Stewardship

Ted Knutson grew up on a farm in a rich agricultural community. When he married, he operated a farm a few miles from his father's farm. A short distance away was a rural church where he worshipped regularly with his family.

Knutson was a sincere Christian who had served on various boards in his congregation. He had always gone to this rural church and was unfamiliar with the stewardship programs in other churches. In his congregation the support came from the "membership dues." When the crops had been harvested and sold, these "dues" were collected. The church finance committee would then retire their obligations hoping there would be enough left in the bank to keep up expenses until the next fall. If they ran short during the year they would borrow from the bank, or else visit the members to collect the amount they were short.

Mr. Knutson was confused and perplexed when he listened to a visiting speaker at the men's group in his church. The subject was stewardship. The speaker said that in many town and country churches, the standard of giving was abnormally low. He also said that Christian people ought to make weekly pledges in support of the Lord's work in their parish and throughout the world. He stressed emphatically that pledges should be based on a proportion of one's income, and that they should be given regularly.

As he listened to the speaker many thoughts went through his mind, such as: "How can a farmer make a pledge when he doesn't know what his income

will be?" "How can a farmer make weekly payments when his income does not arrive until the end of the season?" "Wouldn't it be easier to write a check that would cover his annual pledge right after he received the money for his



harvest?" "Why should the congregation give so much for World Missions when they have so many needs in their own church?" "Why should a farmer be expected to contribute as much as city folks who had a much larger income?"

These and many other thoughts kept continually going through his mind, but having learned as a Christian that he must talk things over with God, he went home that night to meditate on what he had heard.

He could not go to sleep until he decided to talk the matter over with his wife the next day. After breakfast he started asking his wife some of the questions that had troubled him the night before. Having told his wife about the guest speaker, he asked her, "How can

Love and Stewardship

A wise man named Richard Braunstein once made the following statement:

"It is possible to give without loving, but it is impossible to love without giving."

Because God's nature is to love, God constantly reaches out to us with grace we do not merit and love which is without restraint.

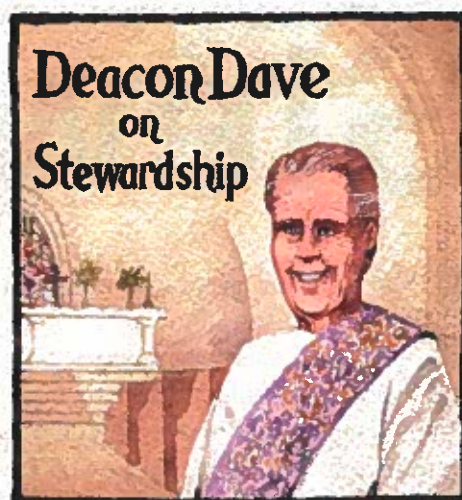
In fact, God's love is so unrestrained that God gave the world the best gift known to humankind. As the Gospel of John puts it: "God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

In short, God's love inspires us to love and give even as God has given to us. That is how stewardship comes alive within ourselves. As Braunstein said, "It is impossible to love without giving."

Traveling through old Jerusalem with a tour group, I noticed that a doctor's wife could not pass by a beggar or handicapped person without showing love to them in one way or another. A small monetary gift, a warm smile, a show of concern came easily, even eagerly, from her loving body and spirit. Seeing her love and caring was a memorable exhibit I can never forget. It truly was impossible for her to love without giving, without practicing stewardship. ☩

When we trust in the Lord, we receive the name tag "Child of God." No one is excluded from that. God's plan is to bring everyone to him. God loves everyone so much, and desires that all accept Jesus Christ to be made fully whole in their lives. But that only happens when all of us are involved.

When you know that you are loved and special, and when you realize you have unique talents to give to God, then you can see that your involvement in winning the world to Christ is crucial. When we begin to do that as a church, as a people, and as a congregation, hell cannot prevail in our lives or anyone else's.



