

You Decide

We normally take great pride in making our own decisions. When we did this as children, it was a sign that we were growing up; as adolescents, it was a proclamation of independence. Now as adults, when making decisions we demonstrate that we are self-directed. The problem doesn't seem to lie in decision-making itself but in the options given to us that require a decision. And there is the rub. Often these are options not of our choosing. This can make decision-making very difficult.


Today's Gospel is all about making decisions. Options are placed before us. We either choose Jesus and the extraordinary way of life that he has outlined for us, or we go along with the movements of society. This could include making money at any cost, denying hospitality to those who knock on our door, harboring an attitude of superiority over others. We either choose to live in the light with the insights that our faith provides, or we simply accept the values that bombard us each day through the media, namely: Me first. What's mine is mine. What's in it for me? Not in my back yard.

If we look carefully, we will realize that the way of life Jesus promotes is based on the dignity of each person, who is made in the image and likeness of God. Actions that dismiss, demean, damage, or destroy human life are contrary to the teaching, life, and example of Jesus. Accepting his way brings forth a new society called "the reign of God." Rejecting it will undermine the foundations of the society we have. Which will it be? You decide.


My friend's parish is having a St. Joseph's Day Altar. What is that?

Ages by Sicilians who invoked their patron saint during an extended drought and famine. When rain finally brought relief, the people expressed their gratitude in two ways: by displaying a table with the foods they harvested and by distributing their plenitude to those most in need.

Over time, the custom of an altar around the March 19 feast day of St. Joseph gained popularity and is now embraced by the faithful of any nationality wishing to share their good fortune with those who have less. The meatless feast usually includes baked items, beans, nuts, fruits, and seafood presented in ways that symbolize elements of the faith. Prayerful rituals and children portraying the Holy Family add to the celebration and heritage.

Whether the altar is modest or elaborate, at home or in church, it's a labor of love meant to strengthen the bonds of family and friends in its preparation and to strengthen one's faith and charity in its execution.





ST. PATRICK: COMPASSION IN ACTION

St. Patrick is a good model for our lives today as we struggle to put our compassion into action to make our world more like the way God wants it to be.

Attuned to God's Presence

As Patrick's Confession reveals, his life was grounded in a deep trinitarian awareness of God's presence in himself and in the world around him. We too learn to discover Christ's presence in ourselves and our world. We look out at the world through eyes of faith to discover the meaning of our history and our situation in the context of God's plan to reorder our world into right relationships (justice). We scrutinize the signs of the times to discover "what may be genuine signs of the presence or the purpose of God" (Vatican Council II, Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, #11).

- What can you recall about your "call" or invitation to follow Jesus in a more adult way?
- How have you experienced God inviting you to a deeper prayer life both as an individual and as a member of your parish?

Acting with Compassion and Justice

Becoming more keenly aware of God's presence moves us to act to continue Jesus' works of compassion and justice.

Compassion calls on us to aid the victims of social evil by providing more immediate assistance to those who are poor, hungry and in need food and shelter by doing the corporal works of mercy (see the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #2447).

Justice calls on us to change the structures of society to eliminate their sinfulness and conform more closely with Jesus' vision of rightly ordered relationships (justice). Since the institutions of society are so complex, their structural evil is often so hidden and so tenacious that it cannot be eradicated by a single individual. Consequently, working for social justice to eliminate this social sin involves joining with others to change the societal structures that conceal their corrosive evil.

- In what ways are you experiencing God's bringing you to a new awareness of God's values?
- How can you act more justly and establish right relationships in your household? at your work? in your parish? in your community?

ST. PATRICK'S PRAYER

This popular prayer attributed to St. Patrick is often called his "breastplate" because in the first part he imagines God's protection like battle armor to protect him from all the dangers he might face that day. In the second part he then calls on Christ to be with him and in him and for the grace to recognize Christ in others as he goes about his day.

I arise today through God's strength to pilot me, God's might to uphold me, God's wisdom to guide me, God's eye to see before me, God's ear to hear me. God's word to speak for me, God's hand to guard me, God's way to lie before me, God's shield to protect me, God's host to secure meagainst snares of devils, against temptations and vices, against inclinations of nature, against everyone who shall wish me ill, afar and anear. alone and in a crowd. Christ, be with me, Christ before me. Christ behind me. Christ in me. Christ beneath me. Christ above me, Christ on my right, Christ on my left, Christ where I lie, Christ where I sit. Christ where I arise. Christ in the heart of everyone who thinks of me, Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks of me, Christ in every eye that sees me, Christ in every ear that hears me. Salvation is of the Lord.

O Lord, be ever with us. Amen.



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

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


We all have mementoes that we treasure - a handmade Mother's Day card, a delicate glass sculpture inherited from a relative, perhaps a fine piece of woodwork or beautifully woven quilt. We treasure them because they remind us of someone we love. Now, think about that we are God's "handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance"! Our God, rich in mercy, rich in love, treasures us so much that he created each of us in his image and gives each of us grace - a pure, free gift. As we look in the mirror, we may be tempted to see only our imperfections. But Paul reminds us that if we look at ourselves the way God does and accept the gift of his love and grace, and cooperate with it working in us, we can live in Christ in the here and now, by extending love and mercy to others, and in eternity, in God's loving embrace.


GO EVANGELIZE

Reading the news and social media, the phrase in today's Gospel that "people preferred darkness to light" seems as true now as it was in John's time. Sinfulness and evil still cause great harm in our societies. The good news is that it is also as true for us as it was then that God sent his only Son, "not ... to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." Clearly, the world is a work in progress. We are a work in progress. Yet today's readings remind us that we can choose light over darkness by accepting the gift of faith and grace that our patient and merciful God bestows on us. It doesn't mean that we should turn off the news or hide from the world, but instead do our part to bring light to the situations we encounter. We know the kingdom of God won't be built in a day, or even a millennium, but we take a step toward building the Kingdom when we allow God's light to enter our hearts and then share that light with others through our witness, words, and prayer.
