

FROM CHRISTENDOM TO APOSTOLIC MISSION PART IV-B: DEVISING A PASTORAL STRATEGY FOR THIS TRANSITIONAL TIME

Last week we considered four of the eight practical areas Monsignor Shea gave for engaging in this new age of apostolic mission. This week we want to consider the other four.

The fifth strategy has to do with priestly education and life. One practical step that can be done is “to implement a robust preparatory or spirituality year in priestly formation - a sustained opportunity for personal healing, intellectual conversion, and cultural detox“ (p. 53). In our own diocese, plans are already underway to begin such a spirituality year—also known as a propaedeutic year—starting Fall, 2022. Msgr. Shea also makes the point that, just as sentimentality alone is not enough to sustain the practice of the faith, so too sincerity alone is not enough to sustain priestly life. A priest can have all of the virtues needed to live the priesthood, but one thing necessary in this apostolic age is a common life. The priesthood was never meant to be lived alone. The sum of the many suggestions he gives here is that “a pattern of priestly life that was adequate to one cultural setting may be insufficient, and perhaps irresponsible, in another” (p. 56).

Sixth, we must allocate resources with apostolicity in mind. In Christendom, institutional systems work the way they were designed, which makes it easier to determine where to put our resources. But when those institutions begin to wane in their mission (as discussed last week), it is necessary to be creative and devote those resources to causes that are mission-oriented, even if they are less easy to spot.

Seventh, “the Church needs to be ready for ... energetic messiness if she wants to remain alive and capture the wider culture” (p. 59). With apostolic energy comes certain risks, and it is worthwhile to accept those risks for the sake of encouraging those who have abundant apostolic zeal. We recall that “Jesus had a special love for James and John, the ‘sons of thunder,’ even if he needed to rebuke them occasionally” (p. 59).

Lastly, we cannot underestimate the value of witness. “The ancient world, which early held the Christian movement in disdain, was greatly impressed by the courage of the martyrs, by the care Christians gave to the poor and the sick, and by the moral probity [uprightness] of the lives of uneducated believers. These witnesses to the Faith contributed to the eventual conversion of the culture. We are moving again towards such an apostolic age” (p. 60).— Fr. Kevin Oiland
