

Stewards in Partnership

Faithful stewards live their lives in service for Christ because Christ dwells in them and they desire to please him. As his steward, you are "an instrument for noble purposes, made holy, useful to the Master and prepared to do any good work" (2 Timothy 2:21). God calls us into his fellowship and partnership through his Son and equips us to be faithful stewards.

In John 15:5, Jesus explains fully what it means to be in partnership with him. Jesus said "I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." We are branches which have no life by ourselves, but we receive life from the vine. The vine supports and sustains the branches on which the fruit appears. Faithful stewards are branches that bear much fruit as Jesus, the vine, nourishes them. In this way, God calls us into partnership with himself.

As stewards, our partnership with Christ is made possible because God dwells in us. 1 John 4:15 reads, "If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in him, and he in God." When God dwells with in us, we are no longer the same. He transforms and molds us into stewards who willingly surrender our will to seek his will. No longer is it "I" or "me", but God who works through us to accomplish his purpose. Our lives are dedicated to him, and we are prepared for tasks given to us as God takes us into full partnership.

On our own we can do nothing. Only as we stay connected to Jesus can we be faithful and fruitful stewards. Live By Faith

The story of Abraham is one of extraordinary blessing. However, his story is also one of extraordinary faith. At major points of his life, Abraham had no idea what was in store for him or his family. He was directed to leave his home and become a wandering herder. He was an immigrant in a foreign land, bereft of social support structures. He was promised descendants but waited many years for that promise to be realized. Once he had an heir, he was then told to sacrifice that son of promise without any assurances of a favorable future. Time and again, Abraham was asked to live by faith.

The phrase "seeing is believing" is misleading. It is really an expression of skepticism that means, "I won't believe it unless I see it." However, true belief means that we accept something even though we don't see it, don't understand it. That is a very difficult way for most of us to live. Yet live like this we must, whether


we are believers or unbelievers, because so much of life is beyond our control or understanding.

So how do we learn to live by faith? We have something that Abraham did not have. We have his story to encourage us. In that story we see that again and again he stepped forward in faith, and God brought things together. If God did this in Abraham's life, surely God can and will do it in ours. We must only live by faith.

Dear Padre,

When I was young, we never had eucharistic devotions. Why are they so popular now?

rior to the Second Vatican Council, many Catholics found solid food for their spiritual lives in eucharistic devotions, which include visiting the Blessed Sacrament (eucharistic adoration), attending Forty Hours devotion,

and assisting at benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

However, as the modern liturgical movement began picking up steam, scholars and theologians began questioning the amount of energy and attention going toward eucharistic devotion. They urged us to focus our spirituality more clearly on the Mass-the action of the sacred liturgy and the Eucharist itself—and to understand that all eucharistic devotions outside of the sacred liturgy are meant to direct us back to the action of the Mass, the eucharistic sacrifice, and its high point of Communion.



The drop-off in eucharistic devotions after Vatican II can be positively understood as an attempt to take the insights of liturgical reform seriously and develop a more liturgical piety. At the same time, the resurgence of eucharistic adoration is a worthy retrieval of a beloved practice that both scholars and the faithful understand as complementing a full, conscious, and active participation in the sacred liturgy that is the "source and summit" of our lives.

I remember the first time I moved: A suitcase or two fit in the back of my dad's lime-green Delta 88 as my parents dropped me off at college. Four years later, it took that plus a large black chest. The next move required a U-Haul; then came marriage, a family, and a moving van. I may not store my treasure in barns like the man in last week's readings, but at times it feels that way. It's natural to accumulate more "stuff" as we grow older. But in today's Gospel, Jesus reminds us that we won't take any of it with us when we make the move to our final destination. Rather than focus on our possessions, he encourages us to be vigilant, remain faithful, and live in service to others. In doing so, we will store up "an inexhaustible treasure in heaven that no thlef can reach nor moth destroy. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Few things throw me into a panic like unexpected company. I have taken to at least cleaning the kitchen counter and bathrooms before going on a trip so the house will look presentable should something befall me and others have to come in with food or aid! We truly do not know the day or the hour, and the Gospel today encourages us to apply a little of that spring cleaning to our souls. Each day presents a new opportunity to prepare for the day we meet Jesus. If we've been out of touch, we can get reacquainted through prayer. If we feel weighed down by things we've done or said, we can bring them to the Lord through the sacrament of reconciliation. We can witness to our belief in God's promise of eternal life by putting people above possessions and supporting one another as we seek to live as Jesus taught us.


