

Reflection on the Holy Family

When I think of the Holy Family, I contemplate a God who is in love with our humanity, a God who desires to share in what it means to be a human. This God is eager to become like us, even to the point of clothing himself in the flesh of a Virgin, feeding at her breast, dependent upon her, so as to be able to live and give us life.

Jesus is not born of Mary by some accident, nor is Joseph a step father by chance. They are chosen from within eternity for an incredible mission: to raise the God who created them. Is there anything outside the grasp of God? God prepared Mary and Joseph before their conception; it was a fruit of God's loving mind, and afterward, God breathed life into them and coached them for what was to come. God knew all the while what was to come. And it is that way with each of us. We are not the result of chance, and He has already given a mission to you and one to me, and God has trained us for that mission.

Do you want to know the difference between the Sacred Family and our families? I want to share with you that you and I, our families, are very similar to the Holy Family of Jesus. Your family also has been called and chosen by God for a marvelous plan of salvation in your family history and much more. Your family is called by God to give God's light to children, so that they grow in stature, wisdom, and grace, and so that those things are found in the next generations. Your mission is to take care of the hearts of children and not allow anyone else to extinguish their love of Christ. Your family has been called to be a sign in the world that Jesus continues to be born in our society, in our Christian service, in our words.

The model of family that the Church gives us in Jesus, Joseph, and Mary is not a lofty and unreachable ideal. They were a normal family! They had problems, difficulties, were rejected when they asked for lodging in Bethlehem which was the homeland of Joseph. Mary had to give birth in a place designed for animals to give birth. They had to flee their homeland to save the life of their Child from Herod. They experienced great tests, similar to the ones we go through, but they never lost their trust in the plan of God.

If there is a small difference between that family and our families, and it is good to ask this question in our hearts, the question is how is my faith? Mary and Joseph's faith made their family a holy family. So it has nothing to do with the many sufferings in our lives, but rather the way in which we suffer and put our trust in God's hands. That is the key to deep peace and truth in the middle of adversity and in joys. The one who doesn't have God has nothing, which is the same as saying that the person who experiences life in God's arms has it all. Helpless God, God the baby, innocent God, God who needs to be taken care of, and from that same One comes salvation.

I hope that in these days of Christmas, the Holy Family might teach us the value of faith in our homes and help us complete in faith the plan that God has given each of us in our families. I hope we can do this without worry over the risks needed to be taken and that we discover the value of the small things which teach us to love Jesus.