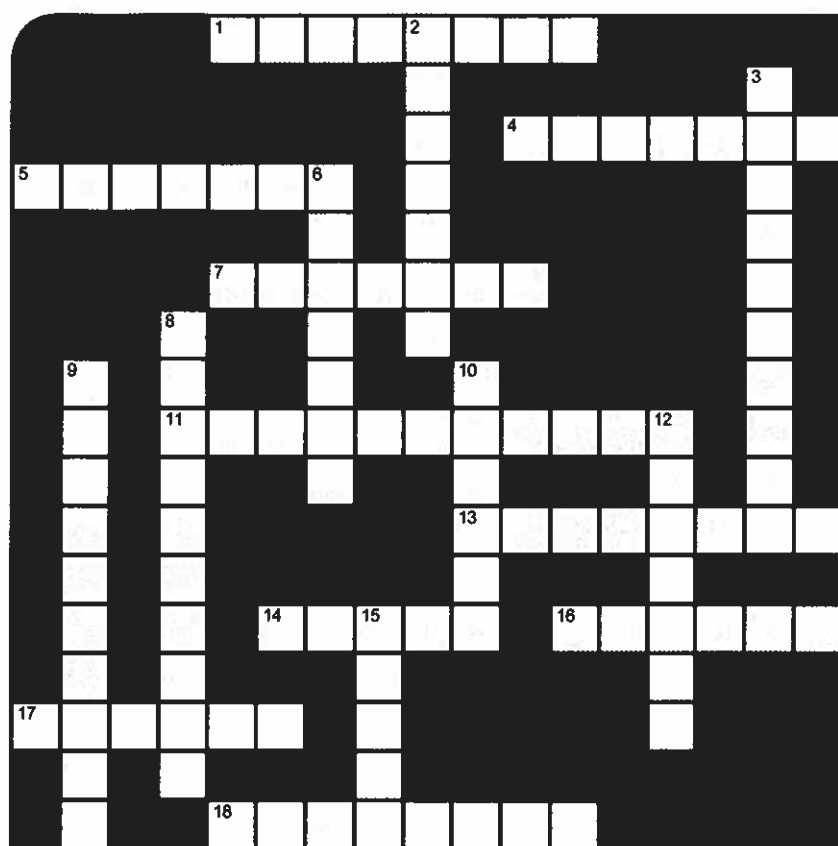
The Tie That Binds Us

Christian commitment is the tie that binds us to the purpose and power of God. The Apostle Paul describes the commitment of Christ: He "humbled himself" ... "unto death, even death on a cross." God still did this because of the commitment to enter our world and reveal God's love and our need of God.

Now you and I are challenged to be of this same "mind" of commitment. Sometimes the tie that binds us to God's purpose is a sort of slip-knot arrangement, allowing slack for our own desires. Paul urges us to tie our commitment tightly and squarely as Christ.

A real test of our commitment is stewardship. Paul says, "Let each of you look not only to his interests, but also to the interest of others." When we consider how Christ humbled himself, how the needs are just as desperate today, and how we are called to have the same mind ... even a tithe seems small, doesn't it? The discipline of tithing is the square-knot by which God blesses the tie that binds us to him and to others. If, as a Christian, you haven't tried tithing, do it now and ask God to bless you! ☩

we make a pledge when we don't know what our income will be?" To his surprise she answered, "When we bought the new tractor we signed a promissory note to the bank agreeing to pay \$22,000 in three different installments. How could we do that without knowing what our income would be?" He then raised another question: "How can we make weekly pledges when we don't sell our crops until fall?" This time she responded, "We have many other obligations to meet before our crops are harvested and we pay them. Why should we neglect the church? Besides, didn't you say that you agreed with the speaker when he said that our giving really should be a part of our worship of God?"

