#### **Fourth Sunday of Advent**

December 20, 2020



With Christmas but five days away, today is a good day to ponder the Archangel Gabriel's final words to Our Lady at the Annunciation:

"For nothing will be impossible for God." Savor these words ... ponder them .... "For nothing will be impossible for God."

You may recall that one of my favorite poems was composed in 15th century England by the English priest, martyr, and poet St. Robert Southwell. His wonderful poem "*The Nativity of Christ*" includes these words:

"... the Word is dumb, the mirth of heaven doth weep, Might feeble is and force doth faintly creep ..." In his interplay of opposites, the Word is silent, the joy of Heaven weeps, and the all-powerful crawls like a baby. St Robert expresses well the sheer impossibility of Christmas. The Almighty God willingly assumes the fragile condition of a newborn baby. For, indeed, as Gabriel says, "Nothing shall be impossible for God."

As we move into these uncertain winter months, I want you to know that we at Saint Anthony are here for you. We miss you. We invite you to come back to Mass if you have been away, even if it is one of our weekday Masses with fewer people present. I am also available to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation or the Anointing of the Sick. For Catholics, the Sacraments are instituted by Christ to give us grace. Pope Francis reminds us that Communion is not a reward for good behavior but medicine for the sick. We all need Christ's help during these difficult times. Take time out each day for your own prayer. Pray as a family before meals. Watch Mass online or on TV if you don't feel safe coming to Mass, and join in the online offerings that our parish and diocese offer. I am here for you and pray daily for you. This is my duty and blessing for me as a parish priest.



## God is with us

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shined" (Is 9:2).

y brothers and sisters, if we ever needed to be reminded once again of the full meaning of the Incarnation, the present situation in the world and in our country presents itself for consideration. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (Jn 3:16). Throughout the centuries in this epoch of Christ and the Church, time and time again the world has been assaulted by the darkness of sin, war, racial hatred, disease and pandemics and, time and time again, the Catholic Christian faith has been a light that has shined in the darkness.

In Christ, sin and death — personified as darkness — have been overcome by light — Christ the Word made flesh. The various biblical stories and traditions of Christmas enflesh this truth: The closeness of Christmas Day with its lengthening of days to the day of the winter solstice, the shortest day of the year in the north; the star hovering above Bethlehem, leading the Magi to the stable where Jesus was born; the heavenly voices of the angels rejoicing in the night with the triumphant message to the shepherds that a "Savior has been born;" and the later traditions of the yule log and the lights on the tree and candles in the window all proclaiming that upon those who

dwelt in darkness and despair a light has shone. How timely for us to hear these bearings of good news again today.

Yet, what does the Christian message bring to a divided nation gripped by pandemic and increasing political, economic and social separation? Everything. What does our message of hope bring to people who feel isolated, angry and socially adrift? Invitation. I believe that more than ever, just as the message of Christ has been incarnational from its beginning — "God made man" — so the message of Christ that is carried forth in the salvific work of the Church is incarnational as well: God the Father, Son and Spirit in the Church are manifested in the baptized believer who makes present to others the fulness of truth that resides in his or heart that God is with us. I think our most important work right now in our families, in our communities, in our places of work is to be with others as a Roman Catholic, preaching the word of salvation by the sermon of our lives.

How can others know that "God is with us?" Because I live as one who says, "God is with me."

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT (O KEY OF DAVID)

#### Unlocking every door

Those who have been incarcerated know exactly what it means to face a locked door. So do folks who have been institutionalized with mental illness. But even those of us who have not been behind a literal door may find ourselves living under a sentence of fear, bitterness, depression, or unforgiveness. We may be locked out of relationships that are important to us because of resentment or past actions. Poverty is often a prison that keeps opportunity and hope out, while also fostering despair within. O Jesus, Key of David, unlock every door that keeps us from experiencing your freedom!

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16; Romans 16:25-27; Luke 1:26-38 (11). "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God."

#### Monday, Dec 21, 2020

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O RADIANT DAWN)

#### Just before dawn

They say it's darkest just before the dawn, and today we've reached that moment on the darkest day of what has been a very dark year. Our hope in the worst of circumstances reaches a crescendo in today's O Antiphon: "O Radiant Dawn,/splendor of eternal light, sun of justice:/come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the/shadow of death." We've reached the edge of a dramatic precipice in our waiting. Have faith and get ready—daybreak is coming.

