Message from Fr. Rick:

33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"All that you see here - the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down."

For a devout, God fearing Jew of our Lord's time there was no place on earth holier than the magnificent temple in Jerusalem. The original temple built by King Solomon was destroyed by the Babylonians. In Jesus' time the temple in Jerusalem was erected by the murderous tyrant Herod the Great and building continued under his cowardly and mentally unstable son, Herod Antipas (who had St. John the Baptist beheaded and who played a minor role in Jesus' trial).

Like Solomon's temple before it, it was the very center of the world. That one, unique place where in a real but mysterious way, God Himself dwelled among men. It was, as was only fitting, a magnificent building. It would, it was claimed, take your breath away when you first saw it.

So when Jesus hints at the future destruction of God's very dwelling among men, the Apostles would assume that He could only be hinting at an even greater catastrophe, the end of the world! Notice that Jesus doesn't deny at all that that is what He is talking about. Instead, He urges His Apostles, and, us to persevere. These times in which we live, in between the Lord's ascension and His second coming, is the time for courage, for steady perseverance in bearing witness to Him who is Himself the true and lasting temple! 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Policies & Procedures

Issue date: August, 2019

Use of Cemetery

Roman Catholic cemeteries are holy places. These sacred grounds are blessed by the Church and dedicated as a place of prayer and dignity for our faithful departed. Quiet reverence and respect for other people visiting the resting sites of their loved ones should be maintained at all times.

General Regulations:

The following shall be the general rules and regulations for the use of the cemeteries. No person shall:

- Damage or mutilate any trees, shrubs, flowers or other plant material, either wild or domestic.
- In any way injure or deface any monument, stone, fence, or other structure or property.
- Deposit rubbish or debris on cemetery grounds.
- Allow any domesticated pet to soil or damage any natural area, monument, or cemetery structure. Pet owners are responsible for properly disposing of any pet droppings.
- Hunt or discharge firearms in or adjacent to any cemetery. The prohibition does not apply to authorized volleys at burial services.
- Consume alcoholic beverages, or bring the same within cemetery grounds.

Information for Burial Rights

Persons arranging for burials should contact the parish office where management will provide assistance.

All in-ground burials, casket or urn, must be placed in an outer burial container made of concrete or other durable material approved by the parish.

The use of the lot is for the burial right owner, their written designee, or as determined by the estate executor for burial only, and the right of burial granted therein is not for sale, or for profit. In the event of a death of the original burial right owner, any and all privileges remaining shall pass to the legal heirs or per written instructions of the burial right owner. The burial rights of an unoccupied lot may only be resold to the cemetery at the price originally paid. The management is under no obligation to purchase a lot offered by the license holder(s).

Lot sizes are hereby established as 4' x 11', or 44 sq. ft.

The cost of the initial burial right in a lot allows for the burial of either one casket or one cremation urn in that lot. If a casket is buried first in a lot, burial rights for additional cremation urns, up to a total of four, are allowed in the lot. If a cremation urn is buried first in a lot, only additional urns may be buried in that lot up to a total of four. Additional burial rights for cremation urns in a lot are sold at half the current initial burial right cost for a lot.

It shall be the duty of the burial right owner to notify the parish office of any change in his/her mailing address. Notice sent to a burial right owner at the last address in the parish's records shall be considered sufficient legal notification.

Cemetery Maintenance:

Responsibility of the Church: The comprehensive maintenance of the cemeteries and grounds, designed to maintain and improve their appearance and condition of their natural areas shall be the responsibility of the Church. It shall include such items as the upkeep of drives, buildings, fences, spring and fall cleanup, pruning and maintenance of landscape plant materials, turf maintenance and other general grounds maintenance.

Responsibility of the Families: In order to safely and efficiently perform the work for comprehensive maintenance the families are responsible for adhering to the following rules and regulations.

- All monuments, grave markers, planters and flower containers are the responsibility of the family.
- One monument is allowed per lot. All monuments shall be placed on foundations. Any corner markers are to be flush with the ground.
- Other structures including benches, fencing, curbs or cornerstones are not permitted on grave sites or along the boundaries of the cemetery.
- Flowers or bushes may not be planted directly in the ground, they must be in planters placed directly to the right and/or to the left of the monument. A hanging planter may be on a hook with the hook in the ground directly adjacent to the monument with the plant directly over the monument.
- Gravesites are to be kept free of dead or faded decorations. These are not to be disposed of on cemetery property. Cemetery personnel may remove items that are deemed outdated, broken, unsafe for maintenance operations, or otherwise not in keeping with the serenity of the grounds.
- All flowers and decorations are to be removed by October 31st for fall cleanup. New items may be placed after November 15th. All items are to be removed by April 15th for spring cleanup and new items may be placed after May 15th.
- Visiting times are during daylight hours, dawn to dusk. Loitering is not permitted.
- Water will be turned on by May 15th and shut off by October 31st, temperatures permitting.

