

Sixth Sunday of Easter



Celebration Masses together as a vibrant Family

The Beacons of Light recommends that the Family of Parishes celebrate the Eucharist together sometimes during the year. The Beacons process suggests Christmas Vigil and Easter Vigil. The Worship Commission attempted to do something together at the Christmas Vigil and Easter but it couldn't be materialized. A recent meeting of the Pathway team, suggested taking the opportunity of pending anniversaries to come together and celebrate each other present in the Eucharist. These recommendations were affirmed by the Family Council at their special meeting.

- a) The Picnic on September 10, 2023, at Triangle Park.
- b) One Hundred and Fifty years of Congregation of the Holy Spirit, Spiritans, of which Fr. Benoit and Fr. Francis are members. The climax is on May 28, 2023, a Sunday.
- c) Celebration of Seventy-Five Years of Queen of Martyrs Church December 10, 2023.

The intent is to celebrate Mass together at least four times during the year.

Temporary Name for the Family

Each Family of Parishes is asked to create a name that identifies the Family of Parishes. Ideally, we want to avoid referring to our Family of Parishes by geography and numbers (*more creative than "NE - 8 Region Family of Parishes"*). Already, more than 20 parishes within the Archdioceses have selected a temporary name for their Family of Parishes. So, we want to join that list!

The Naming Guidelines for the Family of Parishes include:

- The name of the Family is temporary and not intended to be the final canonical name of the parish.
- The name should NOT be identical to an existing church.
- The name does NOT have to follow the canonical constraints of a church, such as the name of a saint.

The archbishop does NOT need to approve the Family name. He will need to approve the eventual new canonical parish name.

PASTOR'S CORNER

The Era of Fr. Francis Mary Paul Libermann

The great spiritual leader who would renew the Spiritans in 1800 was an improbable candidate for the task, the Venerable Fr. Mary Francis Paul Libermann. Born in Alsace in 1802 as the son of Rabbi Lazarus Libermann and called Jacob. The family hoped he would follow in his father's footsteps and become a rabbi. Like several of his brothers, however, Jacob became a Catholic in 1826 and opted for the Catholic Priesthood. He had chosen Francis as his first baptismal name.

Fr. Liberman developed epilepsy in his seminary days, which delayed his ordination. Overcoming the obstacle of this severe illness and with his spiritual director's approval and the Holy See's encouragement, he founded the Congregation of the Holy Heart of Mary in 1841 as a missionary group to work, especially with people of African and African descent. A few days before that, he had been quietly ordained a priest explicitly for that purpose.

This new venture took root, and Fr. Libermann sent the first Congregation of the Holy Heart of Mary missionaries to the missions. One of the first missionaries is on his way to canonization as a saint, the blessed James Laval, popularly known as the apostle of Mauritius. Two others went to work in Haiti and Reunion in the following year.

When the Irish-American Bishop Edward Barron came to see him for personnel to staff his immense vicariate of the two Guineas (in Africa) – it stretched about 5,000 miles along the coast of West Africa without limits to the interior – Libermann placed seven priests at his disposal. Many of these early missionaries died, but one of Liebermann's first missionaries to arrive would become the first Bishop of Gabon. As time passed, that vicariate of the two Guineas became "the Mother of all the churches in West Africa."

The Merger

When Libermann had started his little Congregation, the Holy See had at once suggested that he come to some agreement with the Spiritans, whose purpose, Spirit, and works were very similar to his own. In 1848, the conditions were ripe to bring this matter to a successful conclusion on Pentecost Sunday of that year, the two congregations resolved to merge. Liebermann's group disbanded as a separate institute, and its members entered the Congregation of the Holy Ghost. Then the membership elected Libermann, the First Superior General and a Founder of the new Congregation, Congregation of the Holy Spirit under the Protection of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

He reorganized the institute and gave it a mighty impetus – one so strong that, even though he died four years later, it could develop into one of the larger religious orders of men. The Congregation of the Holy Spirit spread all over Europe, North America, the West Indies, and large parts of South America; all over Africa; islands in the Indian Ocean, Pakistan, and on to Australia, Papua New Guinea, and recently the Philippines, Taiwan, and Paraguay. Here in the States, it engaged heavily in what is now called social work and in education on every level.

