#### **New Teacher to Trinity Interviews**

We interviewed new teachers who joined Trinity this year. The new teachers are Mrs. LaRosa (1<sup>st</sup> Grade), Mrs. Mattia (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade), and Miss Blakley (4<sup>th</sup> Grade). We wanted to find out more about them and what brought them to Trinity.

#### Q: What made you interested in becoming a teacher at Trinity?

- Mrs. LaRosa: My mom was a teacher, and taught kindergarten in a Catholic school. I wanted to
  follow in her footsteps and being familiar with the community from growing up in Elwood, it felt like
  the right fit.
- Mrs. Mattia: Having attended Catholic school throughout my life, Catholic education is essential to me. I appreciated the welcoming community at Trinity Regional.
- Miss Blakley: After living in California for the past five years, where I always worked in Catholic schools, I needed a new job upon moving back. The Holy Spirit guided me to this opportunity.

#### Q: Why did you become an elementary school teacher?

- Mrs. LaRosa: Mostly because of my mom. I liked the idea of teaching younger kids to read, even though I also taught middle school. I prefer teaching the younger grades.
- Mrs. Mattia: Both my parents were teachers, and I always looked up to them. I used to assist my mom in getting activities and helping my brother with homework.
- Miss Blakley: With my mom and aunt being teachers and having a background in babysitting and working with kids throughout high school, becoming a teacher was a natural choice.

#### Q: Where did you teach before joining the Trinity family?

- Mrs. LaRosa: I taught at St. Joseph's in Garden City.
- Mrs. Mattia: I taught first grade at St. Rose of Lima in Massapequa.
- Miss Blakley: I taught in California at a small Catholic school called St. Gregory the Great in Whittier, Los Angeles, teaching second and third grade in the past.

#### Q: What grade level do you teach, and what is your favorite thing about teaching that grade level?
