Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Wow, 12 years can be a long time.

As I'm getting ready for my departure, as well as preparing for the incoming Pastor on July 8th (Fr. Peter Dery), I've been doing a lot of reflecting over what those 12 years were. At Visitation, we put on a new Church roof, major tuck-pointing, interior painting, cleaning and protecting the stained-glass windows, celebrating 150 years as a parish, and many other things as well. At Sacred Heart, building a new Church.

As important as those were, they are not nearly as important as the people within the parishes. It is the people that make a parish a Church. I've been blessed over the past 12 years with people who care not only about the buildings, but more importantly about their faith -- their God, and their desire to serve God and neighbor.

Welcome to Fr. Peter Dery

It is with great joy and anticipation that we announce that Fr. Peter Dery has been assigned pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, Osage, and Church of the Visitation Parish, Stacyville. He was ordained in 1999 and is from the Diocese of Techiman, Ghana. He will be one of nearly two dozen international priests in the Archdiocese of Dubuque and he already knows some of the other priests serving here from Ghana.

Fr. Peter has extensive experience including being a pastor for 13 years, a Hospital Chaplain, and has held several other leadership roles in his diocese including Diocesan Finance Administrator, Development Director, and Bishop's Secretary. He has previously spent over three years in the United States as an associate pastor in Brooklyn, New York and Port Lavaca, Texas between 2008-2012.

Fr. Peter is the fourth oldest in his family of seven children. His parents were farmers. His father and mother (who are both now deceased) were not well educated and wanted to make sure all of their children went to school to reach their fullest limits. Thus, Fr. Peter values education and hard work.

Fr. Peter likes music, especially religious music, reading and manual labor. He also enjoys all types of food. Three of his siblings have passed away but his remaining three siblings all live in Ghana along with his 17 nieces and nephews. Fr. Peter is currently 58 years old and will celebrate his birthday on July 4th, shortly before his arrival at our parishes.

Fr. Peter is very eager to serve the people of St. Isidore Cluster with his deep faith and joyous spirit. He loves helping the suffering and sick and finds it very fulfilling to serve his parishioners. His assignment here will begin on July 8th and we look forward to extending him a very warm welcome.

Mary's Mantle Consecration... by Helen Gerdes and participants

Growing in Faith. Mary's Mantle Consecration, a 46 day program that concludes with consecrating oneself to Mary, was offered at Sacred Heart during the season of Lent. Eleven people participated in the program which included a daily rosary, periodic fasting (bread and water), and gaining awareness of virtues and gifts of the Spirit and incorporating them into your daily living. In addition, the group met weekly to view a motivational video. These videos focused on the importance of Mary in our lives, the reason for fasting and how it has been a part of our faith for centuries, the sacrament of Penance and how vital it is to help us improve, and the role of virtue in our daily living to further out spiritual growth.

"I feel so blessed in having experienced the Mary's Mantle Consecration in our small group. It was a simple, yet powerful way to experience God's love through Mary, Our Beloved Mother. Saying the rosary daily, simple fasting and pondering the virtues and gifts Mary and Jesus possessed, and offering these for our groups' intentions has been life changing and rewarding."

"Mary's Mantle Consecration is time with Mary, my mom, as declared by Jesus. I became a more loving and caring person while learning Mary's guiding suggestions on the spiritual gifts I received in baptism and confirmation."

"This Lenten journey was truly a rewarding experience. It provided me a structured opportunity to focus daily living with intention. I became aware of the practice of fasting and how important this needs to be if I hope to grow spiritually. Having a group to share the experience was powerful; they became like family. Even though Lent is now past, I continue to follow the routine of prayer, fasting, and focus on a virtue for a full week."

"I am always looking for something to do and make my Lenten time meaningful. The Mary's Mantle retreat did this for me this past Lent. The daily readings, videos, praying the rosary, and fasting were a wonderful guideline to bring me closer to God and Mary. This was truly the best Lenten experience I have ever had. I will do this again throughout this year and next Lent."

"I enjoyed getting together weekly to pray and discuss what we read and really get to know the other people in our group. The daily rosary and readings were good to think about, and learn other ways to pray. The fasting for a day wasn't as hard as I thought. It was a good experience."

