Tips for Evangelizing:

- Invite somebody to church. This is especially effective during Advent, Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost and Ordinary Time.
- 2. Participate in a Catholic or ecumenical Bible study or faith sharing group.
- 3. Make time for others. Be accessible to them.
- 4. Say grace at meals...with Sign of the Cross wherever you are.
- 5. Call someone who is lonely.
- 6. Try spiritual reading or meditation to prepare yourself to be a natural evangelist.
- 7. Help children learn more about God Books for Children.

Not so Ordinary Time

From Christmas to Pentecost the liturgy highlights the central mysteries of the Paschal Mystery: the incarnation, crucifixion, resurrection, ascension of Christ, and the descent of the Holy Spirit. *Ordinary Time*, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion, living the life of Christ.

Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history. The goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ in November just before Advent begins.

Q & A About Our Faith

Q: How Do Faith and Reason Work Together

A: God created us with an intellect for us to understand the truth. Sometimes it is hard to understand what we cannot see and our faith enables us to believe what Christ has told us. Faith and reason work together to understand the mysteries of our faith. St. Augustine said: "I believe in order to understand and I understand in order to believe."

Q: Why is the Rosary considered one of the best prayers?

A: Our Lady of Fatima ended her initial message with the direction, "Pray the Rosary every day, in order to obtain peace for the world, and the end of the war." Fatima's Sister Lucia describes how she believes that after the Holy Mass, praying the Rosary — taking into account its origin, the prayers in it, and the mysteries of the Redemption we recall and meditate on for each decade — "is the most pleasing prayer we can offer to God and one which is most advantageous to our own souls. If such were not the case, Our Lady would not have asked for it so insistently." (excerpted from National Catholic Register, November 19, 2017)
