

We have a great deal to learn from their integrity and their unrelenting courage, from their vision of God - so holy, so great, possessed of such a love, that nothing less than one's whole being could respond to it. These were men and women who had reached an awesome humility rooted in the vision of God. These ascetics, were austere to themselves, yet immensely compassionate to the needs of men and their frailty and sins. The inner silence of the desert fathers spoke volumes: 'If a man cannot understand my silence, he will never understand my words.' Let us emulate their earnestness in the search, their ruthless determination, their infinite compassion and their own silent communion with God.

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
