New Program for Lay People a Great Success



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As more and more lay people are interested in coming to Le Puy to deepen their understanding of the history and spirituality of the Sisters of St. Joseph, the International Centre Board decided to offer a second program for lay people with Sr. Mary Rowell (SSJs in Canada) as presenter.

"Stepping into the Past, Living in the Present, and Journeying toward the Future" (May 1-7) integrated prayer, reflection, presentations, and sharing with visits to special SSJ sites in Le Puy and Lyon. Participants also engaged in "walking together" as they discerned the movement of the Spirit. As the week evolved, meal times seemed to go longer while prayer times grew more intensely as the group shared stories of each other's lives and experiences in ministry. On the last full day, the group celebrated the Coronation of Charles III with English tea sandwiches, "trifle", and a sparkling wine toast to the new king. However, what was most significant among the three associates, one former sister, and three vowed religious was a lack of distinction or hierarchy among them as they showed appreciation for each other's journey as a part of the "Family of Joseph".

Roots & Wings Program Brings African & Indian Sisters to Le Puy



The Roots & Wings program (March 13-19) brought young sisters with temporary or one year of perpetual vows from India, Burkina Faso, Congo, Madagascar, Chad, and Sri Lanka. The objective of the program was to give the sisters an opportunity to re-read their lives and vocational call in the light of the origins of the Sisters of St. Joseph, and to move into how they can live their vowed “yes” today within the reality of our world and the “Dear Neighbor” near and far.

The sisters also learned that Le Puy has been a center for lace-making since 1407, and that the founding sisters made lace at night after ministering to the people of the city during the day. This work earned them a living, which distinguished them from the cloistered nuns of the time who relied on donations to sustain themselves. This independence was one of the major reasons the Sisters of St. Joseph were able to emerge and survive as the Church’s new apostolic movement took shape.

The sisters spent a day in Lyon to learn more about Mother St. John Fontbonne. They visited the Origin & Evolution Centre, the grave of Mother St. John, the chapel where she prayed for the sisters she sent to the USA, and the Basilica at Fourvière. Sr. Rita Bujold (Lyon-Maine) served as their guide.

Sr. Judy Donovan (Lyon-Maine) and Sr. Gloria Philip (Buenos Aires) served as presenters, and Sr. Simone Saugues (Institute of St. Joseph) was the French-English translator.

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Sisters of St. Joseph from Philadelphia Hold Annual Pilgrimage

Even the rain, wind, and cloudy skies did not dampen the spirits of six sisters and two associates who made the annual pilgrimage to Le Puy and Lyon April 19-25. After resting up a bit from their long journey, the group climbed St. Michel—all 285 steps. The next day they went to the old city of Le Puy to visit the Kitchen where they prayed a thanksgiving prayer to the six founding sisters, Fr. Medaille, and Bishop de Maupas. They also visited the Église du Collège where Fr. Médaille preached, the Tree of Martyrs where two sisters were guillotined during the French Revolution, the Cathedral of Notre Dame of the Assumption, and of course, Martine’s Lace Shop where they found many beautiful handmade lace items. And, in what has become a new tradition, they visited the St. Joseph Shrine. After leaving Le Puy, the group went to Bas-en-Basset to see the birthplace of Mother St. John Fontbonne and then to Lyon to visit the Origin and Evolution Center of the Lyon Sisters, Mother St. John's grave, the hilltop basilica of Fourvière, the chapel where Mother St. John prayed for the sisters she had sent to the USA, and Old Lyon for a delectable dinner in the Food Capital of France.

“Islands of Sanity” in the Middle of Chaos

Over these past few months, I have reflected on what is happening in our world today and the comments I hear from many (myself included) about being overwhelmed. ***We seek hope in the middle of chaos.*** We are not alone. Our earliest sisters, whether in Le Puy or our local congregations, listened to the needs of the neighbor and found hope in how they responded to their times. Their chaos looked different, yet I imagine their experience of it was similar. What are we to do? What is this place of hope we seek?

Author and management consultant Margaret Wheatly discusses finding “islands of sanity” where we seek a place to foster relationships, nourish our hearts and souls, and allow creative responses to emerge. Finding an “island of sanity” enables us to be ourselves, speak our truth, move into a collective understanding, and touch into a new reality more expansive and oriented toward the common good. Perhaps the Kitchen was just that for the first Sisters of St. Joseph.

The Centre International St. Joseph also provides such a space. The various programs capture different aspects of our spirituality, walking on the streets allows connection with a rich history, and standing in the Kitchen invites us to this ancient “island” where we can tap into an antidote for today’s chaos. We are thus reminded of the rhythm of the day, coming home to share from the heart, and being in relationship.

Anyone called to be part of this global Family of Joseph knows the power of unifying love as expressed in the relationship of the Two Trinities. This model of relationship, of dynamic love, calls us to a prophetic stance of relationship. It is not about what we do but about who we are and what we embrace. I recall the prayer by Pedro Arrupe, SJ, “What you are in love with...will decide everything.”

Yet, we are human, and being in relationship can create pain in our lives, and our histories can create obstacles to inner freedom. Invitations for healing are all around us—to heal ourselves, our neighbors, fractures with God, and creation. This is some of the most challenging work, which creates more space and ability to be a witness to this dynamic love.

Our call today is to seek greater inner freedom so that our outer expression can signify hope. With our companions, we are bearers of this hope who find an “island of sanity” amid the chaos, and we move towards the Spirit’s invitation to be a radical response.
