID protocols to allow our students to stay in school safely," said Blamphin, who added that the experience of following the guidelines has helped with the preparations for this year's summer camp. "We feel like we're taking steps in the right direction toward return-

COVID-19 restrictions forced | ing to normalcy. Returning to school this year was a big step in that right direction, and this is another step on that path. We're very excited."

On-campus as precaution

As a safety precaution against COVID-19, campers will remain on campus in static cohorts throughout the summer and receive a temperature check each morning. Counselors will be vigilant in having campers wash their hands and follow other protocols.

The camp day runs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Blamphin said flexible scheduling allows parents the chance to take a summer vacation but bring their child back to camp whenever they are back home.

"We're trying to give parents flexibility and choice," she said. "They do have options."

The camp will be divided into Early Childhood and Lower School (ages 1 through grade 4) and Middle School (those entering grades 5-8). There will also be a Grammar Boot Camp for students entering grades 7-8 and an Academic Prep program for rising seniors, who will get help finishing their common application for college enrollment.

Campers always on the move at St. Christopher

Having successfully operated its popular camp last summer in the midst of the pandemic, St. Christopher in Metairie is more excited than ever to be gearing up for its 2021 summer program, seven weeks of fun set for June 7-July 23.

Open to boys and girls in grades pre-K3 through 7, the camp, a local staple for about 45 years, safely welcomed about 150 happy campers last summer.

"They were thrilled to be here!" said Sarah Todd, who co-directs the camp with Lindsay Naquin, her fellow St. Christopher pre-kindergarten teacher. "We were really happy to provide the service as best we could, especially to our St. Christopher community. It gave parents a lot of hope and leeway and activities for their children. They were very, very thankful that we were able to pull it off, with so many obstacles in their lives."

The camp day runs from 8:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., with beforecare available beginning at 7 a.m., and aftercare, which includes a snack, available through 6 p.m.

Off-campus swimming will take place this summer, with alternating groups of campers transported to Riverside Country Club in Harahan on



a week, Monday through Thursday," Todd said. "All of our campers go - from pre-K all the way up. The pre-K'ers go into a little wading pool."

Campers, who have use of St. Christopher's classrooms, outdoor spaces, cafeteria and large gym, play fun sports such as foam-bat baseball. kickball and soccer. Twice-aweek arts and crafts sessions will feature painting, ceramics, coloring and making Fathers' Day gifts, Todd said.

"We're going to be having theme days on Fridays," Todd said, citing "Sports Day," on which campers can wear the jersey of their favorite team; and other dress-down days a Jefferson Parish school bus. in which campers make their

as their favorite Disney or Marvel character. The camp's famous weekly

sno-balls will definitely be on tap, but Todd said it was yet to be determined if the cool treats would be transported to campus or if the campers would walk to a nearby stand.

Likewise, field trips, a camp hallmark, await confirmation until more is known about venues' willingness to accept groups, Todd said. On-campus visits by the Zoo Mobile, karate instructors, inflatables, an art bus and inflatables are also being planned, she added.

Clean, safe, vigilant

Todd said it was too early to know if face masks will be required by the time camp starts. Currently, St. Christopher students in kindergarten and older must wear a face mask at school. Last summer, St. Christopher campers ages 8 and older were required to wear them when the mandate was announced, said Todd, looking back proudly at the camp's commitment to safety.

> "We took temperatures; the cafeteria food was served in closed containers and brought to the classrooms to make it safer for the chil-Safety measures that served dren," she said. "We had vol-

unteers who sprayed down every piece of play equipment after it was used. We just tried the best we could to follow every mandate possible."

Weekly camp tuition, which includes two daily snacks, is \$175 per week, with discounts available for multiple weeks and multiple children. There is also a nonrefundable registration fee of \$50 per child (discounts for multiple children), which includes two camp T-shirts. A deposit of \$175 per family, which goes toward camp tuition, is due at registration.

Campers may bring their own lunch or purchase it in the cafeteria for a reasonable cost. Water bottles brought from home can be refilled at campus filling stations.

"When camp is up and running, we definitely do as much as we can with the children. We don't stay put; they're constantly moving from one place to another," Todd said. "We really do provide a lot for them to do. They get their money's worth!"

Campers must be fully potty trained. In-person registration will be held in April in the parish center, 3900 Derbigny St., Metairie. Immaculate Conception will stay close to home

"The response has been overwhelming," said camp director Scott Walker about Immaculate Conception's 2021 summer camp.

