Message from Fr. Rick:

- Fifth Sunday of Lent -

We are now in the 5th Sunday of Lent one week away from Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week.

This weekend we read of the startling encounter between Jesus and a woman caught in the act of adultery.

The scene as described by Saint John crackles with tension: A woman 'caught in the very act of committing adultery' is dragged before our Lord and likely a hostile crowd. Can you imagine the shame she must have felt? The anger? The humiliation? Likely she would not, could not even look at Jesus. Did she even hear anything beyond the self-righteous scorn of her accusers? Then the hubbub, the noise, the muttered threats of the crowd subsides The woman senses she is alone with the Rabbi from Nazareth. "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you? No one she replies, her voice trembling. And then those marvelous words so gentle, so utterly unlooked for or expected. "Neither do I condemn you now go and sin no more."

n Tuesday, April 12, at 11 a.m., priests from throughout the Diocese of Burlington will join Bishop Christopher Coyne at the St. Joseph Cathedral in Burlington for the celebration of the Chrism Mass. This annual Mass is traditionally celebrated on the morning of Holy Thursday but (as is done in most Dioceses in the United States) can be moved to another time around Easter. The Chrism Mass brings the diocesan community together as the bishop blesses the priests of the Diocese and blesses the holy oils that will be used in the sacramental life of the Church in the coming year.

During the liturgy, the priests of the Diocese will stand before the bishop and renew the promises they made at their own ordination. They resolve to be "faithful stewards of the mysteries of God in the Holy Eucharist" and "discharge the sacred office of teaching ... not seeking any gain, but moved only by zeal for souls." The bishop also exhorts everyone to pray for the priests and finally to pray for him so that he "may be made day by day a living and more perfect image of Christ, the Priest, the Good Shepherd, the Teacher and the Servant of all."

During the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the sacred oils are blessed. Containers holding the three oils — Oil of the Sick, Oil of the Catechumens and the Sacred Chrism — as well as the perfume that is mixed into the Sacred Chrism to give it its

rich aroma — are presented by deacons serving in the Diocese. The Oil of the Sick is blessed for the healing of body, mind and spirit. The Oil of Catechumens is blessed for the anointing of those preparing for baptism. Through this anointing, they are strengthened by Christ to resist the power of evil in all its forms. The Holy Chrism is consecrated by the bishop and priests of the Diocese to anoint infants after baptism, those who are to be confirmed and bishops and priests at their ordinations. It is also used to anoint altars and churches at the time of their dedication. After the Mass, the oils are distributed and brought back to all the churches in the Diocese.

All are invited to join us for this special liturgy to pray especially for our priests and for all who will be anointed by these oils in the coming year. As the bishop will pray at the Chrism Mass: "May the Lord keep us all in his charity and lead all of us, shepherds and flock, to eternal life."

The Mass will be live-streamed also on the diocesan website and Facebook page. Following the Chrism Mass, a reception will take place in the parish hall, and priests or parish representatives designated by their pastors may come down to the lower chapel to pick up the holy oils for their respective church(es).



Respect Life Ministry — What Is Article 22?

Planned Parenthood and its abortion allies continue to push aggressive abortion legislation at the national level and in all 50 states in the country. The Legislature of Vermont has approved Proposal 5, now called Article 22. Article 22 is a proposed amendment to the Vermont Constitution that will permit abortions — for any reason, through all nine months of pregnancy — up to and including the day of birth. Article 22 will be on the 2022 Vermont General Election ballot in November for an up or down vote by Vermonters. If Article 22 passes, we will have NO ability to protect the life of the unborn. Vermont will then be the first state in the country to explicitly deny unborn children the right to life in its constitution.