Out of the discussion came the conclusion that the question of the stewardship of their means had never been a subject of prayer with them. They agreed to pray about this until the end of the week when they would again attend church. On Sunday morning at breakfast he said, "Today we are going to give an offering in the spirit of worship. Let's ask our pastor for a set of offering envelopes, too." Knutson had learned through prayer and honest soul-searching that the most important thing with stewardship is not the support of a church budget. Real stewardship rather demands a dedication of all that we have to the Lord. Like the Macedonians, we must give ourselves unto the Lord. ☩

If you said the Good Samaritan, you were right. In the story of the Good Samaritan found in the tenth chapter of Luke, the Good Samaritan not only helped an injured person, he took him to an inn where he paid for his room and care. The Samaritan sacrificed money, time, and possessions for the wounded person, and he risked his own health and safety. He fulfilled the Golden Rule. By putting no limits on how far he was willing to go to help this stranger, the Samaritan demonstrated the love we should have for our neighbors. He followed Jesus' command to *"Go and do likewise."* Helping others may mean more than calling 911.

We may need to get involved, get our hands dirty, and go the extra mile.

A Stewardship Thought

The God-pleasing steward is motivated by God's love to "surrender" his stubborn, independent, vain, selfish will and begin to conform to God's will. Living for self becomes secondary because Christ who died for him and rose again is now in control. *"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of the world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing, and perfect will"* (Romans 12:2). The Lord's will becomes our will.

On the Lighter Side

The day the church treasurer resigned, the church asked the local grain elevator manager to take the position. He agreed under two conditions:

- ✠ That no treasurer's report would be given for the first year.
- ✠ That no questions be asked about finances during that year.

The people were surprised but finally agreed, since most of them did business with him and he was a trusted man. At the end of the year he gave his report:

- ✠ The church indebtedness of \$228,000 has been paid.
- ✠ The minister's salary has been increased by 8%.
- ✠ The Cooperative Program gifts (\$200) have been paid.
- ✠ There are no outstanding bills.
- ✠ There is a cash balance of \$11,252!

Immediately the shocked congregation asked, "How did you do it? Where did the money come from?"

He quietly answered, "Most of you bring your grain to my elevator. Throughout the year, I simply withheld ten percent on your behalf and gave it to the church in your name. You didn't even miss it!"

"Do you see what we could do for the Lord if we were all willing to give at least the tithe to God, who really owns it?" he asked. And so the new treasurer had made his point.

Giving an Opportunity or Obligation

As the Apostle Paul traveled to churches, he collected offerings for the Christians in Jerusalem who were experiencing hard economic times. When Paul was speaking to the Corinthians, he used the Macedonian believers as an example of people who, in spite of their own economic troubles, gave joyfully to the people in Jerusalem. The Macedonians' love for Christ and their concern for their fellow believers moved them to give beyond their ability. The Macedonians gave themselves first to the Lord, and then, Paul said, they *"urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints"* (2 Corinthians 8:4). In Christ, they saw their giving as an opportunity



to help other believers in need.

Does someone who views giving as an obligation plead for the opportunity to give? Probably not. When giving is an obligation, we will give, but giving as an obligation will not give us the joy or the attitude of pleading for the privilege to give that the Macedonians had. As God's people, we have both an obligation and an opportunity. Scripture is clear that we are called to give. Paul said:

"On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made" (1 Corinthians 16:2).

Giving is an obligation, but, just as God changed the hearts and minds of the Macedonian people, he changes us so our attitude toward giving can change from being an obligation to an opportunity. As renewed and changed people, our attitude toward giving changes from a "got to" to a "get to" attitude. We stop giving grudgingly, and we start giving willingly and cheerfully. We want to give, because giving is an expression of our love and gratitude to God for who he is and what he does for us.

The more we give of ourselves and our gifts, the closer our relationship with Christ becomes, and the more we want to give, and the more God blesses us which enables our continued giving. *"You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God"* (2 Corinthians 9:11). We thank God that he fills us daily with his love so that we as members of his Church here on earth see giving as a privilege and an opportunity to praise and thank him.

