

By the time you read this, we may have a new pope. But as I write it, we are between pontiffs, and in this moment a few thoughts about Francis come to mind. These are by no means exhaustive, nor do they claim to be the most important moments in his papacy. They're just a couple of things that come to my mind, and so now they will come to yours.

Francis illuminated Catholic Social Doctrine's first theme (On the Life and Dignity of Every Human Person) with his advocacy of a more equitable and just distribution of the earth's resources, Francis shows the way to protect the life and dignity of those who are poor: "You pray for the hungry, and then you feed them. That is how prayer works."

A friend reminded me a few days ago of a young boy named Emanuele, who, given the opportunity to ask a question of the Holy Father in a public setting, asked if his recently deceased father, a professed atheist who nevertheless had Emanuele baptized as an infant, could be in heaven. Sharing this question with the crowd, Francis answered this way: "Do you think God would ever leave a man like this far from him? Does God abandon his children?" The crowd shouted back, "No!" Turning back to Emanuele, Francis added, "This is the answer, Emanuele. Surely God was proud of your father. Because it is easier, being a believer, to baptize your children than to baptize them when you are not a believer. And your father had the courage to do that." He then encouraged the boy to continue honoring his father in prayer. "Pray for your father. Speak to your father," he told him.

Some say Pope Francis tended to confuse people. Maybe he did, a little. It is confusing, after all, when we first begin the transition from being told what to do to thinking for ourselves. Francis challenged us, as Catholics, to think for ourselves — not in a way that simply allows us to make up our own rules, guidelines, and morality, but to take the input that the Church, along with the scriptures, our intelligence, and our experience offer us, and, entering into prayer, find the way forward. This is pastoral, it's Jesuit, and it's Catholic. Francis affirms the value and goodness of Catholic faith as a way of life that makes people and our earthly home better.

May he rest in peace, and may we learn well what he has taught us.

Para cuando lean esto, puede que tengamos un nuevo papa. Pero mientras escribo, estamos entre pontífices, y en este momento me vienen a la mente algunas reflexiones sobre Francisco. No son exhaustivas, ni pretenden ser los momentos más importantes de su papado. Son solo un par de cosas que me vienen a la mente, y ahora se las traerán a ustedes.

Francisco iluminó el primer tema de la Doctrina Social Católica (Sobre la vida y la dignidad de toda persona humana) con su defensa de una distribución más equitativa y justa de los recursos de la tierra. Francisco muestra cómo proteger la vida y la dignidad de los pobres: "Rezas por los hambrientos y luego los alimentas. Así es como funciona la oración."

Un amigo me recordó hace unos días a un niño llamado Emanuele, quien, al tener la oportunidad de hacerle una pregunta al Santo Padre en público, preguntó si su padre, recientemente fallecido y ateo declarado, que sin embargo lo había bautizado de bebé, podría estar en el cielo. Al compartir esta pregunta con la multitud, Francisco respondió así: "¿Creen que Dios dejaría a un hombre así lejos de sí? ¿Acaso Dios abandona a sus hijos?". La multitud gritó: "¡No!". Volviéndose hacia Emanuele, Francisco añadió: "Esta es la respuesta, Emanuele. Seguramente Dios estaba orgulloso de tu padre. Porque es más fácil, siendo creyente, bautizar a tus hijos que bautizarlos cuando no lo eres. Y tu padre tuvo el valor de hacerlo". Luego animó al niño a seguir honrando a su padre en oración. "Reza por tu padre. Habla con tu padre", le dijo.

Algunos dicen que el Papa Francisco tendía a confundir a la gente. Quizás lo hacía, un poco. Después de todo, es confuso cuando comenzamos la transición de que nos digan qué hacer a pensar por nosotros mismos. Francisco nos retó, como católicos, a pensar por nosotros mismos, no de una manera que simplemente nos permita crear nuestras propias reglas, directrices y moralidad, sino a tomar las aportaciones que la Iglesia, junto con las Escrituras, nuestra inteligencia y nuestra experiencia, nos ofrecen, y, entrando en oración, encontrar el camino a seguir. Esto es pastoral, es jesuita y es católico. Francisco afirma el valor y la bondad de la fe católica como una forma de vida que mejora a las personas y nuestro hogar terrenal

Que descanse en paz y que aprendamos bien lo que nos ha enseñado.


75th Anniversary Gala Fundraiser