TODAY'S READINGS: Song of Songs 2:8-14 or Zephaniah 3:14-18a; Luke 1:39-45 (197). "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

#### **Tuesday, Dec 22, 2020**

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O KING OF ALL NATIONS)

#### The unexpected king is arriving

Today's O Antiphon heralds the Messiah's long-expected arrival as king. But clearly Jesus is not a typical king—because God's kingdom is not a typical earthly kingdom. Jesus will later proclaim, through the Beatitudes, that the kingdom of God is the inverse of what we humans expect. "Blessed are the meek," he insists—and the poor, the persecuted, and those who mourn. In fact, according to Saint Matthew's version of the Final Judgment, Jesus will be the king wielding harsh judgment against all who've neglected the "least of these." How will you serve our expected-but-unexpected king today?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 1:24-28; Luke 1:46-56 (198). "He has cast down the mighty from their thrones and has lifted up the lowly."

#### Wednesday, Dec 23, 2020

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O EMMANUEL)

#### Do not doubt-God is with us

As we the church celebrate Evening Prayer—whether in monasteries or in our own homes, the domestic church—tonight we pray or sing the seventh and final O Antiphon of Advent with these words: "O Emmanuel, our king and giver of law, come to save us, Lord our God." The name *Emmanuel* means God-withus. As the season of Advent longing comes to a close, in a world that is in need of God's compassionate and saving presence, let us pray tonight for eyes to see and hearts to embrace the presence

of God-with-us in the events and conversations of these holy holidays. Indeed, O come, O come Emmanuel.

TODAY'S READINGS: Malachi 3:1-4, 23-24; Luke 1:57-66 (199). "What, then, will this child be?"

#### Thursday, Dec 24, 2020

ADVENT WEEKDAY

#### More than a song and dance

For many Catholics of Mexican heritage, today is the final celebration of Las Posadas, nine days of reenacting Mary and Joseph's search for *posada*, shelter. Each day the ritual is the same: Participants knock on doors, sing songs begging for shelter, while hosts respond with songs denying shelter, and finally end with the glorious moment when the door is opened wide and the Holy Family is given shelter for the night. The repetition drives home the desperation of the most famous migrant family and migrants of all times and places, including our own. Can you take some action in support of migrants and refugees this Christmas season?

TODAY'S READINGS: Morning: 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16; Luke 1:67-79 (200). "Here I am living in a house of cedar, while the ark of God dwells in a tent!"

#### Friday, Dec 25, 2020

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD (CHRISTMAS)

#### The Light shines upon us!

Today as we gaze upon a tiny infant born in difficult circumstances, we are also gazing upon a powerful love that has transformed the world—and us. Fragility and strength, new life and enduring love—these are not mutually exclusive. In the Incarnation, we encounter a God who has loved us since before the creation of the world and who longs to draw close and bring us life. This life is not to be "spiritualized" but to be incarnate in our whole life, including our places of pain and challenge. Saint Athanasius writes, "For the Lord touched all parts of creation, and freed and undeceived them all from every deceit." What is the freedom that God has begun to unfold within you?

TODAY'S READINGS: Vigil: Isaiah 62:1-5; Acts 13:16-17, 22-25; Matthew 1:1-25 (13); Night: Isaiah 9:1-6; Titus 2:11-14; Luke 2:1-14 (14); Day: Isaiah 52:7-10; Hebrews 1:1-6; John 1:1-18 (16). "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone."

#### Saturday, Dec 26, 2020 FEAST OF STEPHEN, FIRST MARTYR

#### Don't cloak your compassion

Even the greatest among us have their darkest moment. The great Saint Paul had such a moment before his conversion, when he looked on approvingly and guarded the cloaks of those who stoned the church's first martyr, the young and courageous deacon Stephen. Saul of Tarsus, as Paul was known before his conversion, no doubt was convinced that righteousness called for such a cruel and harsh death sentence. Be on guard for misguided righteousness wherever it rears its head, especially when that head is on your own shoulders. It rarely leads to compassion or mercy, God's signposts. Saint Stephen, pray for us.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 6:8-10; 7:54-59; Matthew 10:17-22 (696). "Stephen, filled with grace and power, was working great wonders and signs among the people. . . . They threw him out of the city, and began to stone him."
