

When my youngest son was in fourth grade, he came home from St. Basil School with this announcement: "We're Irish!" His teacher, Irish through-and-through, spent the month of March teaching the kids about Ireland, reading "Nory Ryan's Song" to them, and teaching them about St. Patrick and the Holy Trinity. She made homemade Irish soda bread for a taste of Ireland, and she often arranged for the kids to witness some Irish dancing. So, when my son declared, "We're Irish!" my response was, "No, we're not." Well, he insisted, and I told him our ancestry was French Canadian, Czech, and Dutch. To that, he replied, in his best imitation of an Irish accent, "My teacher says there's a little bit 'o Irish in everybody!"

I remember the year that St. Patrick's Day fell on a Friday in Lent, and Bishop Murray gave the diocese a special dispensation to allow corned beef on that day of abstinence provided they chose a different day of the week to abstain from meat. Many happy Catholics in southwest Michigan that year!

When my kids were little we celebrated Valentine's Day with an all red meal (red meat, beets, red rice) and St. Patrick's Day with green food —I used food coloring to turn the pancake batter green and served them breakfast for dinner. Traditionally, many people participate in the wearin' o' the green, drinking and eating excessively on this saint's day. However, looking at the work of St. Patrick, he should be celebrated for his missionary work in Ireland, spending forty years converting the pagans to Christianity.

After the leprechauns have gone home, after the green beer has been consumed, when the corned beef and cabbage are a gastronomic memory, and the celebrations are over on March 17, what can we do to honor St. Patrick who evangelized to the people for forty years? How can we share the Good News of Jesus to our friends and neighbors?

Cuando mi hijo menor estaba en cuarto grado, llegó a casa de la escuela St. Basilio con este anuncio: "¡Somos irlandeses!" Su maestra, irlandesa al máximo, pasó el mes de marzo enseñando a los niños sobre Irlanda, leyéndoles "La Canción de Nory Ryan," y enseñándoles sobre San Patricio y la Santísima Trinidad. Hacía pan de soda irlandés casero para una prueba de comida Irlandesa y, a menudo, organizaba que los niños presenciaran algunos bailes irlandeses. Entonces, cuando mi hijo declaró: "¡Somos irlandeses!" Mi respuesta fue: "No, no lo somos." Bueno, insistió, y le dije que nuestra ascendencia era francocanadiense, checa y holandesa. A eso, respondió, en su mejor imitación de un acento irlandés: "¡Mi maestra dice que hay un poco de irlandés en todos!".

Recuerdo el año en que el Día de San Patricio cayó en viernes de Cuaresma, y el obispo Murray le dio a la diócesis una dispensa especial para permitir la carne en conserva en ese día de abstinencia, solo que eligieran un día diferente de la semana para abstenerse de carne. ¡Muchos católicos felices en el suroeste de Michigan ese año!

Cuando mis hijos eran pequeños, celebrábamos el Día de San Valentín con una comida exclusivamente roja (carne roja, remolacha, arroz rojo) y el Día de San Patricio con comida verde. Usé colorante alimentario para darle color verde a la masa de los panqueques y les serví el desayuno para la cena. Tradicionalmente participamos en vestir el verde, beber y comer en exceso en el día de este santo. Sin embargo, al observar la obra de San Patricio, debería ser celebrado por su labor misionera en Irlanda, donde pasó cuarenta años convirtiendo a los paganos al cristianismo.

Después de que los duendes se hayan ido a casa, después de que se haya consumido la cerveza verde, cuando la carne en conserva y el repollo sean un recuerdo gastronómico, y las celebraciones terminen el 17 de marzo, ¿qué podemos hacer para honrar a San Patricio que evangelizó al pueblo de su patria? ¿Cómo podemos compartir las Buenas Nuevas de Jesús con nuestros amigos y vecinos?