Pause and refresh

We rush through the hours checking items off a to-do list: work and chores, errands and meals, and more. The weekly Sabbath was designed as a pause from the maddening race of accomplishment. Pausing keeps us from making mistakes born of thoughtlessness. Jesus once asked religious elders to pause and consider their own errors before stoning a woman for hers. Father Edward Hayes (1931-2016) started a house of prayer in Kansas as a place of spiritual recollection. Pause and pray with Hayes: "May the work of my hands be part of the redemption of the world and its eternal springtime liberation."

MEMORIAL OF ISIDORE OF SEVILLE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

The original Wikipedia

Why would Pope John Paul II name a Spanish bishop who lived 1,400 years ago the patron saint of the internet? Because Saint Isidore of Seville was the equivalent of the internet in his day. A "walking encyclopedia" you might call him. He, in fact, wrote an encyclopedia, which was used as a textbook for 900 years, as well as a dictionary and a history of the world. And like the World Wide Web, he spread information everywhere he could—founding schools and requiring seminaries in every diocese. Knowledge is power—pass it on!

MEMORIAL OF VINCENT FERRER, PRIEST

Charity is good medicine

Vincent Ferrer brought healing to a suffering church and world in the early 1400s. The Dominican-order priest used his massive popularity to end a three-way power struggle over the church's legitimate pope. People loved Vincent, not just for his preaching but for thousands of miracles attributed to him—right as Europe was ravaged by war, plague, and famine. "If you truly want to help the soul of your neighbor," Vincent preached, "you should approach God first with all your heart. Ask him simply to fill you with charity, the greatest of all virtues; with it you can accomplish what you desire."

Answer your call, no matter the cost

On this day in 1830, James Augustine Healy was born to Michael Healy, an Irish-Catholic immigrant, and Eliza Smith, a mixed-race African-American enslaved person, in central Georgia. Raised as a free person, James was sent to the North for school and later decided to pursue the priesthood. Though most of his peers likely did not know he was black—and James did not announce it—he became the earliest-known African American to be ordained in the

Catholic Church, following seminary in Canada and Europe. He also became the first black bishop and ordinary in the United States when he was named to the Diocese of Portland (Maine) in 1875. He was named a bishop-assistant to the papal throne two months before his death in the year 1900 and remains an example to all of faithful service to the church.

MEMORIAL OF JEAN-BAPTISTE DE LA SALLE, PRIEST

Be the change

In the late 1600s Frenchman Jean-Baptiste de La Salle founded the De La Salle Brothers, whose communities and schools are now worldwide. De La Salle's innovative vision emphasized the inherent dignity of the student. He believed that "not only is God so good as to have created us, but God desires all of us to come to the knowledge of the truth." Early on, de La Salle battled opponents to his reforms. He never lived to receive official approval for his congregation of teaching brothers, which came nearly six years after his death. Are you called to uplift a reform or innovation that others oppose? You have a friend in Saint Jean-Baptiste de La Salle. May he pray for us!

Tap into a higher power

"The most common way people give up their power is by thinking they don't have any." That insight comes from author Alice Walker but certainly has its roots in scripture. Prophets and evangelists all spoke of the power available to each of us, if only we would access it. But we often make the mistake of looking for power in money, might, or celebrity, where we eventually find our paths blocked or our dominance fleeting. True and lasting power comes from love—love that is God. As we come to comprehend the breadth and depth of this love, Saint Paul tells us, we will be "filled with all the fullness of God" (Eph. 3:19). The ultimate renewable energy—straight from its divine source—is ours for the taking.

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Remember those who gave all

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was executed by the Nazis on this date in 1945. He was a Lutheran pastor and theologian best known for his book *The Cost of Discipleship*, which has become a Christian classic. Ardent in his resistance of the Nazis, he became a target for harassment by the Gestapo. He fled to safety in the United States but soon returned "to share the trials of this time with my people." He was arrested, imprisoned, and hanged. A gallery of 20th-century martyrs in Westminster Abbey features Bonhoeffer along with Martin Luther King Jr. and Father Óscar Romero. Few of us are called to the ultimate sacrifice, but all of us are called to remember and revere those who answered that call.
