
National Junior Honor Society



It is every parent's nightmare: the distracted driving of one teen causing the

death of another teen. At the heart of the 2018 Catholic Middle

School Mock



Trial Program was whether this particular distracted driving rose to the level of manslaughter. Hosted by St. John's University School of Law and organized by St. Brigid/Our Lady of Hope Regional School, 12 schools and over 200 students participated in the program that took place on May 19, 2018. Our Lady of Victory School sent three teams to the Mock Trial Program, two prosecution teams and one defense team.

This year's case, <u>People v. Terry O'Neal</u>, was a criminal homicide case. Terry O'Neal, the Defendant, is a high school senior who was

the driver in a one-car accident that killed one of his passengers; his best



friend's little

sister. Due to the police expert's report that the Defendant's speeding and distracted driving created an unjustified risk of harm, the Defendant was charged with Manslaughter in the Second Degree. Each side had three witnesses to support



their version of events. The case raised serious issues about what type of behavior should be deemed by society to be so reckless that it should be punishable by the law.

During the course of preparing for the trial, OLV's 6th, 7th and 8th grade students analyzed different aspects of the case. The students were briefed on the applicable law and were taught the technique of asking witnesses questions. As a group, they assessed the strengths and weaknesses of the case and learned how to handle the good facts as well as the bad facts. They had a chance to see the law in action and to begin thinking critically about the law as a force for social good. The students practiced public speaking and with each week, their self-confidence grew.

This year's teams were moderated by Miss Varrassi, coached by attorney Mrs. Heather McClintock and consisted of the following students: representing the Prosecution were: Finbar McClintock, Casey May, Joseph Bonagura, Cailey Rodgers, Meaghan Hayes, Rebecca Smith, Tommy Van Riper, Madeline Krug, Patrick Logan, Greg Alcusky, Patrick Mulryan, Brendan Carroll, Tommy Mansfield, Jessica Lindskog, Michael Killen, Marygrace McClintock, Jack McNavich, Madison Firoz, Gianna Feglia, Bridget Alcusky, Gavin Logan, Madison Grgas, Nora Butler and Matthew Fogarty; representing the Defense were: David Vessey, Brendan Reed, Declan Boyle, Daniel McNavich, Julianne Foley, Justin Dunn, Clodagh Kenneally, Jeremy Martinez, Emma Foley, Akayla McEwan, Owen Moloney and Sophia Ieraci.

The students were fortunate to receive some litigation tips from attorney and litigator Mr. John Nicolini. After listening to each side present its case, Mr. Nicolini offered some practical advice using examples from his own litigation experience. Mr. Nicolini's guidance helped the students to focus on the most important parts of their role in the trial. His visits to the club were exciting for all and the team is grateful for his contribution. Thank you, Mr. Nicolini!

As the judge aptly stated at the conclusion

of the program, the level of effort and preparation that the students demonstrated indicated that they will be successful in any career they choose; and their moderator and coach couldn't agree more.

In Our Classes

Early Childhood

Our Nursery children had a great year...and now they are ready for Pre-K! Think back to when they first started. Wow! They have grown so much and have had so much fun while learning and playing with their classmates.

We spent the last few weeks talking about how we always need to thank God, and we shared how we can care for God's creations. We learned about the parts of a plant and then planted grass seed, making sure they had enough sunlight and water each day. We made them into "Grass Heads" by adding silly faces. We studied the life cycles of a chick, frog, and butterfly, too. The children then colored in their Creation Booklets to show how much they appreciate all that God gives us. We learned the Hail Mary prayer and know that we should also pray to Mary, our Mother, to help us to be good listeners.

We worked on understanding various math concepts, such bia/small. as tallest/shortest, 1 to 1 correspondence, matching, sorting, etc. We practiced with scissors and did lots of coloring and gluing. We did this while we completed all activities for letters U-Z. We used watercolors to paint an umbrella for letter U. For letter V we created a flower-filled vase and had "Show and Tell," sharing what we did on a trip or vacation. For W we used watercolors to paint a whale. We also made a mobile showing ways to care for our earth and learned a few songs, such as Our Big Earth,

Boom De Yada, and He's Got the Whole World in His Hands. We sang these songs with our guests at Special Person's Day, using props to make it fun! Our guests and the children had a blast! For letter X, we made a xylophone craft with all the colors of the rainbow and had an X Band, marching and making music with wooden sticks. For letter Y we used watercolors to paint a yak, and for letter Z we played "Pin the Tail on Zachary Zebra" and completed a zebra craft. The children then finished stamping in their ABC Books. For Mother's Day we colored a picture of Mary and gave our moms a poem, "Who Will Be My Angel?" We also popped popcorn in school and then drizzled it with chocolate. We bagged the popcorn and put it in pretty mugs for our Moms. The children had so much fun doing this!! For Memorial Day, we talked about what makes America great and made patriotic handprints. For Spirit Day and Field Day, we had so many fun activities, like relay races and fun with balloons, both in the school yard and at the playground.