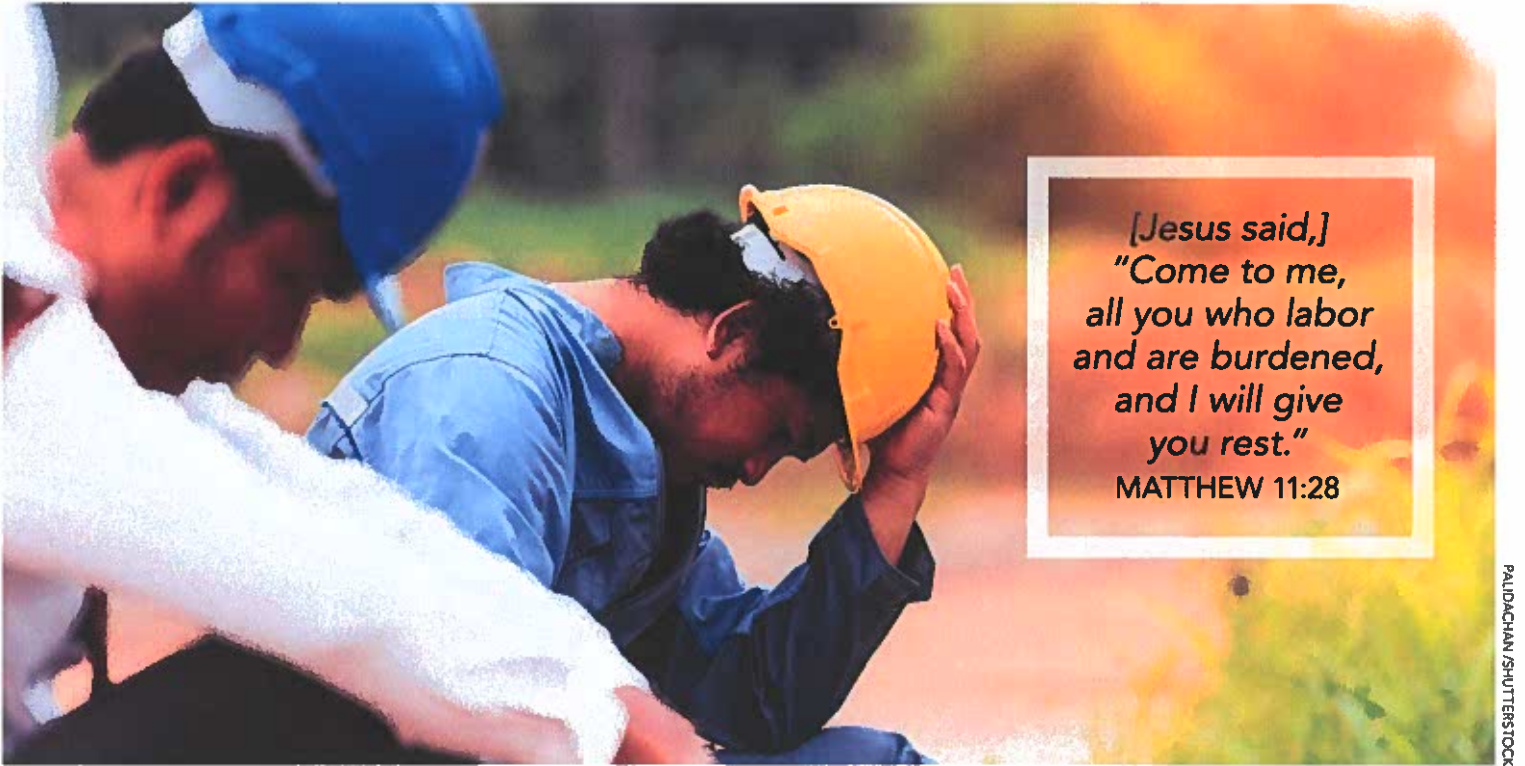

Do You Know Who I Am?

That question usually means: "Do you know how important I am?" Reputation, status, and celebrity are extraordinarily significant in today's society. Vulnerable, unsure beings that we are, we need to be reassured that we are important. And we *are* important, though usually not the way society might perceive it.