Open to students ages 3-12, Immaculate Conception camp will have two sessions this summer: June 1-25 and July 5-23, weekdays from 8:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

Walker, who has been director for 15 years and is the school's athletic director, middle school PE teacher and community relations and special events director, said the camp, just like the school, adheres to the values of the Salesians.

"Why wouldn't you send your child here?" Walker asked. "We are based in the Salesian formation of reason, religion and loving kindness. That Salesian charism permeates everything we do. That family atmosphere is tangible. You can feel it is a home here, and the kids are at ease."

Will use large campus

Not knowing what pandemic phase the New Orleans area will be in this summer, Immaculate Conception decided that there will be no off-campus field trips this summer. Money was reinvested in upgrading daily activities, Walker said.

The 2021 camp will include a slime fun day, a water slide,

A full-time nurse will ensure that proper protocol and procedures related to COVID-19 are followed and normal bumps and bruises are addressed.

Immaculate Conception is located at 4520 Sixth St. in Marrero. Stress-free, preregistration runs through April 30 online with a \$35 non-refundable registration fee per child. Cost is \$135 weekly for one child; \$255 weekly for two children or \$375 weekly for three children; this includes a camp T-shirt, activities and oncampus events.

Camp Marymount goes overboard to keep campers safe

Camp Marymount, a 340acre residential Catholic camp for girls and boys in the Diocese of Nashville, has been in business for 81 years, and it's fair to say it went through a test of fire in 2020 in keeping campers safe during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Camp director Tommy Hagey, who has directed Camp Marymount for nearly 25 years, said what his staff and counselors pulled off last summer was amazing, and that success has led to new ways of keeping campers even safer than they have been over the decades.

"We have two girls' and two boys' sessions, and last year we shut down the first girls' session because we needed extra time to prepare and create a lot of different policies and procedures," Hagey said. "We opened up for the other three sessions, and we had zero COVID cases."

Parents were ecstatic

Hagey said at the end of each session, as parents picked up their kids, they were so excited that their children actually had been allowed to interact with each other that "they were handing us donations as they were driving out."

"I've been in this position for nearly 25 years and I've never seen parents so grateful that we had opened up,"

camp in our area to really give kids a taste of normalcy because they had canceled in-person school in our area. All these kids had been locked up in front of computers."

Among the innovations Camp Marymount installed last year were additional hand-washing stations, which were located throughout the rustic landscape, far from any running water.

"We custom-built those hand-washing stations in places where we didn't even have any water - we created some reservoir tanks and backed up pickup trucks with water to fill the tanks," Hagey said. "As the kids passed those, it was mandatory for them to

Hagey said. "We were the first | wash their hands. We'll definitely keep those going this year. Not only did we have no COVID cases, but we also saw other little things like impetigo (a skin rash) go way down."

With health issues looking so much better this year, Hagey said camp enrollment is up 45%. He thinks those strong numbers are the result of "word of mouth that we ran a COVID-free camp and that our policies are still in place."

As the rate of vaccination across the country increases, Hagey said, Camp Marymount will look at ways of modifying its camp schedule even more.

Camp Marymount is "rus-

tic" in more ways than its natural setting. No electronics are allowed, which means the kids have a break from constant electronic stimulation and learn to enjoy the wooded surroundings.

"This camp is about getting back to 'old school,'" Hagey said.

The land in middle Tennessee is a perfect setting for four overnight summer sessions - two for girls, and two for boys – to rising first graders through rising 11th graders. Campers come from all over the United States as well Mexico and Canada.

"While most of our recruiting takes place in local parishes, churches and schools, many of our campers come to us through word of mouth," Hagey said. "It's not uncommon for campers to begin when they enter first grade and return each summer, bringing friends from home with them."

Junior. senior camps

There is a Junior Camp (rising first graders through rising seventh graders) and a Senior Camp (rising eighth graders through rising 11th graders). Junior Camp is more structured, with campers rotating through three to four activities each day, along with swimming lessons and an option to get out on the lake.

Senior Camp allows campers to be more self-sufficient, and campers participate in activities such as a one- to three-day camping excursion and other offsite adventures.

Camp activities include archery, arts and crafts, nature, wrestling (boys), fishing, riflery, horseback riding, canoeing, wilderness awareness, gardening, water sports, frisbee golf, athletics, tomahawk toss, drance (drama and dance), yard games, newspaper, campfire cooking and swim lessons.

Girls' sessions are May 30-June 11 and June 13-July 2. Boys' sessions are July 11-16 and July 18-30. There are discounts available in the pricing structure. The schedule includes a morning and evening prayer service each day.
