

## "Love One Another As I Have Loved" (Jn 15:12)

Catechesis of the Holy Father Leo XIV

To believe in the Death and Resurrection of Christ permeates life with hope and encourages us to invest in goodness. It helps us to love and nurture fraternity, which is one of the great challenges for contemporary humanity. Fraternity stems from something deeply human. Without relationships, which support and enrich us, we would not be able to survive, grow, and learn. Our humanity is best fulfilled when we succeed in experiencing authentic bonds with the people around us. If we turn-in on ourselves, we risk falling ill with loneliness and narcissism, which is concerned with others only out of self-interest. The other is then reduced to someone from whom we can take, without ever being truly willing to give.

Fraternity is not the impossible dream and it is not the desire of a deluded few. The many wars, social tensions, and feelings of hatred would seem to prove the opposite. To overcome the shadows of threatened fraternity, we need to draw light and strength from Jesus. He alone frees us from the poison of enmity. Often, we think that the role of a brother or sister refers to being part of the same family, but division and hatred can devastate even relationships between relatives. We are to recognize our common destiny of dignity. The essential feature of Christianity is expressed in the universal fraternity and the proclamation of the Good News to all. Ever since the beginning, the proclamation of the Good News has been destined for the salvation of all and never in an exclusive or private form.

The Commandment of Love is the base of universal fraternity. Jesus gave Himself for us out of love. In turn, we can love one another and offer our lives for others as true brothers and sisters in Christ. Jesus loves us up to the very end, says the Gospel of John (13:1). As the Passion draws near, Jesus experiences the most terrible torment and abandonment. His Resurrection is the beginning of a new life for us. We become fully brothers and sisters when we recognize Him as the Risen Lord, receive the gift of the Holy Spirit, and become witnesses to Him. Christians do not turn their backs on those who are in need. Jesus commanded us: "Love one another as I have loved you" (cf. Jn 15:12). This fraternity given by Christ frees us from the negative logic of selfishness, division, arrogance, and restores to us our original vocation, in the name of love. The Risen Lord has shown us the way to journey with Him and to be "brothers and sisters."
