Message from Fr. Rick:

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?

The unnamed scholar of the law who asks this question of Jesus clearly wants to know what he has to do to "inherit eternal life."

In the Book of Deuteronomy Moses tells the people that the Commandments and statutes written in the Book of the Law are not "too mysterious and remote."

So which is it?

"Mysterious and remote"? or "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and your neighbor as yourself "

The answer is both!

And, no, I am not trying to be cute Yes, to "inherit eternal life" is not easy. But it is not easy because it demands that we rise above our selfish desires and live for others. God, first of all, and then, for love of God; our neighbor.

Traditional moral teaching used to talk about something called "concupiscence" a fancy schmantzy word that simply means that tendency to sin that plagues us all. The perennial temptation to take the easy way out – to put in the least effort to get the reward. To, almost automatically, prefer advancing our own interests, preferences, comfort and convenience about everything else. Even God.

Overcoming this sinful tendency is not easy it demands constant effort! But the reward is, quite literally, divine!

Mission Appeal: This weekend, July 13-14 we welcome a speaker from the Franciscan Sisters of St. Bernadette, Tanzania to speak at our Masses. This is part of the Mission Appeal program. A second collection will be taken to support their efforts. *Checks must be made payable to St. Anthony Parish.*

At present, the Franciscan Sisters of St. Bernadette have great challenges that are facing their orphanage, such as shortage of ample funds for buying food, clothes, school fees and medical services to our orphans. Their community has been struggling for four years to build St. Bonaventure English Medium school. Recent heavy rains have left their school with no roofs.

The good news is that two classrooms, an administration block, one dormitory for the girls and boys are already in use. Our next priority is to build two classrooms and one dining room for the underprivileged children whom we serve. We believe that this effort will empower the children by giving them a good education so that they will be able to carry on their own lives in the future. Thank you for your support.

Office of Youth & Young Adults: A Shrine Workcamp will be held August 5-10 at Rice Memorial High School. We are delighted to share with you an amazing opportunity this coming August - Shine Missions, a national organization that sponsors weeks of service throughout the United States, is coming to Burlington!

The event will be headquartered at Rice Memorial High School, and then groups of teens and young adults will fan out throughout the community to serve those in need - particularly the homeless, elderly and needy. They will be partnering with numerous organizations throughout the great Chittenden County area. Finally, they are expecting close to 100 teens, including teens from as far away as Wisconsin and Virginia, as well as a group from Martha's Vineyard.





Fred Rogers, who would later famously have his own "Neighborhood," earned his first degree in music composition. He went to work in television and found his way into children's programming as a puppeteer, composer, and organist. He studied to become a Presbyterian minister and to earn a degree in child development in his off hours. After his ordination, his church agreed he should continue to be the best possible grownup neighbor to children who could use one. Neighbors aren't simply the folks next door. They're primarily the people who need us most.

Slavery no more

Today's first reading has a theme of slavery. Since many Catholics and church institutions profited from slavery in earlier centuries, the church's message of dignity for all was frequently muted then, but it has become increasingly clear. Modern popes and the official Catechism now strongly condemn the practice—an important stride since present-day slavery (human trafficking) continues to plague the United States and other countries. Take a step to uphold human dignity: Learn about modern slavery and how to help end it.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 1:8-14, 22; Matthew 10:34—11:1 (389). "The Egyptians, then, dreaded the children of Israel and reduced them to cruel slavery."

MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL

The holy queen of hearts

Mary, the saint of saints, is also a person for all people. Many communities and cultures have a special closeness to her, a testimony of her closeness to the people. Mary was also close to the hermits of Mount Carmel located in the Holy Land of the 12th and 13th centuries. Eventually known as Carmelites, they prayed with Mary and sought her guidance as they walked in faith. They saw in Mary a person of deep prayer who could ponder and hold "all things in her heart." In what ways can Mary accompany you in a more contemplative stance in the world?

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 2:1-15a; Matthew 11:20-24 (390). "The woman therefore took the child and nursed it."

Wednesday, Jul 17, 2019

Get your exercise

Figuring out God's will is about as daunting an undertaking as there is. Nonetheless, we Catholics are supposed to our base decisions on what we discern God wants. Here's a handy tool: Ignatian spirituality, which comes from the *Spiritual Exercises* by Saint Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits. This spirituality is characterized by seeking spiritual direction, finding God in all things, examining one's consciousness, and serving those in need.

The *Exercises* are intended to be done over the course of a month. The next time you feel stumped, why not give them a try? TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 3:1-6, 9-12; Matthew 11:25-27 (391). "All things have been handed over to me by my Father."

MEMORIAL OF CAMILLUS DE LELLIS, PRIEST

Bad boy makes good

Camillus de Lellis was a 16th-century Neapolitan bad boy. Son of an absent father and a mother who died when he was a child, he grew up unmanaged by family. He joined the army at 16, survived a war, then as a civilian gambled away his fortune. Having been wounded in battle, he came under the care of Capuchin Friars, who succeeded in converting him to the faith. He then founded a religious order of caregivers. Camillus is the patron saint of the sick, hospitals, doctors, and nurses, and the saint's intercession is often sought to heal gambling addiction. Invoke Saint Camillus today for your loved ones who are ill, infirm, or have a gambling problem.

FEAST OF SAINT MACRINA

Quibble over formalities or alleviate hunger?

Saint Macrina came from a family of future saints and exerted a strong influence on her siblings through her wisdom and piety. She likely would have relished today's readings. The grains crushed in the hands of Jesus' disciples or the holy bread in David's mouth answer powerfully whenever we question what comes first: rules or a pressing human need such as hunger? Macrina, bless all who hunger today, in body or in soul.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 11:10-12:14; Matthew 12:1-8 (393). "Something greater than the temple is here."

MEMORIAL OF APOLLINARIS, BISHOP, MARTYR

Rainmakers

Saint Apollinaris, a second-century bishop in Asia Minor, once wrote a letter to the Roman emperor Marcus Aurelius in defense of Christianity in general and his own flock in particular. In petitioning the emperor, Apollinaris did not hesitate to remind him of a recent event. While on a military campaign against a Germanic tribe, Aurelius' army was in danger of dying of thirst—until one of his legions, the 12th, which was made up mostly of Christians, fell to its knees and prayed for rain. The sudden storm that followed saved the army and allowed them to defeat the Germans. A grateful Aurelius gave these men the name "Thundering Legion" and eased up on his persecution of Christians. How can you put your life in the hands of God today?

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 12:37-42; Matthew 12:14-21 (394). "Many people followed him, and he cured them all, but he warned them not to make him known."
