Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"... the necessity to pray always without becoming weary."

Pray! Pray! Pray!

We are told this over and over again from the time we are very young, Pray! Pray! Pray! In this weekend's Gospel reading Jesus emphasizes the point, Pray "always, without becoming weary." But why? The dishonest judge in the parable is finally worn down by the persistence of the widow, to the point where he decides in her favor for fear she will harm him if he does not. But God is <u>not</u> like that corrupt judge. He cannot be "worn down." He doesn't need to be. His heart and His will is already inclined in our favor ... Then why pray? Why petition? St. Augustine still has what I think is still the best answer: Our persistent prayer does not and can not 'change' God's mind, God's mind is already made up in our favor. What persistent prayer does do is expand our hearts as we grow to lean on, to trust our loving Father that He will always give us what is truly for our good!

White Ribbon Against Pornography 2019

WRAP Week 2019 · October 27 - November 3

he White Ribbon Against Pornography (WRAP) campaign, begun in 1987, brings people together to promote awareness and tackle the societal harms of pornography. This year's WRAP Week runs from Oct. 27 to Nov. 3.

Pornography is big business. It is aggressive, savvy and available online for free in content to lure new users, marketing to both males and females. As Americans, we are immersed in media and the exposure to pornography. There is a dangerous addiction to pornography; the brains of those addicted to it are triggered much like that of people with drug or alcohol addictions. As with any addiction, recovery is a long and challenging process, and help is needed to regain freedom from it.

Here are four ways you can participate in the WRAP campaign:

- 1. Wear a white ribbon; it's a great conversation starter.
- Talk to your children and grandchildren about pornography and its harms.
- Politely make complaints to businesses that distribute or advertise pornography and obscene material.
- Pray and fast that God would heal those harmed by pornography and struggling with compulsive pornography use.

MEMORIAL OF JOHN OF CAPISTRANO, PRIEST

To heal the past we acknowledge it

John of Capistrano (1386-1456), preacher, theologian, and Franciscan reformer, was also a leading proponent of the antisemitism that sadly has infected much of church history. During his era, Jews faced restrictions on where they could live and what they could own, were required to dress in a way that signaled they were Jews, and at times faced violent pogroms incited by fiery preachers such as John. As we acknowledge past shortcomings, let us remain vigilant to contemporary resurgences

of intolerance in any form. The reform we need begins here and now, in our hearts.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 6:12-18; Luke 12:39-48 (475). "You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

Thursday, Oct 24, 2019

Light your fire

In scripture, fire often signals God's presence, notably the burning bush Moses encounters and the tongues of fire that appear above the disciples at Pentecost. Fire also signifies a disciple's zeal for the faith. "An apostolic missionary must have both a heart and tongue ablaze with charity," said Saint Anthony Claret, founder of the Sons of the Immaculate Heart of Mary order, better known as the Claretians. For the past 170 years, Claretian missionaries have spread the gospel message around the world, primarily through preaching and parish work, social justice advocacy, education, and publishing. The Claretian logo carries a flame to remind all Christians of their call to unceasingly expend themselves "to light the fire of divine love in the world." Take steps to flame the passion of your faith today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 6:19-23; Luke 12:49-53 (476). "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!"

Friday, Oct 25, 2019

Paul gets it

Who has not felt the anguish of Paul in today's first reading, unable to overcome his own vices? He's so disgusted with himself, he wonders, "Who will deliver me from this mortal body?" Although Paul hints that he'd like to be pure spirit, over and over our faith ties body and soul closely together, resting on the foundation that Christ became flesh. Our bodies may fail us, but they "are temples of the Holy Spirit." If your body has let you down through illness or sin, know that you keep company with Paul, and perhaps ask Paul's intercession. He understands.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 7:18-25a; Luke 12:54-59 (477). "I take delight in the law of God, in my inner self."

Think about it

Catholics proclaim the Nicene Creed on most Sundays when we gather to celebrate the Mass. Spoken in one voice as individuals within a community, it is how we claim the core beliefs of our faith. With the final words, we profess belief in the holy, catholic, apostolic Church, and in one Baptism for the forgiveness of sin. The final sentence is: "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." Here is the question: Do I *really* look forward to the life of the world to come?

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 8:1-11; Luke 13:1-9 (478). "Lord, this is the people who longs to see your face."