MEMORIAL OF ROSE PHILIPPINE DUCHESNE

If at first you don't succeed

As a child in France, Rose Philippine Duchesne (1769-1852) watched her mother care for the poor and heard travelers tell stories of the "New World." It's not impossible to think that when Rose joined the sisters of the Society of the Sacred Heart, she had hopes of serving the poor in faraway lands. In 1818, after years of teaching in France, Rose and four other sisters were sent to answer a bishop's request for assistance in his vast Louisiana territory. From New Orleans, the sisters were missioned to Missouri to establish schools. By the time Rose got to Sugar Creek, Kansas in 1841 to open a school for Potawatomie girls, she was 72 and her primary ministry became one of prayer. Indeed, the people she served called her the "woman who prays always." Saint Rose, help us imitate your perseverance and care for the poor.

Man up!

Some say it's a man's world, but it isn't. It belongs to God. However, today *is* International Men's Day. It's part of "Movember," when men grow a "mo" (mustache) to draw attention to male health issues, including emotional health. For men, the Good News offers an invitation to heal the emotional wounds of the past; address anger, violence, and abusive domination; deal with relationship dysfunction and grow into wholesome, kind, and holy individuals. Today join with men everywhere to welcome the Son of Man who came to save us all.

Be mindful of your daily bread

Why do religious traditions usually include dietary laws or restrictions, as well as periods of fasting and abstinence? Perhaps it has something to do with remembering "who we are." Nothing is more ordinary and everyday than eating (although for many in the world, sadly, it can be a struggle to find anything to eat). Alongside the church's guidelines on fasting and abstinence during the Lenten season, look for a way every week to

incorporate some dietary practice of your own choosing that helps you remember your relationship of dependence on the Creator for your nourishment—both physical and spiritual.

MEMORIAL OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

From generation to generation

Today we celebrate the Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, a moment to recognize Mary's great faith and its link to her parents' deep faith. Church tradition has it that Mary's parents, Joachim and Anne, brought her to the temple at age 3 to be dedicated to God. This acknowledgement that faith is passed from one generation to the next is something many modern Catholics also understand. Is that true for you? Consider thanking a family member who inspires and encourages your faith.

MEMORIAL OF CECILIA, VIRGIN, MARTYR

Cecilia, you're breaking my heart

Saint Cecilia, patron of musicians, has been inspiring artists and seekers for centuries—from the Baroque composer Handel to today's music and songwriting legend Paul Simon. Saint Cecilia's association with music comes from a story recounting how her heart overflowed in song to God, even during a particularly difficult time in her life. What a witness to the power of love! In "Anthem for Saint Cecilia's Day," poet W.H. Auden calls upon Saint Cecilia with the words: "Blessed Cecilia, appear in visions / To all musicians, appear and inspire: / Translated Daughter, come down and startle / Composing mortals with immortal fire." What endeavor in your life are you being inspired to "compose" with "immortal fire"?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 4:36-37, 52-59; Luke 19:45-48 (501). "On that very day the sanctuary was reconsecrated with songs, harps, flutes, and cymbals."

BLESSED MIGUEL AGUSTÍN PRO, PRIEST, MARTYR; BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

A drama of faith

The Sadducees, who say there is no Resurrection" wouldn't have known what to do with Blessed Miguel Pro. During a period of harsh persecution of the Catholic Church in Mexico in the 1920s, this Jesuit disguised himself cleverly (as a cop, for instance, bringing Eucharist to prisoners in jail). His underground ministry evoked the irreverent humor and daring he'd exhibited since childhood. Falsely accused of a plot to murder the president and denied a trial, he was shot by a firing squad. After forgiving his captors on the way to his execution, he stretched out his arms, Christlike, and voiced the slogan of the Catholic resistance, *Viva Cristo Rey!* ("Long live Christ the King!") Photos of his execution rallied the resistance. How does his courageous witness inspire you?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 6:1-13; Luke 20:27-40 (502). "God not of the dead, but of the living; for to [God] all . . . are alive."
