My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior.—The Lord has exalted me by a gift so great, so unheard of, that language is useless to describe it; and the depths of love in my heart can scarcely grasp it. I offer then all the powers of my soul in praise and thanksgiving. As I contemplate his greatness, which knows no limits, I joyfully surrender my whole life, my senses, my judgement, for my spirit rejoices in the eternal Godhead of that Jesus, that Savior, whom I have conceived in this world of time.

The Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his name. My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord.—Only that soul for whom the Lord in his love does great things can proclaim his greatness with fitting praise and encourage those who share her desire and purpose. Those who know the Lord, yet refuse to proclaim his greatness and sanctify his name to the limit of their power, will be considered the least in the kingdom of heaven. His name is called holy because in the sublimity of his unique power he surpasses every creature and is far removed from all that he has made.

He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy.—Israel is an obedient and humble servant, in the words of Hosea: Israel was a servant, and I loved him. Those who refuse to be humble cannot be saved. They cannot say with the prophet: See, God comes to my aid; the Lord is the helper of my soul. But anyone who makes himself humble like a little child is greater in the kingdom of heaven.

The promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children for ever.—This does not refer to the physical descendants of Abraham, but to his spiritual children. These are his descendants, sprung not from the flesh only, but who, whether circumcised or not, have followed him in faith. Circumcised as he was, Abraham believed, and this was credited to him as an act of righteousness. The coming of the Savior was promised to Abraham and to his descendants for ever. These are the children of promise. But it is right that, before the birth of the Lord or of John, their mothers should utter prophecies; for just as sin began with a woman, so too does redemption. Through the deceit of one woman, grace perished; but the prophecies of two women announce its return to life. —St. Bede (+735)


Welcome to Sacred Heart Parish



Social Justice Corner

I love Christmas—I always have, even through lean times and luxury; I love the lights and the music and the food and the Christian mystery that surrounds the season. It is one of the best and most heroic stories, after all: to rescue us all from darkness, the Lord of Creation sends his only son disguised as a tiny, vulnerable infant. The God of all sends his tiny son not into some golden palace or lofty castle, but to a young unknown woman and birth in a manger, the lowest of the low, a stable built for livestock, out in the cold. The root of the word 'manger' comes from the Latin manducat—to chew—and a manger is merely a trough for livestock, after all. Christ was born and laid in a manger, where the ox and ass chewed their food-and so he was to be for us, food for the world, but a better and supersubstantial food, more than anything we could ever want or need.

So in this season, as we do every year, let us remember those who go without food or shelter, those we see as the lowest of low, those who annoy or frighten us because they are different, or poor, or unfamiliar in face and language. Make room for them at the table. Let us remember that God came to us as an infant in rags, without a home, without even a proper bed, and that angels sang over a cowshed to announce him. Let us not ask how God can allow the violence of war or the cruelty of racism, or the profound misery of dire poverty, but rather why we allow these things. Let us bring the warmth of Christ's love to everyone we meet, and strive in all ways to make Christ's kingdom manifest on earth in this coming year.