In Africa, in particular, the Spiritans' labor was blessed. While the original mission in West Africa expanded mightily, work on the other side of the continent began in 1862 on the island of Zanzibar in the 2,000-mile-long mission of the same name. Bagamoyo, now in Tanzania, became "The Mother of all churches in East Africa."

Thousands of Spiritan priests and brothers devoted their lives to bringing Christ to this continent, and other religious orders came to share in the task. The first three African priests were ordained in 1842. One hundred-fifty years later, we find about 450 dioceses in East Africa and over 300 in Nigeria, not to mention the rest of the countries on the West Coast and central parts of Africa, staffed mainly by African Bishops, taking care of over a hundred million Catholics.

The new world order that began to arise from the ashes of World War II affected the Church's existence when everything came up for re-appraisal. One result of this was a scarcity of candidates for the priesthood and religious life in most countries of the northern half of the world. In the other half, however, vocations became more abundant, so gains in the south significantly offset personnel lost in the north. The Congregation has flourishing provinces there, notably in Africa. Thus it can continue its mission today in over sixty-three countries.

The Real Presence

MIRACLE IN ALCOY, SPAIN IN 1568 On January 29,1568, a poor man named Juan Prats, decided to steal some valuable items from the local Catholic church. One of the items he stole was a precious silver box which, unbeknownst to him, contained three consecrated Hosts, When he opened the box, he saw the three Hosts and immediately ate them! On returning to his home, he hid the silver box in his stable, under a pile of wood. The next morning, Fr. Antonio, the parish priest, discovered that the silver box containing the three consecrated Hosts was missing and realized that it had been stolen. He was so distressed that he rang the church bells and called all the people of the town to come and pray that the Sacred Hosts would be returned. The people then searched everywhere hoping to find the silver box, but no one found it. Next door to the house of the thief, lived a very holy woman named Maria who had a favorite statue of the Child Jesus. On learning of the stolen box containing three consecrated Hosts, she knelt in prayer in front of the statue and begged Jesus to help them recover the three Hosts. After a few hours of prayer, the little hand of the statue of Jesus turned and pointed to the house of the thief next door! At the same time, Jesus inspired the pastor to look in Juan's stable, and under the pile of wood, the priest found the silver box. On opening the box, he saw that the three Hosts were still inside! When Juan, the thief, saw the three Hosts in the box, he cried out that he was guilty of the theft but had eaten the Hosts!! No one could explain how the Hosts were back again! Jesus had again performed a miracle of this Most Blessed Sacrament!

75th Year Queen of Martyrs Church

In the Spring of 1948, Father Buchheit had found temporary lodging at St. Joseph Orphanage, on St. Paul Avenue. Father was truly thankful to the Priests and Sisters who went out of their way to make him feel welcome. As Father stated, "The priests and sisters hereat the Orphanage are "swell". I have a nice room, have everything that I want, and besides, I am enjoying some mighty delicious meals."

Not wanting to be an imposition to the Priests and Sisters at the Orphanage too long, Father Buchheit anxiously waited for the Kuntz homestead, located on North Dixie Drive, to be vacated. Father's appointment to Dayton meant that his father and his sister had to find temporary lodging in Cincinnati with relatives. Once the parish house could be established, all three would take residence with his father and sister assisting in the care of the house.

Father Buchheit's final statement in this first Parish Recorder dispensed after the first Queen of Martyrs Catholic Church mass, was as appropriate today as it was then. This church, this parish continues to be a "must" in the Northridge community. It is a "project that should be carried out as soon as possible. To meet with success requires the whole-hearted cooperation of every member of the community. All must put their shoulder to the wheel. All should be willing to lend a helping hand in whatever activity might be undertaken..."