"Thank you for offering the Mary's Mantle Consecration for us. It was a wonderful learning experience for me. I learned so much from the readings and discussions. The Scripture passages, saints quotes and questions, videos, reciting the rosary daily and even the fasting were all thought provoking. I will definitely refer back to the book and videos in the future."

"My experience with Mary's Mantle was truly unique. As I entered the program, I did not know what to expect but wanted to explore an avenue to deepen my faith.

Mary's Mantle is an easy program to do. I recommend the program to all ages. I enjoyed the quiet time of the daily rosary and short inspirational reading each day. It was surprise that on my occasional fast day; I could live on bread and water and still maintain a busy schedule. The weekly videos were inspiring and thought provoking. Knowing that the group was praying for me and my special intentions was comforting.

I brought a special intention to the program. Our family has been praying for five years that our son and daughter-in-law would receive an adoptive newborn child. In the middle of the Mary's Mantle program, they received a call that in two weeks they would have an adoptive newborn child join their family. Cloe Ruth was born at the close of Mary's Mantle—a healthy baby girl whose mother signed off her rights at the end of 48 hours. It was such a surprise as the adoptive parents are 50 and 47 years old. The family assumed it would never happen because of the ages. They are thrilled!

I can only say, "thank you", to Mary and her son, Jesus, for petitions answered and great blessings.

If this program is offered again, please participate. It is truly a growth experience.

"Participation in the Mary's Mantle Consecration retreat this past Lent has left some lasting habits that will strengthen me on my faith journey. Consecration to Mary is the offering of ourselves to Our Lady so that she may intercede to bring us closer to Christ and work for the greatest salvation of souls. The practice of praying the rosary daily, four intermittent days of bread and water fasting, reading about and reflecting on a new virtue each day, and finally consecration to Mary were all important aspects of the retreat. There is a wonderful explanation of each virtue in a 1-2 page format and an additional journaling workbook. Videos that accompanied the retreat each week were very powerful and informative, explaining the rosary, fasting, reconciliation, the need for adopting the virtues, and the power of consecrating yourself to Mary, our heavenly mother and intercessor. Contemplating the 46 virtues will be an ongoing part of my prayer and spiritual growth as well as a daily rosary."

After first assisting the people of Stacyville construct and grow the Visitation church and school, the early settlers of Meyer decided it was time they formed their own parish. This first school, a frame building, was located just west of Meyer, across from the Harry May farmstead. Masses were held in this building and Sacred Heart Parish of Meyer was formed in early 1900 with instruction by the Sisters of Saint Francis.

As the parish and local families grew, the school was busting at the seams. It was time for a larger and more permanent structure and location. In the early years of the 1900's a larger school building was erected west of the current church building. St. Mary's Academy served the needs of the Meyer schoolchildren until 1968. Plans began in earnest for a separate church building and after much planning, the current day church building was approved. In early 1908, ground was broken and commencement of construction to the present day church began with the cornerstone set in June of that year.

Construction of this beautiful gothic revival style church was, as many things in Meyer, was an all hands on deck affair. While there was a full time construction crew, local parishioners and schoolchildren helped create this work of art. From the mosaic tile flooring of the vestibule, to the stained glass windows donated by groups and family members of the parish, culminating with the magnificent fresco artwork that adorns the ceilings and walls the final product is still one of Mitchell County's most beautiful churches. A grotto honoring Mary and a rectory were added to the complex as well.

In 2005, Sacred Heart Parish became Sacred Heart Oratory due to declining parish enrollments and a restructuring of diocesan staff. While weekly Masses are no longer held in Meyer, the Oratory is available for weddings, funerals and baptisms. Volunteers gather each year for the annual Fall Supper which, along with generous donations, provides maintenance and support for the facility.

2025 will mark 125 years of faith, family and community in the small unincorporated village of Meyer and local residents are planning an event to gather in celebration. This evolving event will be held August 23 and 24 of this year and is designed to be a time to gather, reminisce and tour the facility and town.

Community events will take place on Saturday, with a parade and musical entertainment to be held in the early evening. A Mass of celebration will be held on Sunday, August 24, at 10:30am with a meal following. Details will be shared with the public via the Meyer, Iowa, Facebook page, St. Isidore Cluster bulletins, and local media as they become available.
(8:30am Mass on August 24 will be at Sacred Heart, Osage)
