"The Parable of Hospitality" (Gen 18:1-10, Luke 10:38-42)

Homily of Pope Leo XIV

God visited Abraham in the figure of "three men" who arrived at his tent. Abraham, recognizing the presence of God, runs to greet them and implores them to stay. The stillness of that afternoon is filled with gestures of love which involve not only the Patriarch, but also his wife Sarah, and the servants. It is there that God gives Abraham the best news: "your wife Sarah shall have a son" (v.10). The dynamics of this encounter shows how God chooses the path of hospitality to enter the lives of Sarah and Abraham and announces that they will have a child, which they had long desired but given up hope of receiving.

While the circumstances of Marta and Mary are different, this Gospel too teaches how God chooses the way of acting. Here too, Jesus appears as a guest at a house. This time, however He is not a stranger: He comes to visit His friends amid a festive atmosphere. Marha welcomes Him by serving Him, while Mary sits at His feet, listening as a disciple of her teacher. It would be incorrect to see these two attitudes as mutually exclusive, or to compare the merits of the two women. Serving and listening are two complementary attitudes that enable us to open ourselves, and our lives, to the Blessings of the Lord.

Our relationship with God must always come first. We must be "at the feet of Jesus," listen to Him, while being attentive in hospitality, for only then we will be able to recognize the presence of God in the face of another. Today, we need to recover this dimension of Christian hospitality as a value for individuals, communities, and as a prophetic sign of our times. Let us leave behind the whirlwind of worries and commitments, to savor the moments of peace and to share in the joy of seeing others. Serving and listening do not always come easily; they require hard work and ability to make personal sacrifices. Our weariness will pass and our rest will come through the efforts we made.