Each of us is unique. Yet our personal uniqueness does not diminish the uniqueness of others, and there's the rub! So often we think that it does. That's when we might try to put others down or demand: "Do you know who I am?" Often we don't really know who we are. This is where humility enters the picture.

In today's first reading, the king rides on a donkey. He doesn't need a mighty warhorse to show others his importance or to reassure himself of his royal identity. Nor does he need military armaments like a chariot or bow to establish peace. He is secure with himself. He knows who he is—no more, but no less.

The Gospel portrays Jesus as "meek and humble of heart" (Matthew 11:29). He knows who he is. He is the Son of the Father, sent by the Father to do the will of the Father. All things are in his hands, because he received everything from the Father. He does not have to broadcast this or argue with others to convince them. He knows who he is. He is the Son—no more, but no less.

And what about you? Do you know who you are?

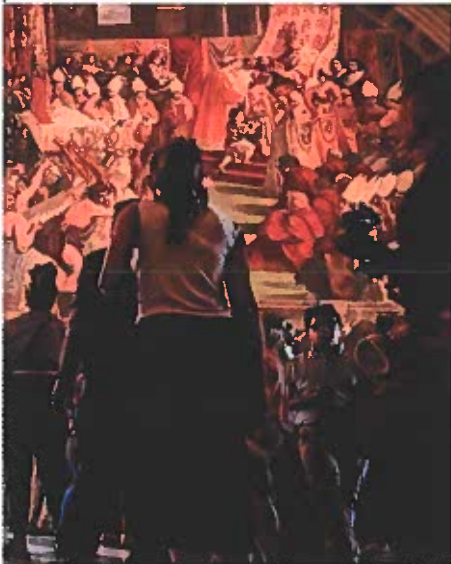

Dear Padre,

Why doesn't the Catholic Church practice what it preaches and sell off its considerable assets at the Vatican?

The Catholic Church, the world's largest charitable organization, has a legacy of ministry to the poor, the sick, and the ostracized. According to Pope Francis, the Church's real estate, for example, is used "to maintain the structures of the Church and to maintain the many works the Church does in needy countries: hospitals, schools." Thus, the old adage applies: Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day, but teach him to fish and he's fed for a lifetime. Similarly, selling the Church's assets would add to its immediate efforts to assist the poor, but it would prevent the Church from maintaining greater long-term assistance.



Moreover, selling the Church's patrimony of artwork (such as Michelangelo's *Pietà*) into private or corporate hands would deprive future generations the transcendence that comes from praying before a priceless treasure. In 2015, Pope Francis was asked if he ever felt pressure to sell "the treasures of the Church." He responded that they weren't the Church's treasures, but "the treasures of humanity."

While popes aren't at liberty to sell what belongs to "humanity," they generally donate personal gifts to support the needy. Motorcycles, cars, and other gifts to Pope Francis have been given away or auctioned to benefit the poor. On his deathbed, St. John XXIII offered his doctor his fountain pen, saying it was the only thing of value he possessed.

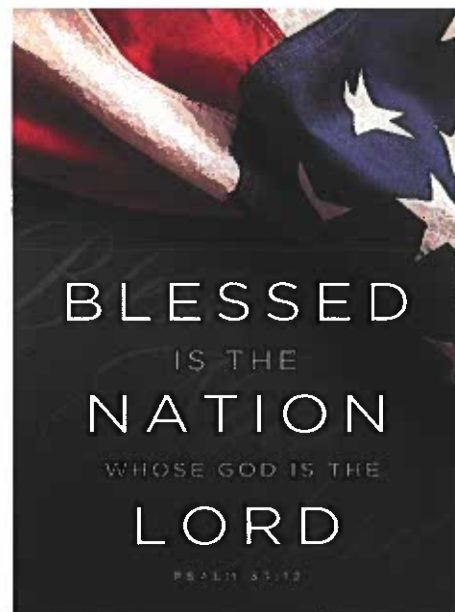
