We live in a time when violence is almost the rule of life. We often don't notice it because we get so used to it. Violence comes in many forms: domestic violence, street crime, racism, abuse of those in authority, road rage, and the unending controversial parlor conversation over the Second Amendment - gun violence.

Violence can affect everyone; young or old, rich or poor, pious or unbeliever. And

it can happen anywhere, in our neighborhood, school, workplace, even place of worship. Since last week, the Christian community of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, has been

struggling to accept and trying to put some sense to the sudden and violent demise of Auxiliary Bishop David O'Connell. Last year, Fr. Otis Young, a retired priest from the Archdiocese of New Orleans suffered an even terrible fate, beaten, stabbed to death, and burnt beyond recognition. We have no simple solution or clever way to decipher the evil that men do. We are only aware of our inability to control the human forces which cause immense evil, sadness, and pain. Every act of violence committed against a human being is a wound in humanity's flesh, every violent death diminishes us as a people.

Traditionally, Lent has served as a time for Christians throughout the ages for selfintrospection, to abstain from what that which we do not need or that which separates us from God. But Lent is also a time in which we reflect Jesus' ignominious death and how people sought to destroy him. Lent is fundamentally not about living a better life but coming to terms with the inevitability of death, and through it, a new life in Christ. Lent is about dying: dying to self, dying to intense and deep-seated hatred and ill-feelings, dying to barbaric tendencies and vicious inclinations.

The paradox of Christianity is that Christ's death was the remedy for death. It was in losing His life that Christ brought new life to our ruthless world. Christ did not suffer and die so that we do not have to - He suffered and died so that our suffering and death could be transubstantiated into a means of life.

**Lenten Fasting Guidelines:** Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 on.

Second Collection Next Weekend for the Support of the Church in Central and Eastern Europe: In late February 2022, after years of simmering tensions and a months- long buildup of troops on the Russia-Ukraine border, Russian forces invaded Ukraine. The need for humanitarian aid and pastoral support for the Ukrainian people was great and immediate, especially the millions of internally displaced persons fleeing war-torn areas for other locations within the country. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on Aid to the Church in Central and Eastern Europe was poised to provide immediate

aid to Ukraine thanks to well-established, decades-long relationships with bishops and Catholic organizations in the region. Through the generosity of parishioners to the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe, nearly 50 emergency aid grants, totaling more than half a million dollars, brought humanitarian aid to victims and refugees in Ukraine, Poland, Slovakia, and Moldova between February and May 2022. The Kyiv archeparchy of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) provided emergency shelter in its cathedral basements to Kyiv residents fleeing bombardment. Caritas Ukraine acquired the food, tents, blankets, and personal hygiene products so desperately needed by people who sought aid at relief centers throughout the country with collection funds.

Your support for the collection is crucial to helping the Church fulfill its mission to minister to people's spiritual and material needs in Ukraine and more than 25 other countries throughout Central and Eastern Europe, especially in times of serious hardship.



## A book for your nightstand, next to your Bible

Grigor Narekatsi, born near the turn of the first millennium, was an Armenian mystical and lyrical poet, monk, and theologian. He has the distinction of being venerated as a saint in the Armenian Apostolic and Catholic Churches and was declared a doctor of the church by Pope Francis in 2015. The prayer book of Gregory of Narek is a fixture in religious Armenian homes, second only to the Bible, and is considered a masterpiece of Christian spiritual literature. It has been translated into 30 languages, including English. Given the rave reviews, consider this writer-saint for your next read!

## Get on board for justice

Today marks the 98th death anniversary of Homer Plessy, the man who attempted to end segregation with his legendary ride on a whites-only streetcar in New Orleans in 1892. His efforts were unsuccessful, and the following seven decades of U.S. jurisprudence included segregation as a bedrock feature. Plessy, however, is much less heralded for the fact that he was a man of faith, a black Catholic whose famous ride was organized by an interracial activist group known as the Comité des Citoyens (Citizens' Committee). Their holy disobedience was one of the first Catholic-led efforts against the

developing hierarchy of racism in the formerly French and Spanish regions of the Deep South. May the courage of Plessy and his allies be of use to us today as we continue the march toward justice.

#### Store up treasure in heaven

Saint Katharine Drexel was born in Philadelphia in 1858 to a wealthy family. The Drexels had a reputation for generosity, reportedly opening their home several days a week to feed and care for people in need. They also made time every day to pray together. During a trip to Europe as a young woman, Katharine was able to have an audience with Pope Leo XIII. She asked the Holy Father to send missionaries to Wyoming. He answered, "Why don't you go?" Not long after, Katharine stunned society by leaving behind her privileged life to dedicate herself to religious life. She worked to improve living conditions and educational opportunities for African Americans and Native Americans. She left a legacy far greater than her family fortune.

# Short but sweet sainthood

Lenten inspiration can come from anywhere—from scripture to Instagram, from saints to young people. While not a Bible figure or social media influencer, 15th-century Casimir of Poland happens to fit the categories of both saint and young person. Saint Casimir was a prince who was under intense pressure from his family and country to take a leading role in government and politics. But Casimir felt called to focus on prayer, study, and care for people in need. Although he had to contend with some very disappointed people, he stood firm in his decision to follow his calling. Disease cut short his life at the tender age of 25, but his example can inspire us to live out our calling and thus help fulfill his.
