The clear message flowing from our readings this weekend is our "need to pray always and not lose heart." St. Paul puts it more categorically when he says, "Pray without ceasing" (1Thessalonians 5:17). A wake-up call to pray persistently has become timely and relevant because of the challenges of today and the many and varied manifestations of evil around us. We need to be strengthened to continue to live our Christian faith with joy and devotion. Additionally, we live in a noisy world and sometimes we are afraid of silence, unsure of what we might discover in the quiet. Yet, it is in the silence, during quiet time, that we will be able to hear the voice of God more clearly. St. Teresa of Calcutta has said: "The fruit of silence is prayer. The fruit of prayer is faith. The fruit of faith is love. The fruit of love is service. The fruit of service is peace."

What is prayer about? What is it? It is a tête-à-tête, a heart-to-heart conversation, a sharing of our life with a Father who loves and cares about our welfare. Find a way to cultivate a little culture of silence in your day. During your silent time, please, turn off the TV and the radio. Shut down your computer. Put your phone on silence. You will find that taking the 10-15 minutes a day sitting at Jesus' feet like Mary, will increase your serenity, your love of God and your personal holiness. Be like young Samuel: "Speak Lord, your servant is listening" (1Samuel 3:10). Wait for his gentle whisper. He always has a message of love, truth, peace and much more.

One common complaint is: "God has not answered my prayer!" The truth is that God actually answers all prayers but in his time, and not necessarily the way we envision. It is therefore always a good idea to pray that God changes our hearts. Here's one way to do that: "Dear Lord, help me to be more humble, more grateful, more honest and more loving. Present opportunities for me to serve you generously. Help me to follow you closely even when it's difficult or painful or scary. Make me true to you. I am tired of trying to do my own thing. Help me to live your way. *Amen*."

The tragedy of our life is not unanswered prayer, but unoffered prayer. That is why the shining example of the widow of this weekend's gospel can be inspiring. A number of us erroneously think that prayer changes things but St. Teresa of Calcutta sees it differently: "I used to believe that prayer changes things, but now I know that prayer changes us, and we change things." Moses, Aaron and Hur were prayer warriors for Israel. Will you be part of the prayer warriors of our faith community?

<u>Today</u>, on <u>World Mission Sunday</u>, we are invited to celebrate our mission's vocation, to pray for the people who are actively engaged in mission, and to generously contribute to our worldwide mission solidarity fund through this collection. Your gift on this day helps:

- People in remote villages, towns and cities, through the witness and work of missionaries and local priests;
- * Children, the elderly, refugees, the sick, and orphans through the services of religious Sisters and Brothers;

In the Creed, we profess belief in the "Communion of Saints."
