



Sharing in a Time of Fear and Self-Preservation

I had to make a trip to the store the other day to pick up some essential items for the family, and what I saw is an all too common situation these days... empty shelves: no peanut butter, no bread, canned goods nearly wiped out. And as a father of eight children, I felt something rise up in me, a mixture of panic and responsibility. In this moment it was so easy to turn all of my attention to me and my family, and to what we needed. There is something natural, and good, in us that wants to safeguard our own lives and take care of the people we are responsible for. But as I reflected upon this through the lens of the Gospel, I was reminded of another way: the way of selflessness, generosity, and concern for others.

The great paradox of the Gospel is found in these words of our Lord, "Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Mt 16:25). It would seem that the way to make sure you're taken care of is to turn your attention on yourself and look out for number one, but Jesus tells us the opposite. He shows us that the way to truly attain life is by giving ours away.

But what are we to make of this in the situation we're in now? I wish I had the ability to see into the future, to know how long with was going to last or how everything is going to play out. But I don't have the ability (and probably for good reason). But what I do know is that what's going to get us through this is not an abandonment of the Gospel but a deeply clinging to it. The way of the world will tell us to forget about everyone else and just take care of yourself. But the Gospel reminds us that we are our brothers and sisters keepers, fellow pilgrims through this life, and therefore that we are both dependent upon and responsible for each other. And now, more than ever, is the time to not close in on ourselves but to forge stronger bonds of solidarity and mutual care.

I am reminded of a section of the Sermon

on the Mount, where Jesus says, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat [or drink], or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds in the sky: they do not sow or reap, they gather nothing into barns, yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you more important than they? Can any of you by worrying add a single moment to your life-span? Why are you anxious about clothes? Learn from the way the wild flowers grow. They do not work or spin. But I tell you that even Solomon in all his splendor was clothed like one of them. If God so clothes the grass of the field, which grows today and is thrown into the oven tomorrow, will he not much more provide for you, O you of little faith? So do not worry and say, 'What are we to eat?' or 'What are we to drink?' or 'What are we to wear?' All these things the pagans seek. Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom [of God] and his righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides" (Mt 6:25-33).

For the longest time, these words of Jesus perplexed me. Sure, it sounded great... "don't worry, God will take care of you." But in reality, I never felt as though what God was telling us here was to not plan ahead, not worry about a job, or feeding our family, or taking care of our responsibilities. So, what exactly was it? And what exactly does it mean to "seek first the kingdom" and then all these things would be given to us?

Well, I think a beginning to an answer can be found in Matthew 25, in Jesus' last public teaching before his arrest and crucifixion. In these final words of our Lord he provides a picture of his return and the standard by which we will be judged as worthy of the Kingdom. There we read, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and

you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me... Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Mt 25:34-36, 40).

When combining these two concepts, it seemed to be that the mark of those who had truly understood the Gospel and embodied it in their lives were those who had become not anxious for themselves, but those concerned for their neighbor, especially their vulnerable neighbors in need. Perhaps this is what it means to seek first the kingdom – to seek to love rather than to be loved, to seek to serve rather than to be served, to be occupied with the good of others, rather than focusing just on our own needs.

Now, that being said, this does not do away with the legitimate (and even praiseworthy) concerns that we have in these challenging times. I know that for many of us, these can be scary times, and that the uncertainty of the future places a heavy burden on our minds and hearts... as a father of eight, I feel this too. But, the answer to this uncertainty is found in Jesus Christ and the Gospel. The sparing/sharing way of the Gospel is what the world needs now more than ever. In these difficult times, let us be a witness to a better way than what we see around us. Let us be people of love and concern for our neighbor. When we come to understand our common origin and our common destiny, we begin to see material things in their proper light; as a gift to be used not only for our own good but for the service and well-being of others.

None of this is easy, I admit. But my prayer is that in these times of difficulty we would turn all the more to the way of the Gospel. To be light in dark times, and hope in a world struggling to hold on. Let us turn to the Lord, turn to each other, and let our hearts be more and more conformed to the heart of Christ.
