Dear Parishioners,

Recently I watched an online video entitled, <u>Why Being Good Is Not Enough</u>. Bishop Robert Barron, auxiliary Bishop in LA, offered this thought provoking reflection discussing how the liturgy, the Mass - from the Biblical perspective - is an essential aspect of being aligned with God.

The book of Exodus in the OT articulates how God formed Israel as particularly HIS OWN: spiritually, morally, and liturgically. We remember the stories: the burning bush, the plagues, the Passover, and the 10 commandments (to name a few). Yet Exodus 25-40 describes in detail prescriptions of religious rituals and liturgy.

Bishop Barron's surfaces what many contemporary ideologies hold towards religion: namely, religion is about producing good and ethically-minded people; that it doesn't really matter what you believe, as long as you're a good person, that's all that matters (Immanuel Kant). This reduction of religion is not only dangerous, its wrong.

Obviously the Bible is concerned about morality. To share in God's life, we must conform our lives to Christ and act as He did with love and justice. So why so many chapters in Exodus (not-to-mention the entire book of Leviticus) devoted to the ritual and liturgical formation so essential for Israel, and now through Holy Mass for us as Catholics?

First - God doesn't need, nor benefit from, our worship. The God who created the universe doesn't need anything from the universe. Rather, we as human beings, need ritual and liturgical formation. Why? Because the Mass aligns us rightly with God. Sin disorders and misaligns our relationship with God; but liturgy, the Mass, orders it properly.

How relevant to this time of pandemic! For good reasons we closed Churches and now we are allowed back with restrictions, but there has been a distancing of people from the formal worship of God at Mass, from the Eucharist — understandably. Bishop Barron's concern: that we may revert to this Kantian ideology that religion is just about being good. "Well, I've got a good relationship with God, and I've been away from ritual and the Mass for these months,

and I'm ok. I'll just watch it online. So why does it matter?

It matters tremendously! Throughout the Bible we hear how God established the temple, altars, incense, priests, vestments, sacrifice, and music as integral in aligning His people to Himself. Understandably, many are still cautious to come to Mass for good reasons. Yet, everyone I've spoken to gets that Mass online in their living room is not quite the same as being together in the Church. So to practice my faith, isn't being a good person enough? Bishop Barron answers, and I agree, "The short answer: No."



# **MEMORIAL OF ST. PETER CLAVER · Wednesday, September 9**

## NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER TO END THE SIN OF RACISM

Saint Peter Clavers was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1888. The engraving shown above was produced in Rome to commemorate the canonization.

t. Peter Claver was born in the village of Verdú in Spain in 1580 and entered the Jesuits at the age of 20. He volunteered for the Spanish colonies and was sent to Grenada where he arrived in the port city of Cartagena in 1610. Cartagena was a slave-trading hub, and 10,000 captive Africans poured into the port annually, crossing the Atlantic from West Africa under conditions so foul that an estimated one-third died in transit. Working with another Jesuit priest, Father Alonso Sandoval, Father Claver quickly turned his attention to the plight of the captives. He often headed to the port as soon as a slave ship arrived, caring for them both on the ships and in the nearby yards with medicine, food, bread, brandy, lemons and tobacco.

During the time of the year when the slave ships did not normally arrive, Father Claver traveled the country, visiting plantation after plantation to give spiritual consolation to those enslaved. He continually encountered opposition for his advocacy on behalf of the enslaved people, but he persevered in doing so for more than 40 years. During his ministry it is estimated that he personally catechized and baptized 300,000 slaves.

He died in 1654, in complete poverty after a long illness. He was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1888 and is the patron saint of African Americans.

This Wednesday, Sept. 9, is the Memorial of St. Peter Claver. I invite everyone to celebrate the feast in a special way this year through the sacrifice of the Mass in reparation for sins against the Sacred Heart of Jesus and especially in reparation for sins based upon race. Additionally, I encourage each parish and Catholic school on that day to host a Holy Hour or to celebrate the special "Stations of the Cross: Overcoming Racism" seeking the particular intercession of St. Peter Claver to end the scourge of racism in our midst and to turn our hearts to remember that we are all brothers and sisters in Christ.


