This month, the students are learning about the virtue of **Honesty**, which is also known as **Truthfulness**. Here are a few reminders, and some new thoughts about this important virtue.

Remember from Last Week:

DEFINITION OF HONESTY:

Sincerity, openness, and truthfulness in one's words and actions

HONESTY LOOKS LIKE:

- Sharing something equally
- Going to confession
- Admitting you did something wrong
- Telling the truth even when it is hard
- Keeping your eyes on your own paper

HONESTY SOUNDS LIKE:

- I was fair.
- Bless me Father, for I have sinned...
- I am sorry.
- This is what really happened... I told the truth.
- I will not cheat by looking at someone else's paper.
