A Message from Fr. Matt

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

My mom was a really smart lady. She had a way of kind of "taking the air out" of a situation or dispute that let us see it rightly. I remember watching a movie with my mom and one of the characters swore, using the "F-word". I was probably 13 or so. I felt so uncomfortable. I was sure that my mom had never heard that word or if she had, she must be so upset that we were watching a movie with such language. My mom stopped the movie and instead of being angry or disgusted, she told us how stupid that writing was. They didn't even use the word in a grammatically proper way. She challenged us not to speak like this because she said, we were smarter than this. She took the air out of the moment. Instead of it being a moment of cringing and awkwardness, she made it a moment to think, learn and be challenged. There was another moment like this that I remember. A few of us were arguing about who was the favorite child. Some of my siblings were saying that I acted like I was. Can you imagine that?? So, we asked my mom. Now she could have sat down and told us the good things about each of us and tried to make each of us feel special, but she didn't. It was a stupid question. She wasn't going to choose one of us. So, she said; "I don't like any of you!" We laughed. We knew without a doubt that she loved us, but her response took the contentiousness out of the room. She had this talent for transcending situations and getting us to focus on what was really important.


There is an old saying, "the enemy of my enemy is my friend." It is a cynical way of thinking. It is the kind of thinking that got the Pharisees and the Herodians together in today's Gospel. You see, the Pharisees and the Herodians couldn't have been further apart in the way that they saw the world. Pharisees were scrupulously observant of the Mosaic Law. The Herodians were collaborators with the occupying Roman government. They were not friends. They looked at each other with disdain. They had very different goals and ends in mind. But they were united by the fact that Jesus was a threat to them, although in what way they were uncertain. They come to Jesus with a question about taxes. They think that they have given him two choices. One choice will make Him a breaker of the Law of Moses. The other choice will make Him a breaker of the law of the Roman Empire. Either way, they think, they will get Jesus in some trouble and maybe then they can get rid of Him. But Jesus takes the air out of the room. Jesus transcends the dispute. The coin they show him as the way to pay the tax has the image of Caeser on it. So Jesus says, it must belong to Caeser. But then, He reminds them whose image and likeness is on them; God's. So, they must belong to God. Jesus transcends the argument. He moves it from a petty dispute, a baited trap to see whose side He is on, to a deep challenge about what each of us owe to God. Jesus pretty much tells them, "I don't like any of you," and then shows the depth of His love for all of them by challenging them to think about something much more important, their relationship with God.

So often, when we don't agree with another person, we look at them as enemies. We inflate our disagreements falsely into the most important things. It kind of comes back to an age-old problem that I think gets us in trouble a lot. You and I think that we have stuff figured out. We think that we know absolutely what is right. We think that we have God figured out. We know whose side God is on and it sure isn't the side of the people who don't see things the way that I see them. This is arrogance. We do not have God figured out. We cannot contain God in our small understanding. We can only seek Him out and seek a relationship with Him. Look at the First Reading. Do you think that Israel, when they were in exile, saw Cyrus the King of Persia as their friend? No, they did not. Yet God used Cyrus to rebuild Jerusalem and the Temple. The person Israel saw as their greatest enemy turned out to be their great friend. God works that way sometimes. It is hard to understand and figure out. Our problem is that we try to. This isn't our place. This figuring out is again, arrogance. We are asking the wrong questions. Fighting the wrong battles. God transcends the enmity that we think is so important. It is not us versus them. It never has been. It is us and God. Nothing is more important.

This week, I am going to try to be a little more like my mom. When disputes come up, I am going to try to take

the "air out of the room," and pivot, transcend the dispute to focus on what is really important. Maybe you could think about this too. This is what Jesus did. He didn't allow Himself to be drawn into petty disputes. He didn't play their games. He turned the focus to what was really important. Give to God what belongs to God. You belong to God. So does the person you dislike the most. So too does the person who we think is most evil in the world. God is working. We can't even imagine what God has in store. Focus on your relationship with Him. Nothing is more important.



DID YOU KNOW?

THE CHI RHO

The Chi Rho—a symbol that looks like a "P" with an "X" superimposed over it—is a *Christogram*. IHS represents "Jesus" in Greek, while the Chi Rho stands for "Christ": the letters X (chi) and P



(rho) are the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek.

Constantine had a dream in which Jesus instructed him to make a likeness of the symbol and use it as a defense against his enemies.

Constantine won the Battle of the Milvian Bridge and soon after converted to Christianity.

He continued to use the Chi Rho as his battle-symbol and on other official items such as coins.

Its use quickly spread throughout the empire, and it is now one of our faith's most common symbols.