The children are very proud of all they can do, now that they are BIG KIDS! They are busy making decorations and practicing for their Moving Up Ceremony. They can't wait to "show-off" to their guests. They'll sing songs, say prayers, and recite silly poems. They are so proud of themselves!

We were able to walk through the Arboretum's beautiful Hibiscus and Palm Greenhouses and see many different tropical plants. We ended our field trip by each getting to plant our own bean, tomato, lettuce and corn plants which the students were able to take home and replant in their own backyards!

In Math, the children learned to measure objects in inches and centimeters. They've learned to tell time and to count money. The students have learned the names of two and three dimensional shapes and have created a town with these shapes. Hello from Sixth Grade!

It is so unbelievable how quickly the end of the school year is approaching! The fifth and sixth grade are eager for summertime, but that has not deterred them from their studies. It has been an exciting few weeks for the sixth grader because they have recently received their chromebooks in preparation for seventh and eighth grade. The students have been using them to take notes, complete homework and classwork and to engage in online activities all at their fingertips.

In Science, the sixth grade students have been exploring the diversity of plants and the many different processes they undergo in order to survive. The students created seed bags and observed their growth over the course of two weeks. Students were able to determine exactly what plants need in order to grow. Next, students were reading about the inverse processes of photosynthesis and cellular respiration and how they help keep the balance of life. The students also observed the many different ways plants respond to their environment and to chemical hormones that are used to make them more productive. As this chapter comes to a close, students will be switching gears from plants to animals and will be examining the diversity of different species along with animal behaviors. Sixth grade will end the year with the dissection of a calf's heart to understand the structure and function of living systems within organisms.

Fifth grade students are learning about the complex layers that make up earth and how layers interact together. these students created a map on what they hypothesized the continents to look like based on similar plant and animal fossils that were found on different parts of the world. They came to the conclusion that earth's continents were connected together at one point in time and broke apart due to the theory of plate tectonics. They have also made some fascinating discoveries about how the earth continues to change because of weathering, erosion, and deposition. The students were able to examine the different rocks that make up the rock cycle and understand how rocks can change from one form to another. As the end of the year comes to a close, the students will be learning about earth's resources and the final unit in fifth grade will take us to the stars - literally!

In Social Studies, our class has made a stopover in Ancient Greece and learned about the many philosophers and inventors that are responsible for advancements that have shaped our society. The students completed a project where they had to select a Greek god/goddess, research them and come in with a presentation to share with the class. loved students completing research and the projects can be seen hanging in the hallway. In preparation for a Medieval Times field trip, the students have been learning about chivalry of knights and what life was like in the Middle Ages. We can't wait to see what Medieval Times has instore for us!

In religion, students have learned about the ways to live as a disciple of Jesus Christ. The students examined the Beatitudes and reflected on how they can follow in the footsteps of Jesus everyday of their lives. We will also have practice in preparation for May Crowning which will be happening in the coming weeks.

7th Grade ELA

Seventh graders began the third trimester reading well-known having fun some limericks. Students wrote and shared their own limericks, too. Class time will also be spent preparing students for this fall's COOP exam, which includes reading comprehension practice, spelling, vocabulary, and grammar.

8th Grade ELA

Using the textbook, "Grammar for Writing", students have worked on summarizing and sentence combining skills as they responded to writing prompts. They know the

importance of developing and supporting a thesis statement in order to write effective essays. After completing novel studies that included "The Outsiders" and "To Kill a Mockingbird", students explored elements of the short story. Plot. characters, point of view and theme were looked at in such stories as "The Most Dangerous Game", "The Lottery", "Flowers for Algernon". Students learned that the ideas for such stories are inspired and developed in an author's imagination and when read, can actually transport them to cities they have never seen or historical events that occurred long ago.