Are you putting God last, giving God nothing? If so, it is unfortunate that you

You see ... it is more difficult for many people to be generous with things that we actually have than it is with riches they hope to have someday!


We need not give up the pleasures and luxuries of this life. God does not call us to be ascetics, but does call us to a right sense of proportion in administering our substance.

ou will never be in a better position to tithe than you are today. Whether you can tithe has relatively little to do with the amount of your income or the number of your financial obligations. The person who says "After I pay all my bills, I can't afford to tithe," is telling the truth. He or she simply has the cart before the horse. None of us could afford to tithe with what is left. Tithing is a matter of putting first things first, taking our tithe out first, and then managing the rest of our income in a way by which we will still pay all our bills. And this is easier than you may think.

Dear Editor,

Something has occurred to me as a result of tithing that I am surprised I had never thought of before. It has to do with perspective; seeing something in its proper relationship to something else.

Our family was returning from a trip to Northern Michigan one night, the SUV fully loaded with children and gear when we had a flat tire. We had tithe is seldom made by sitting down with a pencil and paper. More often it is made by kneeling down with an open heart. The decision to tithe has very little to do with a mathematical formula. It has a great deal to do with a right relationship to God. Most tithers began the practice the day they finally realized that their possessions, their money, their very lives were not their own, but God's.

No one can talk you into really believing this. Worship, prayer, and some mature Christian thought are the paths that sooner or later will lead you right into the heart of this inescapable truth.

Once you see God at the very center of your life, tithing will make sense. You will understand your responsibility to manage 100% of your money, your time and your ability as a trust from God. Then 10% of your income, dedicated to the owner, may seem to be all too little.

Tithing is a spiritual adventure. It is the beginning of a deeper, richer relationship with God.

you feel better, but at least you won't take it so seriously or tragically.

Maybe it is the tithing principle of putting first things first that helps you get a proper perspective about things, as well.

We also know that God could accomplish his work without any help from us, just as he created the world out of nothing, but he gives us the joy of being his partners. Perhaps we should consider those two thoughts when we think about our giving.

For what should our money be used? For the Lord's work, which is done through the church. What is the main task of the church, but to preach the Word? And is it not the task of the church members, then, to support that preacher of the Word?

"Don't you know that those who work in the temple get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in what is offered on the altar? In the same way, the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel" (1 Corinthians 9:13-14).

So spoke St. Paul.

"Feed my lambs" (John 21:15), Jesus said. Having received our spiritual sustenance, we, his lambs, now go out into the world to feed the lost sheep who need both spiritual and physical food. "If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him?" (1 John



3:17). Having experienced the love of God through his children, the lost sheep are then receptive to the spiritual food which is offered – offered over back yard fences, offered through homeless shelters, offered in faraway lands where our missionaries minister.

Do you still feel as if you are giving to them? Actually, you're not even giving to God, only returning to him what is his to begin with. Let us pray that we might find joy and excitement that he chooses to use the gifts, the time, the financial resources he has entrusted to us so that his people might be cared for and the Gospel may be preached to the ends of the earth.

A Sermon to Remember

While watching a little TV on Sunday before going to church, I watched a church in Atlanta honoring one of its senior pastors who had been retired many years. He was 92 at that time and I wondered why the church would even bother to ask the old gentleman to preach at that age.

After a warm welcome, introduction of this speaker, and as the applause quieted down, he rose from his high back chair and walked slowly, with great effort and a sliding gait to the podium. Without a note or written paper of any kind he placed both hands on the pulpit to steady himself and then quietly and slowly he began to speak.

"When I was asked to come here today and talk to you, your pastor asked me to tell you what was the greatest lesson ever learned in my 50-odd years of preaching. I thought about it for a few days and boiled it down to just one thing that made the most difference in my life and sustained me through all the trials. The one thing that I could always rely on when tears and heartbreak and pan and fear and sorrow paralyzed me ... the only thing that would comfort me was this verse...

"Jesus loves me this I know.
For the Bible tells me so.
Little ones to him belong.
We are weak but he is strong . . .
Yes, Jesus loves me . . .
The Bible tells me so."

That was a sermon to remember!


On the Lighter Side


